WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 4, 1935.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Worcester, SS.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of
Worcester,
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you
are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton,
qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at
the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday the fourth day of
February, punctually, at 6 o'clock A. M., then and there to
act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the
ensuing year: Moderator, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer,
Collector Taxes, Auditor, Road Commissioner, five Constables
and Tree Warden, all for one year; one Assessor of Taxes,
one member of the Public Welfare Board, one member of the
School Committee, one Cemetery Commissioner, three
Trustees for the Public Library and Town Clerk, all for
three years.

Also said voters will give in their votes for or against the following question: "Shall the operation of Section 105B of Chapter 131 of the General Laws, requiring for the taking of fur-bearing animals the use of traps that kill at once or take such animals alive unharmed, be suspended within the town?"

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of the meeting.

In accordance with Article 2, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Upton the remaining articles of this warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the Town held Saturday afternoon, February ninth, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and act thereon.

Article 3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, and act thereon.

Article 4. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1935, and to issue note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To hear the report of the committee appointed to look into the matter of getting reduced rates on electric lighting.

Article 6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000 to be allotted by the Selectmen to the various ERA projects for items other than labor, or to act in any manner pertaining thereto as recommended by the Finance Committee.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100.00 to purchase land, about 4½ acres and a right of way thereto, owned by the Knowlton Farms, Inc., located at the rear of the Upton High School building, for use as a public playground, or take any action thereon as petitioned for by Clement J. Lambert and others.

Article 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Chapter 90 Maintenance, provided the State and County will together allot \$600.00 or more for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for further extension of the Mendon road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County will together allot \$8000.00 or more for the same, or take any action thereon.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$800.00 to be used in defraying the cost of observing the 200th anniversary of the incorporation of this town in June, or take any action thereon.

Article 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00, and in addition appropriate and transfer the sum of \$95.50 from the Machinery Fund for rental of 1984 to the 1985 Machinery Account, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

FEBRUARY 4, 1935.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in the upper Town Hall in said Upton, on Monday, the fourth day of February, 1935. The meeting was called to order at six o'clock A. M. by the town clerk, who then read the warrant and the officer's return thereon.

TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 1. The selectmen having appointed Henry E. Allard, Edwin B. Houghton, Verne Childs and Frank Ford, election officers, they were duly sworn to faithfully perform the duties of the office by the town clerk.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots having been posted as the law directs, a package said to contain 1200 official ballots, to be used at this election, was delivered to the ballot clerks.

The ballot box was then shown to the voters present to be empty, the index being set on 0000, it was locked and the keys thereof were given to Herbert A. Bagley, constable in attendance at said meeting.

The polls were declared open at six o'clock A. M.

The following persons having been appointed by the Selectmen to canvass the vote, Miss Eleanor B. Adair, Miss Grace Murphy, C. Samuel Aldrich, Gerald Shaughnessy, Ernest Henchey, Burton Walker, James Kearnan and Karl S. Whitten, they were duly sworn by the town clerk and began their duties at 1 P. M.

At the close of the polls at 4 P. M. there had been 823 ballots cast. The check lists were compared and showed that 823 persons had voted.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING,

FEBRUARY 9, 1935.

The adjourned town meeting in the main Town Hall on Saturday, February 9, 1935, was called to order by the moderator, Malcolm C. Temple.

REPORTS OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Article 2. Voted: to accept the reports of town officers as printed with exception to be noted on motion of William T. Teachout that "Highway Surveyors' Report" should read "Road Commissioner" which was favorably acted upon.

APPROPRIATIONS.

Article 3. The appropriations as recommended in the Report of the Finance Committee were taken up and acted upon separately.

Motion by Edward B. Newton that appropriation for Public Welfare (Outside Aid) be increased from \$4,500.00 to \$5,500.00 defeated, 125 to 40 votes. William T. Teachout motioned that the appropriation of \$4,500.00 as recommended by Finance Committee originally be increased to \$5,000.00 and so voted.

After some discussion over the town not establishing salary or wage of road commissioner at 1934 annual town meeting, on motion by Henry R. Hoyle the rate of 90 cents per hour was fixed as pay for road commissioner to include his services and use of automobile.

Charles W. Childs opposed dividing of appropriation for Public Welfare department into Outside Aid and Infirmary accounts as for the best interest of the department. Ralph Briggs motioned that \$2,700.00 be appropriated for the Infirmary. This was amended by Arthur Cobbett that \$2,200.00 be appropriated. The amendment was carried.

