

## TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

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UPTON RECORDS, 1933.

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### WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, FEBRUARY 6, 1933.

*Worcester, SS.*

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of  
Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you  
are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton,  
qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at  
the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the sixth day of  
February, 1933, punctually, at six o'clock A. M., then and  
there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the  
ensuing year: Moderator, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer,  
Collector of Taxes, Auditor, five Constables, Tree Warden and  
one Cemetery Commissioner (to fill a vacancy caused by the  
death of Herbert M. Buck), all for one year; one  
Assessor of Taxes, one member of the Board of Public  
Welfare, one Cemetery Commissioner, one School Committee  
and three Trustees for the Public Library, all for three years;  
all on one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon  
on said day of meeting.

In accordance with Section 1, Article 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Upton as amended February 12, 1923, the remaining articles of this warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the Town held Saturday afternoon, February eleventh, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and act thereon.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and act thereon.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money in anticipation of revenue of the present municipal year.

Article 5. To hear the report of the committee appointed to revise the Town By-Laws and take any action pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of \$9,660.00 for the purpose of paying the town's share of the cost of providing the Worcester County Tuberculosis Hospital, the assessment therefor having already been duly made against the town, determine whether all or any portion of said assessment be funded as authorized by Chapter 111 of the Acts of 1932 and for what period not exceeding fifteen years, direct the Town Clerk to file with the County Commissioners promptly a copy of such vote as may be passed under this article, and any other papers requested, or to take any action in relation to the subject matter hereof.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for further extension of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will each appropriate \$4,000.00 or more, as recommended by the Finance Committee, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for widening and resurfacing a section of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90 Maintenance, provided the State and County will each appropriate \$1,000.00 or more, as recommended by the Finance Committee, or take any action thereon.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to transfer to the Road Machinery Fund, \$1,100.70, the amount received for rental of road machinery during 1932, said amount to be used for the purpose of purchasing, repairing and operating road machinery.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to pay for strictly unskilled labor at a rate of .35 per hour, as recommended by the Finance Committee, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make a contract, at an early date, with the Worcester Suburban Electric Co. for furnishing electricity at the Upton Town Infirmary on South Street, as petitioned for by the Board of Public Welfare.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to pay the Moderator a certain salary per year for his services, or to pay him \$5.00 for conducting each meeting of the town, or take any action thereon, as petitioned for by John E. Dearth and others.

Article 13. To see if the town will vote to change the office of Road Superintendent from an appointive office to an elective office, or act thereon, as petitioned for by Taylor C. Lyford and others.

Article 14. To determine the manner of repairing the highways and bridges the ensuing year, and act thereon, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 15. To see if the town will vote to readjust the salaries of all town officers, or act in any manner pertaining thereto, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 16. To determine the wage to be paid the Superintendent of Streets, or act thereon, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 17. To see if the town will vote to furnish compensation to Superintendent of Streets for use of automobile, or act thereon, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 18. To see what wage the voters wish to pay other laborers on the highways and other town work the ensuing year, or act in any manner pertaining thereto, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 19. To see if the town will vote to adopt, for one year, a working time on the highways of six hours per day, five days a week, in order to give more men employment, no one man to put in over thirty hours in any one week, or act thereon, as petitioned for by E. T. Hall and others.

Article 20. To see if the town will vote, as a measure of economy, to instruct the School Committee as follows:

1. To pay for janitor service for the three school houses and the Principal of the High School salaries not to exceed one thousand dollars each, or act thereon.

2. To pay all others teachers salaries not to exceed nine hundred dollars each, or act thereon.

3. To pay the school nurse and school physician salaries not to exceed fifty dollars each, or act thereon, as petitioned for by H. C. Campbell and others.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to dispense with all street lights the ensuing year, or act in any manner pertaining thereto, as petitioned for by H. C. Campbell and others.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 6, 1933.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, SS.*

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in the Town Hall in said Upton, on Monday, the sixth day of February, 1933. The meeting was called to order at six o'clock A. M. by the town clerk, who then read the warrant and the officer's return thereon.

## TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 1. The selectmen having appointed Henry E. Allard, William B. Walker, Edward F. Gorman and Edward G. Rawson, election officers, they were duly sworn to faithfully perform the duties of the office by the town clerk.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots having been posted as the law directs, a package said to contain 1000 official ballots, to be used at this election, was delivered to the ballot clerks.

The ballot box was then shown to the voters present to be empty, the index being set on 0000, it was locked and the keys thereof were given to Herbert A. Bagley, constable in attendance at said meeting.

The polls were declared open at six o'clock A. M.

The following persons having been appointed by the selectmen to canvass the vote, Eleanor B. Adair, Grace M. Murphy, George G. Newton and Edwin W. Sadler, they were duly sworn by the town clerk.

