June 14, 1944






Pvt. GEORGE L. WOOD, Army

## TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

WARRANT FOR THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,  
FEBRUARY 7, 1944.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, SS.*To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of  
Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday the Seventh day of February, punctually, at Six o'clock forenoon, then and there to act on the following articles, to wit:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, Town Treasurer, three Selectmen, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, Road Commissioner, five Constables and Tree Warden, all for one year; one Cemetery Commissioner, one Assessor of Taxes, one member of Public Welfare Board, one member of School Committee, three Trustees of the Public Library, and Town Clerk, all for three years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at Eight o'clock P. M. on day of said meeting.

In accordance with Article 2, Section 1 of the By-Laws of the Town of Upton the remaining articles of this warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the Town to be held in Town Hall, Saturday afternoon, February 12, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers, and act thereon.

Article 3. To hear reports of any committees appointed by the town.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1944, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year, or act thereon.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the treasury, a sum of money for the purchase of War Bonds or other bonds that are legal investments for savings banks, in order to establish a postwar rehabilitation fund, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Acts of 1943.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Assessors of Taxes to use Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from unappropriated funds in the Town's Treasury in establishing the 1944 tax rate, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the purpose of foreclosing certain tax liens held by the Town, or do or act in any way relative thereto.

On motion by Henry E. Allard, duly seconded, it was voted without opposition, to waive the reading of all articles in the Warrant after Article 1 was read.

On motion by Chairman of Selectmen Earl G. Crockett, duly seconded, it was voted without opposition, to postpone action on Articles 2 to 13, inclusive, until Saturday, February 12, at 2 P. M.

Article 1. Raymond F. Lyford, Patrick J. Slattery, James F. Kearnan and Henry E. Allard, having been appointed by the Selectmen as election officers, with J. Harry Shears in charge of the ballot box, which was shown by the Town Clerk to be empty before balloting started.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots had been posted as the law directs. A wax-sealed package purporting to contain 1600 official ballots as received by the Town Clerk from printer was delivered to Messrs. Lyford and Slattery at the so-called check-in table.

The ballot box was locked with the indicator set at 0000. Keys to the ballot box were turned over to Mr. Shears, an appointed police officer.

The first ballot was cast by Chairman of Selectmen Crockett after the polls were declared open.

At hourly intervals during the voting hours, the ballot box indicator registered the following number of ballots cast (total): 7 A. M., 31 ballots; 8 A. M., 47; 9 A. M., 61; 10 A. M., 79; 11 A. Mrs. Helen Donham succeeded Mr. Lyford as ballot clerk at the check-in table. Mr. Lyford with James F. Gorman tabulated the vote. Acting Chief of Police Daniel H. Bates succeeded Mr. Shears at the ballot box at 4.45 P. M. and remained on duty to 8 P. M.

Check lists were compared by Messrs. Allard and Kearnan at the check-out table at the ballot box with the check-in list in charge of Mrs. Donham and Mr. Slattery. They reported 732 persons had voted, corresponding to the number of ballots that were removed from the ballot box for the tellers to canvass.

Ballots having been canvassed and tabulation completed, public declaration of the vote was made by Town Clerk Newton at 9.50 P. M.

PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL  
TOWN MEETING.

FEBRUARY 12, 1944.

About 50 voters were in attendance when Moderator Malcolm C. Temple called the adjourned annual town meeting

to order on the afternoon of February 12, 1944. The call of the meeting and constable's return had been read by the Town Clerk when the polls opened on election day, February 7, 1944. There was no opposition to waiving of the reading of the articles prior to being taken up for action.

As Article 1 had been disposed of February 7, 1944, Article 2 came before the voters for consideration.

#### 1943 TOWN REPORT.

Article 2. Merrill S. White motioned that the report of the town officers be accepted as printed and it was so voted.

#### SPECIAL COMMITTEE.

Article 3. Town Counsel Henry C. Walker made a report of progress for the special committee to revise the Town By-laws. (The committee comprises the Town Counsel and Selectmen.)

Mr. Walker's report:

"Although considerable material has been collected during the year for use in compiling a suggested revision of the town By-laws, a completed set is not as yet ready for presentation to the town.

Because of the fact that war and post-war days are bound to bring about a condition where many changes may be necessary as well as advisable, the committee recommends in the interest of economy that the present By-laws remain and that revision of a more permanent nature be made when post-war plans require it, if such a state can be hoped for reasonably soon."

Daniel H. Bates moved that the report be accepted as one of progress and so voted.

## BORROWING MONEY.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Selectman Charles R. Stuart that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1944, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. There was no opposition.

In motions for appropriations for Chapter 81 and Chapter 90 Maintenance (Highway Department), Selectman Earl G. Crockett stated that said appropriations to be used with any monies received from the State or County, or both.

**Fire Department:** Merrill S. White, member of the Upton Boy Scout Troop committee, announced the gift of Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) by the local Boy Scout Troop to the Town for the purchase of an inhalator. He added, that if the amount was insufficient to obtain a suitable inhalator, the Boy Scout Troop committee wished to be advised as it is the intention of the Troop to pay full cost of an inhalator.