Before the appropriation of \$2,700.00 for street lights was favorably acted upon, Malcolm C. Temple, chairman of a special committee appointed in 1934 to investigate electric light rate charges in Upton, made a lengthy and valuable report, comparing rate charges, domestic and commercial, in towns having their own municipal light plants. The report was unanimously accepted as one of progress by the committee and the selectmen instructed to arrange with the Worcester Suburban Electric Light Co. a schedule whereby the town would receive as much light service as in 1934. The committee's report was filed as a town record.

BORROWING MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: that the town treasurer, with the approval of the selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1935, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. The new form of motion was recommended by T. N. Waddell, state director of accounts.

ELECTRIC LIGHT RATES.

Article 5. Report made by Malcolm C. Temple, committee chairman, as referred to above.

ERA APPROPRIATION.

Article 6. Voted: that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to be allotted by the Selectmen to the various ERA projects for items other than labor on motion by Michael Shaughnessy.

Article 7. Voted: on motion by Michael Shaughnessy that the town appropriate the sum of \$100 to purchase from the Knowlton Farms, Inc., a plot of land consisting of approximately 4½ acres, located in rear of the High School property, formerly owned by one Rideout and now used as a playground, and that the Town assume the taxes on same for the year of 1935.

Article 8. Voted: that the town raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Chapter 90 Maintenance, provided the State and County will together allot \$600.00 or more for the same.

Article 9. On motion of Herbert A. Bagley it was voted to pass over this article that called for raising and appropriating \$2000 for further improvement of the Mendon road under Chapter 90, provided the State and County would together allot \$8,000.00 or more.

Article 10. Not obtaining a two-thirds favorable vote (required by General Laws of Massachusetts), this article calling for appropriation of \$800.00 to be used in defraying expense of observing 200th anniversary of incorporation of Town of Upton, was defeated. Standing vote was Yes 88, No. 80. Selectman Eben T. Hall, chairman of town's Bicentenary committee, spoke in favor of raising and appropriating \$800.00 before vote was taken.

Article 11. Voted: on motion by William T. Teachout, secretary of the Finance committee, to abolish the Machinery Fund and Machinery Account and transfer \$95.50 in Machinery Fund to the town's General Fund.

Voted: to dissolve the warrant.

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts,
you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of
Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to
meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Wednesday, the
fourth day of September, punctually at eight o'clock P. M.
then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To see if the Town will vote to amend the
vote of the town regarding an appropriation for Chapter 90
Maintenance, passed under Article 8 of the warrant for the
adjourned Annual Town Meeting held February 9, 1935, by
specifying that the Selectmen be authorized to use the sum
of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) appropriated, with any
sums to be allotted by the state and county for a similar pur-
pose, or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 2. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate
or take from unappropriated funds in the treasury the sum
of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the Cemetery Account,
or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 3. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate
or take from unappropriated funds in the treasury the sum
of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00), for ERA or WPA
projects, to be apportioned under the direction of the Select-
men for items other than labor, or take any action in rela-
tion thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell certain motor trucks owned by the Town, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate or take from unappropriated funds in the treasury the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the Forest Warden Account, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the purpose of erecting a fire station and authorize the Selectmen to make application to the Federal government for a grant of money under the Emergency Relief Administration of 1935 for said purpose, and to accept such grant, and to authorize the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow such sums of money as may be necessary to meet any appropriation made, or to take any action relative thereto.

Article 7. Parents and others are requested to carefully examine the above lists and if any errors or omissions are discovered report them at once to the town clerk, that the record may be corrected, as it is of importance that the records of Vital Statistics should be complete. Herewith are extracts from the General Laws, Chapter 46.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 3.

(As Amended by Chapter 281, Section 1, Acts of 1925).

Every physician, or hospital medical officer registered under section nine of chapter one hundred and twelve, in this chapter called officer, shall keep a record of the birth of every child in cases of which he was in charge, showing date and place of birth, the name, if any, of the child, its sex and color, the name, age, birthplace, occupation and residence (including the street number, if any, and the ward number, if in a city) of each parent, the maiden name of the mother and the name of the physician or officer, if any, personally attending the birth. If the child is illegitimate, the name of, and other facts relating to the father shall not be set forth except upon written request of both the father and mother; provided, that if an illegitimate child shall have become legitimate by the intermarriage of his parents and the acknowledgment of his father, as provided in section seven of chapter one hundred and ninety, prior to the mailing or delivery of any report herein required, such report shall read, in all respects, as if such child had been born to such parents in lawful wedlock. Said physician or officer shall, within fifteen days after such birth, mail or deliver to the clerk or registrar of the town where such birth occurred, a report stating the facts hereinabove required to be shown on said record and also the said written request, if any; provided, that if said report is not so made within forty-eight hours after such birth, said physician or officer shall, within said