At the close of the polls, the register on the ballot box stood at 616. The check-lists were compared and showed that 616 had voted.

REPORT OF  
FINANCE COMMITTEE  
UPTON, MASSACHUSETTS

FEBRUARY, 1933.

TO THE VOTERS OF UPTON:—The appropriations recommended by us including \$2,500.00 for the Westboro Road and \$660.00 to be applied on the hospital debt total \$67,327.43 or a decrease of 9% as against the 1932 total of \$73,796.73. All boards have contributed to make this possible.

The largest saving has been made by the School Department. They have asked for \$2,000.00 less than their regular appropriation, and, in addition, all teachers have signed agreements to donate 10% of their pay for the use of the Board of Public Welfare, thus making it possible for us to recommend at least \$1,000.00 less for them. This gives us a 12% reduction over last year for the schools.

The Forest Fire Warden has recommended an appropriation of \$150.00 to purchase a used truck chassis. Because of the uncertainty of continuing to use our highway trucks, the committee felt justified in not recommending a new purchase until this matter is decided.

We are recommending only \$2,500.00 for street lights as against \$3,250.00 last year. We believe the selectmen, if given only that amount to spend, can make some arrangement for decreasing the rates, making shorter schedules or eliminating lights during the summer months. This has been one of our most rapidly increasing regular appropriations.

The Fire Department have asked for \$1,100.00 and we are recommending \$1,000.00. Inasmuch as all other departments have made reductions and \$1,000.00 has been the regular amount asked for from 1924 until 1931, we believe the Fire engineers should at least try to hold up their present efficiency on \$95.00 less than was spent last year.

We have recommended under a special article in the warrant, that strictly unskilled labor be paid at the rate of \$.35 per hour for the coming year. We feel that this rate will give employment to the greatest possible number of men.

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PROCEEDINGS OF THE ADJOURNED TOWN

MEETING, FEBRUARY 11, 1933.

About three hundred legal voters of the Town of Upton met at the Town Hall on Saturday, February 11, 1933. The meeting was called to order by the moderator, Malcolm C. Temple.

REPORTS OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 2. Voted: to accept the reports of town officers with the following correction: page 117, 488 3-7 weeks should be 485 5-7 weeks.

APPROPRIATIONS.

Article 3. The appropriations as recommended in the Report of the Finance Committee were taken up and acted upon separately.

As no motion was made to appropriate a sum for the suppression of Gypsy Moth, this item was passed over.

A motion that \$8,900.00 be appropriated for Public Welfare was lost. The vote was taken by show of hands: Yes, 33, No, 70. A motion that \$5,000.00 be appropriated for Public Welfare was amended to \$7,000.00 and carried.

Voted to pass over the appropriation for signboards.

In connection with schools, on motion of Mr. Teachout, it was voted: that the Town Treasurer be authorized to accept the 10% salary contributions of the school teachers and apply same to the 1933 expenses of the Board of Public Welfare. A rising vote of thanks was given to the teachers.

#### BORROWING MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: that the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the municipal year, beginning January 1, 1933, to an amount not exceeding in the aggregate \$30,000.00 and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and debt or debts incurred under this vote to be paid from taxes of said municipal year.

#### REPORT OF BY-LAWS COMMITTEE.

Article 5. New By-Laws for the town had been drawn up by the Committee and printed to provide every voter with a copy. They were read, one article at a time, by the moderator and accepted with the following changes:

Article 2, Section 5, the word 'three' changed to 'four'; Article 3, Section 16, 'it has been submitted to' in place of 'some report thereon has been made by'; Article 7, Section 1, 'the person authorized to have charge of the streets' instead of 'the Highway Surveyor'.

Voted: to adopt these By-Laws subject to the approval of the Attorney General.

## WORCESTER COUNTY TUBERCULOSIS HOSPITAL.

Article 6. Voted: that the sum of \$9,660.00, being the amount of the assessment already made for the town's proportion of the cost of providing the Worcester County Tuberculosis Hospital, be and the same is hereby appropriated and that of said amount the sum of \$660.00 be raised in this year's tax levy and the balance of \$9,000.00 be funded as authorized by Chapter 111 of the Acts of 1932, and paid in substantially equal installments over a period of nine years in accordance with the provisions of said Chapter 111, and the Town Clerk be and he hereby is directed to file with the County Commissioners promptly a copy of this vote and any other papers requested.

## WESTBORO ROAD.

Article 7. Voted: to appropriate the sum of two thousand (\$2,000.00) dollars for further extension of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will each appropriate \$4,000.00 or more.

## RESURFACING WESTBORO ROAD.

Article 8. Voted: to appropriate the sum of five hundred (\$500.00) dollars for widening and resurfacing a section of the Westboro Road under Chapter 90 maintenance, provided the State and County will each appropriate \$1,000.00 or more.