Mr. White's motion was "That the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Eleven Hundred Dollars (\$1100.00) for the Fire Department, and accept the gift of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$250.00) from Upton Boy Scout Troop 132 for the purchase of an inhalator to be used for the benefit of the inhabitants under the supervision and direction of the Fire Department." It was so voted. Town Clerk George G. Newton suggested a rising vote of thanks to the Upton Boy Scout Troup which was favorably acted upon.

Schools: School Committeeman Fred W. Wood moved for an appropriation of \$30,000.00. School Committeeman Frank O. Ogden explained that it was the intention of the School Committee to use the income from the Ella Whitney Risteen estate and other funds designated for schools as nucleus of a special fund to be expended at a future date to repair school buildings instead of using it for general educational purposes during the fiscal year. He added, that terms of the Risteen Will provide that expenditure of the interest of the bequests for schools be determined by Supt. of Schools, School Committee, and teachers. Mr. Ogden stated that the School Committee had a paper signed by the teachers favoring the establishing of a special fund for school building repairs. Others speaking on the motion were: Harold S. Hopkins and Gordon E. Benson, of the Finance Committee; Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy, Town Counsel Henry C. Walker, Acting Chief of Police Daniel H. Bates and Merrill S. White.

Street Lights: William R. Summers motioned that \$3,462.50 be appropriated for street lighting in order to have all-night lighting service. The Finance Committee's report recommended an appropriation of \$3,020.52 which would include turning on the lights at 5 A. M., War-time, until one-half hour before sunrise. Mr. Summers' motion was favorably acted upon. (Worcester Suburban Electric Co. furnished all-night lighting during December and January to February 12, 1944 at no extra cost to the town.)

**WAR BOND.**

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Selectman Charles R. Stuart that the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) from available funds in the Town's treasury, be used for the purchase of War Bonds or other bonds that are legal investments for savings banks, in order to establish a post-war rehabilitation fund, in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Acts of 1943.

**ESTABLISHING 1944 TAX RATE.**

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Selectman Alexander Kennedy to instruct the Assessors of Taxes to use Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) from unappropriated funds in the Town's Treasury in establishing the 1944 tax rate.

**TAX LIENS.**

Article 8. Voted: on motion of Selectman Charles R. Stuart to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) for the purpose of foreclosing certain tax liens.

**WATER-HOLES.**

Article 12. Voted: on motion of Selectman Charles R. Stuart to raise and appropriate the sum of Seventy-five Dollars (\$75.00) for the purchase of materials and maintenance expenses that may be incurred by Local Rationing Board 307.

**FOREST FIRE HOSE.**

Article 13. Voted: on motion of Forest Fire Warden Walter J. Stank to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Sixty-six Dollars (\$266.00) for the purchase of new hose for Forest Fire Warden's Department.

A total of \$87,827.67 was appropriated to be raised by taxation under Article 5. In addition, \$6,141.00 was appropriated by special articles—\$1,141.00 by taxation and \$5,000.00 from available funds in the treasury,—making total appropriations of \$93,968.67. This total is exclusive of \$10,000.00 from unappropriated funds in the Town's Treasury to be used in establishing the 1944 tax rate.

###### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Shall an amendment to the constitution to provide for a Fair, Concise Summary, instead of a Description, of Each Proposed Amendment to the Constitution and Each Law submitted to the People, under the Initiative and the Referendum, and Certain Changes relative to the Filing of Initiative Petitions which is further described as follows:—

This amendment amends Article XLVIII of the Amendments to the Constitution by striking out section three under the heading "The Initiative. II. Initiative Petitions" and inserting in place thereof a new section which provides,—

That an initiative petition for a constitutional amendment or a law shall first be signed by ten qualified voters of the Commonwealth and shall be submitted to the Attorney General not later than the first Wednesday of August before the assembling of the General Court into which it is to be introduced. It may be filed with the Secretary of the Commonwealth if the Attorney General shall certify that the measure and its title are in proper form and that it is not, affirmatively or negatively, substantially the same as any measure which has been qualified for submission or submitted to the people at either of the two preceding biennial state elections, and that it contains only subjects not excluded from the popular initiative and which are related or which are mutually dependent.

The Secretary shall provide blanks for the use of subsequent signers. He shall print at the top of each blank a fair, concise summary of the proposed measure, as determined by the Attorney General as it will appear upon the ballot together with the

names and residences of the first ten signers. All such petitions, with the first ten signatures attached, shall be filed with the Secretary not earlier than the first Wednesday of the September before the assembling of the Legislature into which they are to be introduced, and the remainder of the required signatures shall be filed not later than the first Wednesday of the following December.

Section 3 of that part of said Article XLVIII under the heading "The Referendum. III. Referendum Petitions.", is also amended by striking out the second sentence of such section and inserting in place thereof provisions that the Secretary shall provide blanks for the use of signers of a referendum petition on a law requesting that the operation of such law be suspended subsequent to the first ten signers and shall print at the top of each blank a fair, concise summary of the proposed law as determined by the Attorney General as it will appear upon the ballot, together with the names and residences of the first ten signers.