forty-eight hours, mail or deliver to said clerk or registrar a notice stating the date and place of the birth, the street number, if any, the ward number, if in a city, and the family name. Upon presentation to him of a certificate of the town clerk stating that any such birth has been duly reported, the town treasurer shall pay to such physician or officer a fee of twenty-five cents for each birth so reported. Any physician or any such officer violating any provision of this section shall forfeit not more than twenty-five dollars. The said town clerk or registrar shall file daily with the local board of health a list of all births reported to him, showing, as to each, the date of birth, sex, color, family name, residence, ward and physician or officer in charge.

GENERAL LAWS, CHAPTER 46, SECTION 6.

Parents, within forty days after the birth of a child, and every householder, within forty days after a birth in his house, shall cause notice thereof to be given to the clerk of the town where such child is born * * *.

TOWN TREASURER'S STATEMENTS.

There is deposited in the Milford Saving's Bank, \$31.87 known as the Knowlton School Fund with the Town Treasurer as trustee to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, the income to be divided between the two pupils in our public schools who make the most progress during each year. \$82.76 was received and used this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund. \$30.23 was received this year.

Charlotte A. Batchelor and George W. Knowlton established a Trust Deed at the Worcester County Trust Co., with the Bank as trustee the income to be paid to the Town for use of Public Schools. \$298.45 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, the income to be used for the Public Library. \$150.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$150.00 was received this year.

On December 1, 1935 Fred W. Wood, Treasurer of the Cemetery Department, turned over to me the Bank Books of the Cemetery Perpetual Care Legacy Fund, amounting to \$12,259.88. On December 31st, \$18.15 was transferred to the General Fund to pay a Cemetery Interest. Pay Roll of the same amount. With the addition of accumulated interest and two Legacy Funds of \$50.00 each, the total of this Fund, January 1, 1936 is \$12,525.25, deposited in Worcester County Institution for Savings. This Fund was formerly handled by the Treasurer of the Cemetery Department. At the suggestion of the State Director of Accounts it now is handled by the Town Treasurer through the General Accounts.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank a War Bonus Surplus Fund to be used as a nucleus of a Fund for a Public Library Building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925. The amount of this fund Jan. 1, 1936, \$2,520.54.

There is deposited in the Home National Bank of Milford, five thousand dollars (\$5000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Board of Selectmen, to be used to help the Townspeople who are in distress. \$50.00 was drawn and used this year.

On January 1, 1935 the total of this Fund was \$4,802.75. this year 25% of the Bank Waiver Act (\$338.40) was paid back and with the addition of accumulated interest the total of this fund January 1, 1936 is \$5,206.23 with 25% more of the Bank Waiver Act still to be received.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT.

TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON LIBRARY:—

The librarian herewith submits the annual library report together with library statistics and the catalog of new books.

Books have been purchased and added to the Dr. Carpenter Alcove as required.

Two small book-cases have been built to order and placed on either side of the fireplace in the reading-room. They are used to shelve special collections of children's books.

Thirty pictures of the Glacier National Park, loaned to the library by The Library Committee, were on exhibition during July. Miss Alice G. Chandler of Lancaster, who for years has had charge of these travelling collections of pictures, at one time with the Woman's Education Association and later as The Library Committee, died September 2, 1935. The work has stopped and the pictures have been distributed to the libraries where they have been circulating. To the Upton Library has been given the set of Pictures by British Artists. These were shown here in 1933 and consist of forty-eight pictures by such famous artists as Reynolds, Gainsborough, Turner, Landseer and others. They cover three centuries of time and include portraits, landscapes and sea views.

In commemoration of four hundred years of the printed English Bible, a series of ten full-size facsimile pages of the great historic English Bibles from the Coverdale Bible in 1535 to the King James Bible in 1611 were set up as an exhibit during October.

Book Week with the slogan "Reading for Fun" was observed with a display of new books just purchased for children. In contrast with these, an exhibit of favorite books of olden times was arranged to pupils of the eighth grade. On

Saturday, November 23, a story-hour was held, the first six grades being especially invited.