## ROAD MACHINERY FUND.

Article 9. Voted: to transfer to the Road Machinery Fund, \$1,100.70, the amount received for rental of road machinery during 1932, said amount to be used for the purpose of purchasing, repairing and operating road machinery.

## PAY FOR LABORERS.

Article 10. A motion by John E. Dearth that the prevailing wage for workers on the highways for the ensuing year be \$.40 per hour was amended to \$.50. When Henry R. Hoyle said the matter should be, as now, in the hands of the selectmen, these motions were withdrawn.

Voted: to pass over the article.

## ELECTRICITY AT TOWN INFIRMARY.

Article 11. Voted: to authorize the Selectmen to make a contract with the Worcester Suburban Electric Company for furnishing electricity at the Upton Town Infirmary, the rate not to exceed \$13.00 per month for a period of four years.

Article 16. A motion to lay on the table until the next annual town meeting was lost. A rising vote was taken: Yes—36, No—40. Voted: to leave the matter in the hands of the selectmen.

## AUTOMOBILE FOR SUPERINTENDENT OF STREETS.

Article 17. Voted: to leave the matter in the hands of the selectmen.

Voted: That Articles 18, 19, 20 and 21 be stricken from the warrant.

Voted: That the town authorize the appointment of an employment committee to consist of five members,—one from the Board of Selectmen, one from the Board of Public Welfare, the Superintendent of Streets, one to be appointed by Wm. Knowlton & Sons Co. and one to be appointed by the District Nursing Association, said committee to elect its own chairman and to serve until the next annual town meeting.

Voted: that the sum of \$67,098.47 be raised by taxation.

Voted: that the By-Laws committee be discharged.

A rising vote of thanks was given to this committee.

## BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF UPTON.

In compliance with General Laws, Chapter 40, Section 32, I hereby certify that the following is a true copy of the By-Laws adopted by the Town of Upton, at the annual town meeting held February 11, 1933 and as approved by Joseph E. Warner, Attorney General, March 8, 1933.

I also certify that a copy thereof has been delivered to every occupied dwelling and apartment in the town and the affidavit of persons delivering said copies was filed with the Town Clerk July 28, 1933.

## ARTICLE I.

## GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Section 1. These By-Laws shall be known as the "Code of By-Laws for 1933 of the Town of Upton." They are made subject to, and in conjunction with, the General Laws governing the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Section 2. Any or all By-Laws of the Town may be repealed or amended, or other By-Laws may be adopted by a majority vote at any annual town meeting or by a two-thirds vote at a special town meeting, provided the article containing all the subject matter of the proposed change has been inserted in the warrant for the special meeting.

Section 3. Whoever violates any By-Laws of the town whereby any act or thing is enjoined, required or prohibited, shall forfeit and pay for each offense a fine not exceeding twenty dollars, unless some other penalty is expressly provided by law, or by some By-Law of the town.

Section 4. All By-Laws heretofore adopted by the town are hereby repealed. If any provision herein is declared unconstitutional or illegal by final judgment, order or decree of the Supreme Judicial Court of the Commonwealth,

the validity of the remaining provisions of these By-Laws shall not be affected hereby.

## ARTICLE 2.

### TOWN MEETINGS AND PROCEDURE THEREAT.

Section 1. The annual meeting for the election of town officers and the transaction of town business, shall be held on the first Monday in February in each year. The polls shall be open at six o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until four o'clock in the afternoon, when they shall be closed, and it shall be so stated in the warrant calling said meeting.

All business of the annual meeting, except the election of such officers and the determination of such matters as by law are required to be elected and determined at such meeting, and the raising and appropriating of monies in anticipation of the payment of taxes, shall be considered at an adjournment thereof, which adjournment shall be held on the following Saturday at two o'clock P. M.

Section 2. Warrants for all town meetings shall be directed to either of the constables of the town, and the meeting shall be notified by posting attested copies of the warrant in each of the post-offices of the town and on the town hall building, seven days at least, before the day of such meeting.

Section 3. At all town meetings twenty legal voters of the town shall be necessary to constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Section 4. No grant of a sum of money exceeding two hundred dollars shall be made until the subject matter thereof has been considered and estimates reported to the town either by the selectmen, school committee, engineers of the fire department, or other town officers, or by some committee chosen for that purpose in pursuance of a vote of the town.

Section 5. When a question is under debate, no motion except the following shall be received, and they shall take precedence in the order in which they are arranged in these By-Laws, and all except the first four, shall be open to debate:

- (a) To adjourn.
- (b) To decide by ballot using check-list.
- (c) To lay on, or take from the table.
- (d) For the previous question.
- (e) To postpone to a time certain.
- (f) To commit or recount or refer.
- (g) To amend.
- (h) To postpone indefinitely.