Section 4 of that part of said Article XLVIII under the heading "The Referendum. III. Referendum petitions.", is also amended by striking out the third sentence of such section and inserting in place thereof provisions that the Secretary shall provide blanks for the use of signers subsequent to the first ten signers of a referendum petition asking for the repeal of an emergency law or of a law which takes effect because the referendum petition does not contain a request for suspension, and shall print at the top of each blank a fair, concise summary of the proposed law as such summary will appear on the ballot together with the names and residences of the first ten signers.

Article XLVIII is further amended by striking out subheading "III. Form of Ballot" and subheading "IV. Information for Voters" under the heading "General Provisions" and inserting in place thereof new subheadings III and IV, which provide, respectively:

### III. FORM OF BALLOT.

A fair, concise summary of each proposed amendment to the Constitution and each law submitted to the people, as determined by the Attorney General shall be printed on the ballot. The Secretary shall give each question a number and cause such question, except as otherwise authorized in said article of amendment, to be printed on the ballot in the following form:

In the case of an amendment to the Constitution: Do you approve of the adoption of an amendment to the Constitution

summarized below, (here state, in distinctive type, whether approved or disapproved by the general court, and by what vote thereon)? Yes.—No.

which proposed amendment was approved by the General Court and in a joint session of the two branches held July 8, 1941, received 201 votes in the affirmative and 2 in the negative, and in a joint session of the two branches held May 12, 1943, received 214 votes in the affirmative and 5 in the negative, — be approved?

#### QUESTION NO. 2.

##### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION.

Shall an amendment to the Constitution to provide that the General Court may prescribe the terms and conditions under which pardons of offences which are felonies may be granted which is further described as follows:—

This article of amendment to the Constitution of Massachusetts annuls Article VIII of section 1 of chapter II of Part the Second of the Constitution, which vested the Governor, by and with the advice of the Council, with the full and unrestricted power of pardoning offences of which a person is convicted, except such as persons may be convicted of before the Senate by an impeachment of the House, and adopts a new Article VIII in place thereof.

This new Article VIII vests the pardoning power in the Governor, by and with the advice of the Council, but provides further that if the offence to be pardoned is a felony the Legis-

lature shall have power to prescribe the terms and conditions upon which a pardon may be granted.

The new Article VIII contains the same provision as the old with relation to the ineffectiveness of pardons granted before a conviction,—

PROCEEDINGS OF STATE ELECTION,

NOVEMBER 7, 1944.

*Worcester, SS.*

Pursuant to the foregoing warrant, the legal voters of the Town of Upton met in their Town Hall, on Tuesday, the Seventh Day of November, A. D. 1944, punctually at Seven o'clock A. M.

The meeting was called to order by Moderator Malcolm C. Temple. The warrant and Constable's return was read by the Town Clerk.

The specimen ballots and cards of instruction having been posted as the law directs, the ballot box was shown to the voters present to be empty with the register having been set at 0000. The ballot box was locked and the keys delivered to Police Officer J. Harry Shears, who was in charge of the ballot box.

Raymond F. Lyford (R) and James F. Kearnan (D), ballot clerks, and Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R) and Mrs. Ann E. Bingel (D) as checkers took oath before the Town Clerk to faithfully perform their duty at the polls.

Two boxes purporting to contain a total of 1638 ballots which had been received by the Town Clerk from the Secretary of State were delivered to Messrs. Lyford and Kearnan.

The polls were declared open at Seven o'clock A. M.

Representative Earl G. Crockett motioned that the polls close at 8 P. M., seconded by Merrill S. White, and so voted.

Merrill S. White was the first voter to cast a ballot. Miss Ellen N. Aldrich was the first woman voter.

Harry C. Snow (R) and Mrs. Mary I. Kirby (D) tabulated the vote.

At 4 P. M. the jurats containing State War Ballots received from Servicemen and women were inspected by Mr. Kearnan and Mrs. Kirby representing the Democratic party, Mr. Snow and Town Clerk Newton, representing the Republican party. Fifty-two had been received of 93 requested by voter or through kindred. All were approved.

At 8 P. M. the polls were declared closed by Moderator Temple. Reading of the ballot box was 1083 at this hour. A total of 1083 ballots had been cast by voters in person. These

Leo F. Murphy representing the Democratic party and Town Clerk Newton representing the Republican party, then opened the jurats of Servicemen and women and the latter cast said ballots totaling 52, bringing grand total to 1135. These ballots were then removed from the ballot box for counting.

Messrs. Murphy and Newton next inspected jurats of civilian absentee ballots. Thirty-two (32) civilian absentee ballots were cast. Two were rejected as jurats were defective. Total ballots cast 1167. These ballots were removed from ballot box.

Two Federal War Ballots had been received by the Town Clerk. One was rejected as it was submitted by non-registered voter serviceman. In accordance with regulations only registered servicemen and women were entitled to use of Federal War Ballots.

With one Federal War Ballot, it brought the grand total of ballots deposited in ballot box to 1168.

Hourly reading of the ballot box from 7 A. M. to 8 P. M. was as follows: 8 A. M., 53 ballots; 9 A. M., 100; 10 A. M., 149; 11 A. M., 225; 12 noon, 321; 1 P. M., 412; 2 P. M., 481; 3 P. M., 560; 4 P. M., 630; 5 P. M., 713; 6 P. M., 863; 7 P. M., 990, and 8 P. M., 1083.