Mrs. Harrison Johnson has given to the library a set of Ruskin in 13 volumes; Mrs. Karl Whitten, 23 boys' books which have been circulated without having been added to the catalog; the Compilers of the Upton History, a copy of the History and a set of books in 4 volumes, "Genealogical and personal memoirs of Worcester County."

This will leave the situation much as at present.

ENTRANCE AGE TO FIRST GRADE.

Last May the Committee passed a rule raising the entrance age to the first grade to 5 years, 10 months on September 1 of the year of entrance, except that children not less than 5 years, 5 months on that date may be admitted by the superintendent on test. Twelve children between the ages of 5 years, 5 months and 5 years, 10 months old were tested and five were admitted. So far as I know, all the parents of the children not admitted, accepted without question, the judgment that the children were not ready to do first grade work. In view of the fact that the validity of the tests and the fairness of its application may be questioned it might be well for the Committee, to consider certain modifications of the rule or its administration. These might be:

1. Set an absolute age limit from which no exceptions would be allowed.
2. Continue the rule as it is but stipulate that the results of the test shall be reported directly to the Committee before they are announced to the parents concerned.

HIGH SCHOOL PROGRAM OF STUDIES.

Mr. Cowing in his report tells about certain changes in the curriculum,—put into effect this year. It may be of interest to compare this program with that of 1921 and note the additions that have been made. They include all the commercial subjects, household arts, sociology, economics, public speaking and commercial geography. These have been added in order to better serve all the pupils and enable the pupils to get a broader knowledge of social subjects that they may the more intelligently perform their duties as citizens and voters. There need be no apprehension that the school is not functioning as a preparatory school for higher institutions since it has for many years had all the privileges of certification to colleges accorded to any New England high

school and since the graduates of the school who have ability and ambition are acquitted themselves well in these higher institutions.

The high schools of the nation are now as never before schools for all young people of high school age. We are attempting to meet the needs of these young people not only by providing so far as possible that each may find some profitable course for him to pursue, but we are trying to use those methods of teaching and study which will make it possible for each pupil to get the most out of each course of which he is individually capable. In pursuance of this aim the teachers are using unit methods of assignment in social subjects and devoting much more of their time to intelligent supervision of the pupils' study. The spirit of the school is excellent and I wish to commend the teachers for the progress thus far made in working out new methods and procedure in instruction and the pupils for their evident seriousness of purpose, their loyalty and cooperation.

ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL BECAUSE OF SICKNESS.

In November, 1933, the following rules of the School Committee were put in force:

"No pupil who has been absent from school for two or more days on account of illness shall be allowed to return to school until said pupil shall have received a certificate from a physician (preferably the school physician), certifying that the child is free from any communicable disease.

No pupil who has been absent from school for two days or more on account of illness shall be permitted to enter a school bus unless said child has a certificate from a physician or permission of the school nurse, and the driver of a bus shall refuse admittance to any pupil who so attempts to enter without a certificate or

permission and report the matter to the teacher in charge.

It shall be the duty of the teachers in the elementary schools and the principal of the high school to notify the school nurse of any cases of absence of two days or more which they suspect to be on account of sickness and it shall be the duty of the school nurse to investigate the cases of pupils who come by school bus and notify the bus drivers of any pupils who may not be allowed to enter the bus without a physician's certificate or without her permission.

Any child returning to school without a certificate after having been absent on account of sickness shall immediately be sent home by the teacher in charge and the matter reported to the School Nurse who will report to the Superintendent of Schools.

Previous to the passage of these rules there had been several wide-spread epidemics affecting the young children, especially. Below is a tabulation showing the percentages of attendance in various grade groups. It will be noticed that in 1934-1935—the first full school year after the rule was put in effect—the attendance of the youngest children was on a par with that of the children in the higher grades. Before that the percentages of attendance of the younger children was considerably less than that of the older children. Whether the improvement is simply a coincidence it is, of course, impossible to say, but I wish to take this opportunity to express my appreciation of the splendid cooperation of the parents, Miss Sandstrom, the teachers, and the bus drivers in helping to make the rules effective.

MANUAL TRAINING.

MR. STANLEY REPORTS:

"Both the seventh and eighth grades are larger in number than ever before,—two divisions are necessary in the seventh grade. These pupils are doing very creditable work,—the combination of interest, ability and cooperation makes rapid progress possible. Nearly every seventh grade boy has finished the first article and after one more has been completed and he has become more apt at handling tools, each one will be qualified to choose his next project.