Section 6. Upon taking a vote upon any question, if the decision of the moderator be doubted, or a division of the house called for, the moderator shall request the house to be seated, and shall appoint tellers. The question shall then be distinctly stated and those in the affirmative and negative respectively shall be requested to rise and stand in their places until they are counted by the tellers, who shall count each side and make report thereof to the moderator.

Section 7. No vote shall be reconsidered at the same meeting, or any adjournment thereof, except upon a motion made within one hour of the adoption of such vote, or unless ordered by two-thirds of the voters present and voting.

Section 8. The duties of the moderator not prescribed by the statutes, or these By-Laws, shall be determined by the general rules of parliamentary law so far as they may be adapted to town meetings.

Section 9. An amendment cannot be amended and no motion or proposition of a subject different from that under consideration shall be entertained under color of an amendment.

## ARTICLE 3.

## DUTIES OF TOWN OFFICERS.

## SELECTMEN.

Section 1. The Board of Selectmen shall have the full and exclusive authority as agents of the town to institute, prosecute, defend, compromise, and settle all claims, suits and actions brought by or against the town, provided, however that no claim or action against the town unless reduced to the form of an execution or decree of court, shall be compromised or settled by the payment of any amount in excess of two hundred dollars, without a special vote of the town.

Section 2. Whenever it shall be necessary to execute any deed conveying land, or any other instrument required to carry into effect any vote of the town, the same shall be executed by the selectmen, or a majority thereof, in the name of the town, unless otherwise provided by law or by vote of the town, and shall be sealed with the town seal.

Section 3. The selectmen may appear in the interest of the town, either personally or by counsel before any court, committee, legislature or any state or county board or commission, but such authority does not authorize said board to commit the town to any course of action without the vote of the town.

Section 4. Each town officer, board, commission and committee shall annually in the month of January of each year, prepare and submit to the Board of Selectmen, a report in writing covering clearly and concisely the work of his department for the preceding year. Each of such reports shall be published in the annual Town Report which shall be ready for distribution among the voters of the town at the annual town meeting.

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## TOWN CLERK.

Section 5. The Town Clerk shall see that every conveyance to the Town of any interest in land, except as otherwise provided by law, is duly recorded in the proper registry therefor, and he shall have custody of all such recorded instruments after the same are ready for return from the registry.

Section 6. The Town Clerk, as soon as possible after a vote of the town has been passed which relates particularly to or affects the duties of any board, committee or officer of the Town, shall furnish a copy of such vote to such board, committee or officer.

Section 7. The Town Clerk shall furnish the selectmen for publication in the annual printed report of the town, a copy of his record for all town meetings that have been held during the preceding year, also the vital statistics recorded during the preceding year.

## TOWN TREASURER.

Section 8. The Town Treasurer shall have charge of and shall promptly receive all income, revenue and monies belonging to the town when collected by any board, commission or officer.

The Town Treasurer shall have custody of all insurance policies of the town.

## COLLECTOR OF TAXES.

Section 9. The Collector of Taxes shall upon receiving the tax lists or warrant from the assessors collect the taxes therein set forth with interest, and pay said taxes and interest to the town treasurer according to the warrant and shall make written return thereof with his tax list and of his doings thereon at such times as the assessors shall require. He shall give the treasurer an account of all charges and fees collected by him.

## AUDITOR.

Section 10. The Town Auditor shall prove extensions of all bills, check bills against the list of annual appropriation and see that no bills are approved if they are in excess of appropriation to the particular department to which they are chargeable.

## FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Section 11. There shall be a finance committee consisting of nine citizens of the town who shall be sworn to a faithful performance of their duties. No town officer, elective or appointed, shall be eligible to membership on the Finance Committee.

Section 12. The Selectmen shall annually, not later than the first day of May, appoint three members of the Finance Committee, for a term of three years, and notice thereof shall receive public notice in a newspaper receiving local distribution.

Section 13. The committee shall meet, choose its own officers, and adopt such rules and regulations affecting its government as may from time to time seem necessary.

Section 14. This committee shall consider matters relating to the appropriation and expenditure of money by the town, its indebtedness, the administration of its various departments, property valuation and assessments, and other municipal affairs of the town, and make such report and recommendation to the town concerning the same, as circumstances and conditions may require.

Section 15. It shall have authority at any time to investigate the books, accounts and management of any department of the town; and the books, accounts and records of all departments and officers of the town shall be open to its inspection.

Section 16. No motion carrying an expenditure or appropriation of money, except where such expenditure is required by law, shall be acted upon at any town meeting until it has been submitted to the Finance Committee.

Section 17. The Finance Committee may furnish a report of any and all matters which have been considered by them, pertaining to the town, with their recommendations and suggestions, so that the same can be published in the annual town report, or distributed at the annual town meeting.

#### ARTICLE 4.

##### FINANCIAL.

Section 1. All bills incurred during the year must be in the hands of the selectmen on or before the last day of each year.