Of the total of 1168 ballots cast (1083 civilian voters in person, 52 State War Ballots by servicemen and women—43 registered and nine registered by card or kindred—, 32 absentee civilian voters, and one Federal War Ballot), 593 were cast by women and 575 by men voters.

Check lists at ballot table and at ballot box were checked by Messrs. Lyford, Kearnan, Mesdames Crooker and Bingel and agreed.

Results were announced by the town clerk at 1.10 A. M. (November 8) upon completion of tabulation, as follows:

RECOUNT FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

DECEMBER 7, 1944.

By order of Frederic W. Cook, Secretary of the Commonwealth, on a petition filed at his office in the interest of Francis E. Certificates of Power of Attorney for the recount were filed by Merrill S. White from Mr. Barnes and Michael Shaughnessy from Mr. Kelly with Town Clerk George G. Newton, clerk of the Registrars of Voters, prior to start of the recount.

Certificates as watchers of the recount for Mr. Barnes were filed for Peter Robson, Clarence E. Forsberg, Chester W. Walker, Gordon E. Benson and Newton J. Frost; for Mr. Kelly by Eliza Shaughnessy, Grace Murphy and Anna Bingel.

Tellers named to represent the Registrars of Voters in recanvassing the votes for Attorney General were sworn to perform their duty by Town Clerk Newton. They were: Raymond F. Lyford (R), James F. Kearnan (D), Harry C. Snow (R), Leo F. Murphy (D), Helen A. Fay (R) and Mary I. Kirby (D). Three tables were used at the recount. Acting Chief of Police Daniel H. Bates and the four Registrars of Voters were in attendance.

Result of the recount: In Block No. 13, Mr. Barnes gained one vote and Mr. Kelly lost one vote compared with the original count made November 7, 1944. No vote was protested.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the general accounts of the town of Upton for the period from June 1, 1941, the date of the previous audit, to May 20, 1944, and of the tax collector's accounts from February 18, 1943, the date of the last audit of his accounts, to May 20, 1944, and report thereon as follows:

The records of financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town, or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked.

The appropriations and transfers voted by the town were listed from the town clerk's records and were checked with the treasurer's appropriation accounts. General ledger accounts were compiled, and a balance sheet, showing the financial condition of the town as of May 20, 1944, was prepared and is appended to this report.

Attention is again called to the fact that expenditures for highway projects carried on by the town in conjunction with the State and County may not exceed the aggregate amount of the appropriations voted by the town, together with the amounts actually received on account of allotments.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The receipts, as recorded, were analyzed and compared with the departmental records of payments to the treasurer and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The payments were checked with the selectmen's orders authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds.

An account representing the proceeds of the sale of the town infirmary for \$4,500. has been set up, which amount is reserved in accordance with Section 63, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The cash balance on May 20, 1944, was proved by actual count of the cash in the office and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer were examined and listed. The income was proved and the disbursements were verified.

The income from the Ella W. Risteen Fund, the first installment of which was received by the town in January, 1944, is to be used for three different purposes designated in the be-

quest and a separate account should be kept for each one of these.

The records of tax titles held by the town were examined. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's records, the recorded redemptions were checked with the receipts as shown on the treasurer's cash book, and the tax titles were listed, proved, and checked with the records in the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the two tax collectors in office since the audit of the previous collector's accounts dated February 18, 1948, were examined and checked. The re-committed tax and assessment accounts were audited and all subsequent commitments were verified and compared with the assessors' warrants for their collection. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer, the recorded abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the taxes transferred to the tax title account were compared with the treasurer's records, and the outstanding accounts were listed and proved.

The outstanding accounts were verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The town clerk's records of sporting and dog licenses issued were examined, the payments to the State being verified by comparison with the receipts on file and the payments to the town treasurer being compared with the treasurer's cash book.

The accounts of the public welfare, school, and cemetery departments, as well as of all other departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and reconciled with the treasurer's books.

Receipts of the manual training department which are turned over by the manual training teacher to the superin-

tendent of schools, should be paid over to the town treasurer as required by Section 53, Chapter 44, General Laws.

The surety bonds of the various town officials required to file them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the balance sheet referred to, there are appended to this report tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the collector's cash, together with summaries of the tax, assessment, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the trust and investment fund transactions.

For the cooperation extended by the various town officials during the progress of the audit, I wish, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, to express appreciation.

#### TOWN TREASURER'S STATEMENT.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, \$8.88 known as the Knowlton School Fund with the Town Treasurer as Trustee to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School Building.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees, the income to be divided between the two pupils in our public schools who make the most progress during each year. \$20.10 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, one thousand dollars (\$1000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund, the income of which is to be used for the Public Library. \$20.10 was received this year.