The twenty-one boys in the eighth grade are showing good interest and with the limited time at their command, get excellent results. Among the projects being made this year by members of this class are end tables, skate sharpeners, bed-side tables, moulding board and book supports. It is a regrettable fact that these boys who exhibit such ability and interest in work of this kind have no opportunity to pursue it further during their high school course. However,

time has proved that seventh and eighth grade Manual Training is of practical benefit in later years.

I extend a cordial invitation to all who would like to do so to visit us at work on any Thursday and alternate Wednesday afternoons at the Knowlton School.

Also, at this time I wish to thank the people of Upton and particularly members of the School Committee for continual and indispensable support of Manual Training."

DRAWING.

MRS. STUART REPORTS:

"This year we are placing special emphasis on color harmony, a sound knowledge of which should lead to a wider use of beautiful colors in our homes, and in our dress. Fear of using the wrong color combinations, has been the cause of the uninteresting beige and taupe era in home furnishings, from which we are now timidly emerging.

"Surely there has been something wrong with our system of teaching art in the schools, for although it has taught us to see beauty, and to admire bright colors, it has not trained the average person how to use them to create beauty in their everyday surroundings. For instance, every year thousands of people travel miles to see the gorgeous splendor of the Mohawk trail in September, only to return and dress their homes, where so many hours are spent, in the cheerless garb of a gray November day. A colorless room is like the tuneless song of the monotone; but, a room with a pleasing color scheme is as harmonious to the eye as a symphony orchestra is to the ear.

"There are those who are born with a color sense, they cannot err in its use; incidentally, they cannot live happily without it. For those who have no color sense, there are charts and rules to follow, and there is the art department of the schools today, trying to give the girls and boys, our homemakers of tomorrow, a clearer understanding of color

harmony, so the world may be made more cheerful by using it freely and fearlessly.

"I wish to thank all who have given me their sincere co-operation in this work."

MUSIC.

We are fortunate in having the services of Amy Young Burns whose skill, resourcefulness and untiring energy I commend. Her report follows:

"These last few months in your schools have been very interesting musically. The children in all grades, and the High School too, are expressing a deeper interest and enthusiasm as well as intelligence in their music work. Development has been quite remarkable in many cases.

"In the primary grades special work with monotones, that is, children having difficulty in matching tones or singing a melody is being done in addition to the singing of rote songs, tone, and rhythm drills.

"Much progress is being made in the study of sight reading, ear training, and part singing in the intermediate grades.

"In the High School there is a steady improvement in sight singing, quality of tone production, and interpretation from great music masters.

"For all holidays in the few months I have been with you as your supervisor, we have taught special songs, and at Christmas time the programs consisted mostly of Christmas carols sung in unison and in parts.

"Your music supervisor wishes to express her deep appreciation for faithfulness shown by her co-workers, for the many courtesies extended her by pupils and teachers alike, and the support and help given by the superintendent, principals, and school committee."

HEALTH.

MISS SANDSTROM REPORTS:

"The clinic for discovery of childhood type of tuberculosis was held in February in grades seven, nine and eleven. It is necessary for each pupil to have their parents permission to take this test.

February 4. The skin test was given to 52 pupils.

February 7. The test was read and pupils having a positive test were given a physical examination and chest x-ray.

Acting upon the recommendation presented to the School Committee and Superintendent, French III and Latin III have been dropped from the High School Curriculum. These two courses have been replaced by Sociology and Economics both acceptable for college entrance credit. This change is one which was recommended by the Department of Education as a result of a study of the Small High School Curriculum.

Public Speaking has been added to the Curriculum. This course is given one period a week in English I, II, III, IV.

This year the school paper "The Uptonian" is again being published. Miss Martindale and Mr. Duprey are serving as faculty advisers for editing and publishing the paper. Two editions, "Thanksgiving," and "Christmas" numbers have been published so far. It is our aim to publish the paper monthly.

The benefits of the early graduation were far greater than anticipated. The ease of preparing for graduation and the terminating the business of the school year are in themselves worth the change. In past years graduation, final examinations, college examinations and other business of terminating the school year came at once. By the plan used last June, graduation was out of the way before the final examinations. I recommend that the same procedure be again followed this year.

The basket ball schedule is nearly completed. Both boys and girls teams have been practicing hard and we anticipate a successful season. Upton High School has again been invited to enter the Small High School Basket Ball Tournament to be held in Framingham March 4, 6, and 7.