Section 2. No department, except by a special vote of the town and that to be in accord with the laws of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, shall keep for its own use any monies derived from the operation of said department, but shall turn the same into the treasurer of the town, who shall apply same to the general fund of the town.

Section 3. Funds given to the town in trust or otherwise for specific purposes shall not be mingled with other funds of the town, but shall be kept and invested separately, and used only in accordance with the terms of the gift.

#### ARTICLE 5.

##### JUNK DEALERS AND DEALERS IN SECOND HAND ARTICLES.

Section 1. The Selectmen may license suitable persons to be dealers in and keepers of shops for the purchase, sale or barter of junk, old metals or second-hand articles, and may make such additional rules, regulations and restrictions as they deem proper, not inconsistent with the provisions of law or of these By-Laws.

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Section 2. The Board of Selectmen may license suitable persons to be junk collectors, to collect from place to place in this town by purchase or otherwise any articles mentioned in Section 1.

Section 3. No collector of junk shall, directly or indirectly, either purchase or receive, by way of barter, exchange or otherwise, any of the articles mentioned in Section 1, of a minor or apprentice, knowing or having reason to believe him to be such.

Section 4. Every collector of junk while engaged in collecting, transporting or dealing in the articles mentioned in Section 1, shall wear upon the outside of his clothing a badge, and have upon each side of any vehicle used by him, a sign, well displayed, such badge and sign to be prescribed by the Board of Selectmen.

#### ARTICLE 6.

##### TRAFFIC AND PARKING.

Section 1. The following regulations for vehicles shall be observed by drivers thereof, who shall at all times obey any directions of voice, hand or whistle, from any member of the police force or any mechanical device placed in highway for the purpose of aiding traffic as to starting, stopping, slowing, approaching, departing from any place, the manner of taking up and setting down passengers, and the loading or unloading of anything.

Section 2. A police officer may divert either vehicles or pedestrians when necessary to avoid congestion.

Section 3. Slow moving vehicles shall keep as close as possible to the right hand curb.

Section 4. Every driver of a vehicle in turning to the right into another street shall keep such vehicle as near the right curb or right side of the street as possible.

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any dwelling.

Section 5. Every driver of a vehicle in turning to the left into another street shall pass to the right of and beyond the center of the intersection of the street before turning.

Section 6. Every driver of a vehicle crossing from side of the street to the other side, except for the purpose of passing other vehicles or because of dangers in the street shall do so by turning to left, so as to head in general direction of traffic after they have crossed the street.

Section 7. All drivers of vehicles on the approach of fire apparatus shall stop so as not to interfere with its passage.

Section 8. No person shall ride or cause to be driven any horse or vehicle over that part of any street which is being mended, repaired or paved if a watchman or sign are placed prohibiting the same.

Section 9. No vehicle shall stop with its left side to the curb on a main thoroughfare leading into the town from adjoining cities or towns, to-wit—Main, Milford and Grafton Road.

Section 10. Every driver of a vehicle shall on slowing down or stopping give a signal to those behind by conspicuously raising a whip or hand. The word vehicles herein shall include horses hitched to vehicles, horses ridden and lead, motor vehicles of all kinds, everything on wheels or runners not propelled by hand or foot. The word driver herein shall include the rider or driver of horse and the operator of a motor vehicle.

#### ARTICLE 7.

##### MISCELLANEOUS.

Section 1. No persons except the Selectmen or the person authorized to have charge of the streets in the lawful performance of their duties or those acting under their or-

ders, except such persons as are or may be authorized by statute, shall break or dig up the ground in any street or sidewalk, or public way, in the Town, without obtaining a permit from the Selectmen, which shall state the regulations under which the work shall be done. All persons acting under such permit shall erect and maintain a suitable railing or fence around that part of the street or public way so broken up, so long as the same shall remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers, and he or they shall keep one or more lighted lanterns fixed to such railing or fence, or in some other way exposed every night from sunset to sunrise, so long as such street or way shall remain unsafe or inconvenient for travellers. The work done under said permit must be in accordance with said regulations and upon the completion of said work the surface of said street or way shall be restored to a condition satisfactory to the Selectmen.

Section 2. Whoever shall discharge into any drain or sewer inlet, manhole or catch basin any matter or thing which may tend to cause obstruction therein or any injury thereto, shall be punished by a fine.

Section 3. No person shall coast or skate on any street or public place except on such as are designated by the Selectmen or on public playgrounds.

Section 4. No person shall break, deface or move any official sign post, signalling or traffic device, warning barrier, lantern or electric light, placed or located in any street or public place for the information or direction of traffic or the protection of the public.

Section 5. No person shall bathe in any waters of this town, in a state of nudity, in places exposed to public view, or in immediate sight of the occupants of any dwelling.