Charlotte A. Batchelor and George W. Knowlton established a Trust Deed at the Worcester County Trust Co., with the Bank as trustee, the income to be paid to the Town of Upton for use of Public Schools. \$208.79 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as trustee, the income to be used for the Public Library. \$100.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor School Fund in trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, the income to be used for the Public Schools. \$50.00 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank a War Bonus Surplus Fund to be used as a nucleus of a Fund for a Public Library Building as voted by the Town, February 7, 1925. \$61.64 Interest was received and the amount of this fund on January 1, 1945 is \$3,128.69.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank of Milford, five thousand dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Board of Selectmen, to be used to help the townspeople who are in distress. \$111.05 Interest was received and the balance January 1, 1945 is \$5,636.55.

There is deposited in the Worcester Five Cent Savings Bank, \$203.78 known as the "Town of Upton Memorial Fund." The bank records show this Fund was established by the late Velorus Taft many years ago, but do not state for what purpose this money may be used.

The Industrial Accident Insurance Fund established in 1937 is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank. \$43.84 Interest was received and \$164.00 was withdrawn to cover Pay Rolls as shown in Selectmen's Report. Balance on January 1, 1945, \$2,061.14. Payment from this Fund is to be made only in accordance with rules to be established by the Board of Selectmen. No appropriation was made this year.

## REPORT OF TOWN COUNSEL.

December 31, 1944.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, TOWN OF UPTON:

As Counsel for the Town of Upton, I submit my fifth annual report.

At the request of the Selectmen I attended the regular and special meetings of the Selectmen during the year, and was requested to render opinions and assistance in fifty-five instances from various Town Officials and departments, not including conferences in connection with matters specifically covered in this report.

Pending in the Land Court because of military disability of a party respondent is the case of Upton vs. Case.

One criminal case was prosecuted under Chapter 266, at the request of the Police Department, which resulted in a finding of guilty at the Milford District Court.

Two deeds of redemption were drawn.

One release was drawn and executed.

Six instruments of taking were examined and recorded.

The Glenwood Manufacturing Company tax title foreclosure property was sold for \$350.00 and a deed drawn covering the same.

The Roy E. Mills tax title foreclosure property was sold for \$280.00 and a deed drawn covering the same.

Public hearing was held on the transfer of a package store liquor license, two public hearings were held on renewal applications for package store licenses, and one public hearing on an application for all alcoholic beverage license to be drunk on the premises was held during 1944; the latter having been denied was appealed to the Alcoholic Beverage Commission at Boston.

The following tax titles were started toward foreclosure under the recent statute relating to Lands of Low Value, and

are now pending, awaiting adjustment by interested parties or ultimate foreclosure vesting the rights in the town:

Upton vs Bowker

Conferences were held with the Tax Commissioner relative to the 1944 tax rate which resulted in a satisfactory adjustment.

#### ELLA W. RISTEEN TRUST.

Conferences were held with town officials relative to recommendations of the Hartford-Connecticut Trust Company for investment of trust funds. The trustee has control and discretion in the matter as distinguished from control or supervision of the town. A certificate of completion of settlement of the estate was received and a further payment of \$935.81 was made by the Executor to the Trustees. The trust was established on December 27, 1943, and the total value of the fund as of December 20, 1944 is \$75,205.00.

I am glad to have had this opportunity to be of service to the town and am grateful for the cooperation and assistance of town officials and departments.

## TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE UPTON LIBRARY:—

The Librarian herewith submits the annual library report together with library statistics, list of periodicals and the catalog of new books.

Books have been purchased and added to the Dr. Carpenter Alcove as required.

The circulation statistics for the past year show an increase of 1,308 over the figure for 1943. It is interesting to note that the largest gain was in the number of children's books, with periodicals a close second. More books of non-fiction also were circulated,—a slight decrease in fiction.



## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

January 1, 1945.

### TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE:

I herewith submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of the Upton Schools together with the usual statistical data and supplemented by the reports of my colleagues.

### COMMITTEE.

At the annual town meeting Mr. Frank O. Ogden ran unopposed for re-election. The committee then organized with Mr. Fred W. Wood as chairman and Mr. Frank O. Ogden as secretary.

### ENROLLMENT.

Our total enrollment at the opening of school in September was 385, the same as last year. Our elementary grades continue to remain large. In fact, the sixth and seventh grades were each too large for one class, so we had to split them into two sections each. This meant that we had to provide another classroom and teacher. Manual Training was moved to the basement of the Ball School, and a new classroom was opened in the Knowlton building for part of the fifth and sixth grades. Mrs. Goodrich was transferred from the high school building to take charge of the new room. Miss Roche was engaged to teach two sections of the sixth and seventh grades in the high school. This arrangement gave us the following set-up in the elementary grades at the Knowlton Building:

## BUDGET.

At the annual town meeting the lump sum of \$30,000.00 was voted for the support of the public schools of Upton with the understanding that the dog tax together with the income from the several school endowment funds should be set aside until the accumulated sum was large enough to make a major repair to the high school building.

## SPELLING.

For several years we have been studying the problem of how to make the teaching of spelling in our schools more interesting and more effective. We examined a large number of methods and materials without finding any satisfactory psychological approach, but felt that our search was finally rewarded. The following is a brief discussion of the system which we decided to adopt, and have this year put into practice.

Recent research in spelling tends to show that one of the reasons for spelling failures would seem to be the grade level at which a word is introduced. For many years words have been taught according to difficulty rather than according to use. If a child in the third grade needs to use a word which he has not been taught how to spell, he may begin by misspelling it. To eradicate this misspelling is harder than to

teach an entirely new word. Now, on the contrary, if a child is taught a word and does not use that word, it soon fades from his spelling vocabulary, and the teaching has been futile.

If the children are given words when they would normally be using them in either their school work or outside activities, they get the chance through the use of these words to master them. Words taught in just word list form would accomplish this objective, but it seemed advisable to select a spelling book which introduced each word in a meaningful paragraph made up of materials that occur in the curriculum of the grade, or of incidents of interest to children at the particular grade level. Children reading the words in a meaningful context are shown just how the words are used. This means that the child has a good chance to carry this word over into his own vocabulary.

In past years, spellers have lacked the research to narrow down the vocabulary list. Consequently, the older spellers have caused the children to attempt to master many words that never were used. By taking advantage of recent research, the new speller which we have adopted has been able to cut down the number of words to be taught to essential ones, and thus makes the spelling task one that can be accomplished.

In building this new series the authors started with ten thousand words. A card was made out for each word. On this card was then recorded the grade placement accorded this word by the various research specialists in the spelling field. For instance, the word "dress" was on one card. It was checked against the Gates List (a reading list showing frequency of use by grade children), the Coleman List (an investigation of 113,707 running words), the Breed List (an investigation of 1,000,000 running words), the Wise List (a list of 1102 words and their grade placement in twenty spellers), the Von Struve List (a tabulation of the errors on 88,072 spelling papers), the Fitzgerald List (the commonest

words occurring in 3184 letters of fourth, fifth, and sixth grade children), the McKee List (Children's Writing Vocabulary, one of the most extensive studies yet made), the Rinsland List (based on over 6,000,000 running words and over 100,000 separate compositions or letters of children inside and outside school), the Crawford List (study of words misspelled by seventh and eighth grade children), the Hanna List (a list based on children's interests), the Smith List (238,654 running words from pupils' daily papers), and the Rogers List (from the Chicago List). The word "dress" appeared on nine of these lists and the average grade placement was found to be grade two. Consequently, the word "dress" was put in the twenty-third week of grade two. From ten thousand words the list was narrowed down to three thousand.

Spelling methods have varied during the past few years. Some schools have believed that a child should be tested on a group of words, and then be drilled on the words that he has missed. While this method has been economical of time, its use has not been advocated in our schools for several reasons. If a child has been trained to help himself in spelling through knowing root words and principles of phonetics and he conscientiously reasons out the spelling of a word, and—due to the vagaries of our English language—that spelling is wrong, that reasoned initial impression is harder to get rid of than teaching the word would have been in the first place. This method of testing first does not lend itself well to using the words in paragraphs, and so meaning also suffers.

"The Day By Day Speller" has recognized that testing as soon as possible is economical of time and incorporates a modification of it into its lesson plan. It is set up on a weekly basis.

On Monday, the children read a paragraph that contains the words for the week, all used in a meaningful situation. The children find these words in the paragraph to make for more meaning. Each child pronounces each spelling word

correctly—he is asked to use the spelling dictionary in the back of the book for help in both pronunciation and meaning. This spelling dictionary defines and uses the words, and uses the same diacritical markings that are found in the Webster's International Dictionary. Each child also copies the spelling words on Monday.

On Tuesday, the spelling period is devoted to word study. This study teaches rules, points out phonetic elements, stresses parts of words that may give difficulty, and in other ways tries to insure a mastery of the word. All of this work on Monday and Tuesday precedes any testing.

On Wednesday, the first test of the week is given. This test is for the purpose of weeding out the words that pupil knows and to focus attention on any that are misspelled.

On Thursday, the pupil studies any word missed on Wednesday's test. He studies any words that he may have missed on the final test of the previous week. There are further study activities in the speller that will help him with the week's lesson and will help him carry over the spelling of each word to the spelling of others that may use the same root or rule or phonetic principle. At this time the pupil also studies any words that he may have misspelled in his regular class-work in subjects other than spelling.

On Friday, the pupil has a final test. Any misspelled words are recorded for further study the next week. These words are tested by having a spelling partner pronounce them and the pupil write them immediately after the teacher has given the regular Friday test. In this way any words that give trouble can be carried week after week until finally mastered.

Every sixth week is a review week and the pupil is tested on the previous five weeks' work. Any words missed in those review lessons are carried into the next week for

further study. This constant stress and further study mean mastery of the spelling vocabulary.

#### FACULTY CHANGES.

In June, Miss Alice H. Anderberg, the high school commercial teacher, resigned to enter business.

In September, Miss Madeline Canarie, a graduate of Regis College was elected to succeed Miss Anderberg.

In June, Miss Elsie Marin, the high school social science teacher, resigned and accepted a position in the Spaulding High School at Townsend.

Miss Rachel Cronin, a graduate of New Rochelle College, was elected to succeed Miss Marin.

In June, Miss Margaret M. McCarthy, teacher of Grade I at the Ball School, resigned to accept a better paying position nearer home at Brockton.

Miss Barbara McNamara, a teacher in Becket, was elected to succeed Miss McCarthy.