Section 6. No person shall loiter, saunter or continue to sit or stand in any street, public place or public building, so as to obstruct or impede the free passage of or in any manner annoy or disturb any other persons, after being directed by a police officer to "move on."

Section 7. No person shall habitually or otherwise gather or congregate or loaf about, on any street or public place, after being directed by a police officer to cease such gathering or loafing.

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Parents and others are requested to carefully examine the above lists and if any errors or omissions are discovered report them at once to the town clerk, that the record may be corrected, as it is of importance that the records of Vital Statistics should be complete. Herewith are extracts from the General Laws, Chapter 46.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 3.

(As Amended by Chapter 281, Section 1, Acts of 1925).

Every physician, or hospital medical officer registered under section nine of chapter one hundred and twelve, in this chapter called officer, shall keep a record of the birth of every child in cases of which he was in charge, showing date and place of birth, the name, if any, of the child, its sex and color, the name, age, birthplace, occupation and residence (including the street number, if any, and the ward number, if in a city) of each parent, the maiden name of the mother and the name of the physician or officer, if any, personally attending the birth. If the child is illegitimate, the name of, and other facts relating to the father shall not be set forth except upon written request of both the father and mother; provided, that if an illegitimate child shall have become legitimate by the intermarriage of his parents and the acknowledgment of his father, as provided in section seven of chapter one hundred and ninety, prior to the mailing or delivery of any report herein required, such report shall read, in all respects, as if such child had been born to such parents in lawful wedlock. Said physician or officer shall, within fifteen days after such birth, mail or deliver to the clerk or registrar of the town where such birth occurred, a report stating the facts hereinabove required to be shown on said record and also the said written request, if any; provided, that if said report is not so made within forty-eight hours after such birth, said physician or officer shall, within said

forty-eight hours, mail or deliver to said clerk or registrar a notice stating the date and place of the birth, the street number, if any, the ward number, if in a city, and the family name. Upon presentation to him of a certificate of the town clerk stating that any such birth has been duly reported, the town treasurer shall pay to such physician or officer a fee of twenty-five cents for each birth so reported. Any physician or any such officer violating any provision of this section shall forfeit not more than twenty-five dollars. The said town clerk or registrar shall file daily with the local board of health a list of all births reported to him, showing, as to each, the date of birth, sex, color, family name, residence, ward and physician or officer in charge.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 6.

Parents, within forty days after the birth of a child, and every householder, within forty days after a birth in his house, shall cause notice thereof to be given to the clerk of the town where such child is born \* \* \*.

## TOWN TREASURER'S STATEMENTS.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, known as the Knowlton School Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, \$29.91, to be used by the School Committee to defray the extraordinary expenses of the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Home National Bank, known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, one thousand dollars, (\$1,000.00) the income to be divided between the two pupils in our public schools who make the most progress during each year. The amount of the Fund, Jan. 1, 1934, \$1,017.50. \$87.85 interest of this fund was used this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, five thousand (\$5,000.00) dollars, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$187.50 was used this last year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund, in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) the income to be used for the Public Library. \$175.00 was used last year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank as a nucleus of a fund for a library building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925, the sum of \$2,363.18.

of the Accounts of the Town of Upton, for the period from April 9, 1931, to June 12, 1933. Made in accordance with the Provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws.

Sir:—

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the accounts of the town of Upton for the period from April 9, 1931, the date of the previous audit, to June 12, 1933, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions of the town, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, were examined and verified.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The cash book footings were verified, the receipts were checked with the records of the various departments collecting money for the town and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked to the selectmen's warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

The treasurer's cash balance on June 12, 1933 was proved by a reconciliation of statements furnished by the banks of deposit and by an actual count of the cash in the office.

The savings bank books, representing the investment of the trust funds in the custody of the treasurer, were examined, and the income and disbursements were verified.

The records of revenue loans were examined and the canceled notes on file were examined and checked.

It was found that disbursements have been made from cemetery funds income upon orders of the cemetery commissioners only. In the future such payments should be made on authority of selectmen's warrants, thereby complying with the provisions of Section 52, Chapter 41, General Laws.

The assessors' computations of the tax rates were examined and checked, and it was noted that the sums estimated by the assessors to be received from sources other than taxation and loans and used by them as a deduction from the amount to be raised by taxation exceeded the sums actually collected in 1931 and 1932 by \$2,654.59 and \$2,922.14, respectively.

Care should be taken by the assessors in estimating the receipts to be collected from sources other than taxes, for a deficit in the estimated receipts account reduces the surplus revenue of the town correspondingly.