In August, Miss Mary O'Neil, the high school foreign language teacher, resigned to accept a better paying position in Franklin.

In September, Miss Louise Butler, a graduate of Emmanuel College, was elected to succeed Miss O'Neil.

In October, Miss Marion Roche, a graduate of Bridgewater Teachers College, was elected to replace Mrs. Goodrich who had been transferred to the new room in the Knowlton building.

## REPAIRS.

The following repairs have been made during the year:  
Ball School:


1. Bulletin boards were installed in each room.
2. Glass was installed in the front doors.
3. The new manual training room was painted and fluorescent lights were installed.

Knowlton School:

1. A new toilet was installed in the teachers' room.
2. All new water pipes have been installed. The two new sinks, with drinking fountains, will be installed to complete the work as soon as they arrive.
3. The furnaces were overhauled. Two of them required twenty-one pounds of putty to fill up the cracks. The third one had to have a new heating cap built for it.
4. All new smoke pipes were installed.
5. The playground was partially filled in and rolled with ashes from the Knowlton Company.
6. A fourth classroom was fitted out with used furniture.

High School:

1. The principal's office was moved to the first floor into a newly painted room with ample bulletin board space and fluorescent lighting.
2. New furniture, including a large desk, was put in the principal's room.
3. The typewriting room was rearranged and painted. New slate, a closet, and bulletin boards were installed.
4. A new deep well water pump was installed to replace the old shallow well pump in the 125-foot artesian well.
5. The outside wall in the main room was insulated and re-sheathed.

## THE FIRE.

About 5.00 A. M. on the morning of December 21, 1944, a passerby discovered flames shooting through the windows of the west side of the Upton High School building. Lack of hydrant service hampered the local fire department although they were aided by companies from Hopedale and one from the Westboro Fire Department. In a short time three walls and the chimney were all that were left standing of this historical old building. All the equipment including furniture, books, paper, supplies, and records was also lost. Fortunately all existing records prior to those of the class of 1944 were stored in the fireproof vault in Grafton, where they have been collected and assembled by the superintendent during the past five years.

The high school was a two and one-half story brick building with a slate roof. It was built in 1897 at a cost of about \$20,000.00. Three years ago the basement was remodelled and a complete new heating system installed, together with new toilets, washbowls, and drinking fountains. The interior was arranged as follows:

In the basement were the boiler room, toilets, kitchen, and cafeteria.

On the first floor were the teachers' room, principal's office and two classrooms.

On the second floor were the assembly hall, typewriting room, and one classroom.

In the attic there were a combination laboratory-classroom, one classroom, and a room used for the storage of supplies together with the equipment for the Uptonite staff.

As all schools in Upton closed the day after the fire for a ten-day Christmas vacation, no time was lost in locating temporary quarters for the school. Through the consent and fine co-operation of the library trustees and the selectmen

we were given permission to use the town hall and the library which we have arranged as follows:

The library is to be used as a classroom for English.

The small hall is to be subdivided into four classrooms.

The state guard room is to be used as a chemistry laboratory and classroom.

The main hall is to be used for assemblies and basketball.

Through the generous co-operation of our neighboring towns we were able to borrow necessary supplies, slate blackboards, and school furniture.

New books have been purchased with the various book companies standing from 30% to 50% of the cost of the new books.

School will open as scheduled on January 2nd, 1945.

It is earnestly hoped that the townspeople will lose no time in replacing this high school building with a modern one containing ample classroom space and providing for a gymnasium, auditorium, administration offices, health, domestic science room, art room, music room, manual training room, and a cafeteria. The building should be as near fire proof as possible. A sprinkler system should be installed for better fire protection.

Through the courtesy of Mr. George G. Newton, our local Worcester newspaper reporter, we have been able to insert the following cuts that should be of great interest to all.

1. The high school before the fire.
2. The building being destroyed by the fire.
3. The remains of the building after the fire.
4. The Town Hall where the high school will be temporarily located.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the playground at the Knowlton School be filled in and graded until it is above the street level.
2. That we tar our walks and drives at the Knowlton and Ball Schools.
3. That we continue our painting program if possible.
4. That we rebuild the high school as soon as possible.

## CONCLUSION.

In concluding this report, I wish to express my appreciation to the committee and to all who have co-operated in overcoming the difficulties of this wartime year.

## REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR.

I herewith submit my report as Supervisor of Music in the schools of Upton.

The appreciation of music is the goal of all musical activities in the public schools. One of the best methods of fostering this appreciation is through performance.

The foundation of music: Tone, Time, and Rhythm, is taught in the lower grades through art and rote songs. Sight reading is then developed through the singing of simple melodies. Two-part singing begins in the fourth grade. Three-part singing is introduced in the sixth grade and advanced in the Junior High.

Weekly visits to each class makes possible the personal contact between supervisor and pupils which is invaluable in the teaching of this subject.

This year a newly organized tonette orchestra rehearses once each week, and I am pleased to report favorable progress. This orchestra is composed of fifth and sixth grade students. The pupils show much enthusiasm over this type of work. It is something new and different and puts new life into the music hour.