Attention is also called to the appropriation of \$3,200 voted from available funds in 1933. This sum should be included by the assessors in the total amount of appropriations voted by the town in 1933, while the same amount may be used as a deduction from the amount to be raised by taxation in 1933 only with the written approval of the Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation, in accordance with the provisions of Section 23, Chapter 59, General Laws.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined. The taxes outstanding at the time of the previous examination were audited, and all subsequent commitments were proved with the assessors' warrants. The cash book findings were verified, the recorded payments were compared with the treasurer's cash book, the abatements were checked to the assessors' records of abatements granted, and the outstanding amounts were listed and reconciled.

The outstanding amounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared

on the books as owing money to the town, and from the replies received it appears that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The accounts of the town clerk for dog, hunting and fishing, and town licenses were examined, and the payments to county, state, and town were verified.

Attention is again called to Sections 34 and 35, Chapter 138, General Laws, providing for the granting of licenses for the sale of denatured alcohol and to Section 53, Chapter 94, General Laws, which pertains to the registration with the Town Clerk, in towns having no inspector of milk, of sellers of Oleomargarine.

In addition to the accounts mentioned, the records of all other departments receiving money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined, and the payments to the treasurer were verified.

The surety bonds of the treasurer, collector, and town clerk were examined and found to be in proper form.

Ledger accounts were compiled, and a balance sheet showing the financial condition of the town as of June 12, 1933, was prepared and is appended to this report. Appended herewith are also tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the collector's cash, summaries of the tax and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the trust fund transactions.

For the co-operation received from the several officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON LIBRARY:—

I herewith submit the following library report with statistics and the catalog of new books.

The outstanding event has been the re-decorating of the library room with funds received from the Federal Civil Works. The ceiling has been put into good condition and tinted; the woodwork and walls painted; the reading tables and charging desk varnished. The color of the walls has been changed from a dark green to a warm buff, making the room seem larger and much lighter. The fire-place has been opened. New shades have been purchased and hung. Mr. Charles A. Whitney, early in the summer, gave his time and labor in re-covering the window screens with new copper screening.

In May the Junior Literary Guild offered to give a book to the pupil from the seventh grade and also from the eighth grade who should write the best letter giving their opinion of a Junior Guild book read by them. Lois Shattuck of Grade VIII and Viola Dow of Grade VII were the winners in this contest.

A collection of pictures by famous British artists, loaned to the library by the Woman's Education Association, made a charming exhibit during May and June.

During Book Week a collection of book-marks, one from every child in the grades, was shown at the library. This attractive exhibit, *our first of school work*, was made possible through the kind co-operation of the Art Supervisor, Mrs. Violet Stuart, and all the grade teachers, and drew many visitors, both pupils and parents, to the library. The new books for children purchased for the library were also displayed during the week. On Saturday of that week, when the State Certificates were presented, the children were entertained by Miss Edith Hilliard who told Kipling's story of the Elephant's Child.

Books have been purchased and added to the Dr. Carpenter Alcove as required.

The History of the George Washington Bicentennial in three large volumes, a gift "from the Government of the United States to the American people", is the most valuable gift received during the year. As President F. D. Roosevelt said, these volumes are a "mine of authentic information upon the life and services of the First President."

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT  
OF SCHOOLS.

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TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF UPTON:—

The following is my thirteenth annual report:

ENROLLMENT.

The annual report for 1932 called your attention to the fact that there was likely to be a very large sixth grade in the fall of 1933, which would necessitate the dividing of the grade between the three schools. The following table of expected enrollment will show that next September there is likely to be a very large seventh grade:

If the above estimated enrollment should prove to be essentially correct and the distribution between schools be carried out as indicated it should be noted:

1. The first and second grade rooms in both the Ball and Knowlton schools will have more than 40 pupils per teacher,—a situation that is far from desirable with these young pupils who should have at the beginning stages as large an amount of individual attention as possible.
2. The seventh grade will be too large to be accommodated in one room, so that it will be necessary to divide it into two sections for recitation purposes, and still on another basis for seating purposes as there will be 85 pupils for the two rooms on the lower floor of the high school building.

An examination of the above tabulation shows that during the last six years the high school has gained about 40% in enrollment while the elementary grades have remained about the same. This increase of enrollment in the high school has made necessary the dividing of classes hitherto combined on an alternating basis and made it necessary in September, to employ an additional teacher on part time.

**VOLUNTARY CONTRIBUTIONS AND

Since last March teachers have contributed 10% of their salaries to the welfare department and transportation and janitors' pay has been reduced 10%. During the past year these have amounted to the following:

#### HEALTH.

For two or three years serious epidemics of communicable diseases have seriously reduced the attendance to the schools, endangering the health of the pupils and necessitating individual and public expense in caring for the sick and those that were quarantined. In an endeavor to prevent such outbreaks in the future the Committee recently put into effect the following rules:

"No pupil who has been absent from school for two or more days on account of illness shall be allowed to return to school until said pupil shall have received a certificate from

a physician (preferably the school physician), certifying that the child is free from any communicable disease.

No pupil who has been absent from school for two days or more on account of illness shall be permitted to enter a school bus unless said child has a certificate from a physician or permission of the school nurse and the driver of a bus shall refuse admittance to any pupil who so attempts to enter without a certificate or permission and report the matter to the teacher in charge.

It shall be the duty of the teachers in the elementary schools and the principal of the high school to notify the school nurse of any case of absence of two days or more which they suspect to be on account of sickness and it shall be the duty of the school nurse to investigate the cases of pupils who come by school bus and notify the bus drivers of any pupils who may not be allowed to enter the bus without a physician's certificate or without her permission.

Any child returning to school without a certificate after having been absent on account of sickness shall immediately be sent home by the teacher in charge and the matter reported to the School Nurse who will report to the Superintendent of Schools."

There has been a gratifying cooperation on the part of parents in carrying out the rules and the school nurse, the school physician, and teachers are also whole-heartedly trying to preserve the health of the pupils.

#### MISS SANDSTROM REPORTS:

All pupils at the Ball and Knowlton Schools were weighed in May and October. The High School in October. Those not gaining were reported.

In January the Chadwick Clinic sponsored by the State Department of Public Health was held. This clinic is to find tuberculosis, if present, even at an early stage and instruct

the parents regarding care and prevention of this disease.

In March the Toxin-Anti-Toxin Clinic was held,— sponsored by the State Department of Public Health under the direction of Dr. Oscar Dudley assisted by Miss Higgins. Parents were also asked to bring pre-school children over six months of age. This also called for the parents' consent. In the spring we had an epidemic of scarlet fever among the pupils in the Knowlton School. Pupils absent from school over one day, reported sick, and not under the care of a physician were visited by the school nurse. If any symptoms of scarlet fever were found, the parent was advised to have a physician at once and the case was followed up.

All pupils have had their hearing tested by the audiometer. Home visits will be made to those needing further examination and treatment.

The annual physical examination by Dr. Capen has been completed.

## MRS. STUART REPORTS:

The year of 1933 has been one of accomplishment in the art department, commercial art leading other phases.

In March, twenty-five posters were submitted to the S.P. C.A. state contest in Boston. Six medals and five honorable mentions were received, and if the parents could have seen those original posters in which kindness to animals was shown, I feel sure they would agree with me that the girls and boys deserved those prizes.

We also went into the poppy poster contest. Our local legion auxiliary gave an evening of enjoyment, painting, nature study, design and some very picturesque miniature gardens, all contributed to make a most colorful display and a welcome addition to the farmers' club exhibit.

In November, at the suggestion of our librarian, we observed book week by making book marks which were displayed in the library, and I believe many pupils made their first visit to the library at this time.

This December we are making Christmas gifts, of paper to be sure, but practical nevertheless, showing again that when useful articles are also artistic their sales value is doubled. Even the youngest pupil in the first grade has enjoyed the making of an acceptable gift.

In conclusion, I wish to thank our teachers for working with me. I also wish to express my appreciation to the parents and friends who by showing so much interest in our work, have encouraged the pupils to make our school year one of achievement.

## MANUAL TRAINING.

## MR. STANLEY REPORTS:

The work in both the seventh and eighth grades is going along well, very well considering the small amount of time the

boys can spend in the shop. Last year's eighth grade developed exceptional ability and more articles were made than ever before, among them taborets, fern stands, costumers and an upholstered stool.

The present eighth grade is a small group and producing excellent results. Among the projects in process of construction are lamps, an end table, a bedside table and skate sharpeners. When the seventh grade is in the shop, every one of the sixteen benches is in use. Their projects, of course, are necessarily small and they are busy learning the different steps in wood-working while making necktie racks, key boards, book supports, pen and ink stands and pen and pencil racks.

Our room and equipment are excellent and it seems a pity that when boys have served a satisfactory apprenticeship in Manual Training and become so much interested they no longer have the privilege of pursuing it further.

#### DOMESTIC SCIENCE.

This activity was started two or three years ago under supervision of the State Teachers College at Framingham who send to us student teachers. Heretofore one student has been sent for each half of the school year. This year two are being sent, expense to the Town being the same as heretofore. Miss Winnifred Granger of Milford, assisted by Miss Larsen, has been teacher since September and is doing very acceptable work. She has devised a simple system of monthly reports of the accounts which make it easy to know how this phase of the work is going.

#### HIGH SCHOOL.

Last September Mr. Cowing assumed the duties of principal of the high school. He has taken hold with enthusiasm, is working diligently and has the hearty cooperation of the teachers and an excellent attitude among the pupils.

The sixth grade this year, because of their large number, had to be divided between the Knowlton School, the Ball School and the High School. With the large probable number of students going into the seventh grade from this year's sixth grade it will probably be necessary to exclude the incoming sixth grade from the High School building altogether.