In the Senior High School music is not compulsory. One period a week is given so that all students who desire to sing may have an opportunity in group singing, which has become so popular since the war.

The students from each grade throughout the school system furnish music for the Memorial Exercises given at the Town Hall.

In June the annual Music Festival was given. I am happy to report again that this Festival was a great success socially and financially. The enjoyment and benefits which the children derive from such an undertaking certainly make it worthwhile. Once more I want to thank the townspeople for their loyal support.

The co-operative attitude of the superintendent, school board, principals, and teachers is recognized and gratefully acknowledged.

#### REPORT OF THE MANUAL TRAINING SUPERVISOR.

I herewith submit the following report of the Manual Training Department in the Town of Upton.

Manual Training in this town is presented to the seventh and eighth grades. The work in the seventh grade is naturally very elementary since the majority of the boys have never used tools and those who have, need to forget the methods

they have acquired and learn the correct procedure. These boys learn in making the simple things, the methods and thus, in the eighth grade they can construct a piece of furniture. The seventh grade has Manual Training every other Wednesday afternoon.

The eighth grade usually make a piece of furniture. It is generally a small bookcase, magazine rack, lamp, smoking stand or end table. These involve the use of mortise and tenon joints and are strongly made of good lumber such as gum wood, which is purchased by the parents of the pupils, or the pupils themselves. We generally purchase lumber once in three years and the town receives back over the next three-year period the amount expended. Cheap lumber is never used in nice furniture. The reason should be obvious.

The boys use four coats of varnish on their project. They also rub their piece of furniture down with pumice and linseed oil to a beautiful polish giving it a professional finish. This work is done entirely by the boys themselves.

This year our pieces of furniture will have to be simpler for two reasons: First, and the greatest, is that the school department neglected to order any of the lumber I asked for last spring and because of this, we have only the culls that are left after three years of sorting; these are generally used up in making the small things constructed in the seventh grade and are not fit for furniture. Second, we have lost much time by the shifting of our room to the Ball School. The boys of the eighth grade installed the benches, made shelves and fastened the hooks for their coats and hats to the cement wall with lag screws and lead sleeves. This took time, but proved that these boys can also do other practical things as well as build furniture. This course is given to the eighth grade every Thursday afternoon.

The Parent-Teachers Association have through their efforts seen to it that our room is much better than it otherwise would have been. The ceiling still needs whitening and

some pipes should be uncovered to give more heat, but this will probably be taken care of before this report goes to press.\*

I wish to thank all who have showed an interest in this course and who have worked so earnestly and efficiently to retain it in our schools.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE.

I hereby submit the following report as School Nurse for the Upton Schools for 1944.

The routine work of weighing, measuring, testing eyes and hearing, checking absentees, and special individual inspections, has been carried on throughout the year. First aid given to pupils injured in school or on way to school and if necessary, carried home and advice given for further treatment.

Home visits are made to consult with parents over health problems, corrections of defects and checking reasons for continual and frequent absence from school.

Dr. Capen has completed the health examination and found less defects this year. Pupils in the Knowlton and Geo. S. Ball Schools were given a thorough examination of their feet by Dr. Capen.

Pupils in all schools have had their hearing tested by the audiometer. Mr. Barclay was able to secure the use of the audiometer from the State Department of Public Health and operated by the nurse.

The teachers conduct a daily class-room inspection and any symptoms found are referred for diagnosis. These inspections help in controlling diseases and maintaining better health.

Through the sale of Christmas Seals we were able to send one girl to the Sterling Health Camp for eight weeks. She gained in weight and health and enjoyed camp life.

I wish to thank all who have co-operated in any way to help promote better health in our schools.

The curriculum in the High School is the same as in the past years with the alternate subjects Latin I, French II, and Chemistry taking the place of Latin II, French I, and Physics. A short course in Trigonometry has been given this year for two boys who expressed a desire for it.


In the seventh and eighth grades, the curriculum is the same as that of last year, with the exception of Art, which has been dropped. Some worth-while subject should be added to this curriculum another year to occupy the pupils in these grades, because they have a surplus of free time after lunch.

The school is indebted to Joseph Kearnan for his enthusiastic and able coaching of the boys' basketball and baseball teams. After a lapse, girls' basketball was revived under the direction of Miss Mango. Athletics are an important part of school and should be encouraged and planned for in any school system.

An effort was made last year to start a Student Council, and, although not very successful, has been continued this year in the hope that the pupils will assume more responsibility in promoting and controlling school activities.

A small group of pupils made a fine start this fall in publishing a school paper. This is a commendable school activity and should be given every help and encouragement.

Leland Sanders enlisted in the Navy.

Upton High School still has a Class A rating from the State Board of Education.

The magazine drive, conducted this fall, was very successful and increased the funds held by the Athletic Association for the purchase, after the war, of something useful to the school as a whole.

In the Junior Red Cross membership drive there was a 90 per cent enrollment. During the year, 10 pounds of junk jewelry, ditty bags, gift boxes and cups, decorated in the Art Class, were sent to the Red Cross Headquarters in Worcester.

The pupils who bring their lunch have been using the cafeteria room at noon. This has proven much more satisfactory than a class room, however, a few more chairs are needed to seat all pupils.
