
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

TOWN CLERK'S REPORT.

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
FEBRUARY 7, 1949.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, SS.*To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of
Worcester. Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the Town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Seventh day of February, punctually, at Seven o'clock A. M., then and there to act on the following articles:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, Town Treasurer, three Selectmen, Collector of Taxes, Auditor, five Constables, Road Commissioner and Tree Warden, all for one year; one Assessor of Taxes, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, one Cemetery Commissioner and three Trustees of Public Library, all for three years; one Trustee of Public Library for two years to fill vacancy, and four members of the Housing Authority, candidate receiving highest number of votes to be elected for five years, second highest number of votes for four years, third highest number of votes for two years, and fourth highest number of votes for one year.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at 8 o'clock P. M. on the day of said meeting.

In accordance with Article 2, Section 1 of the By-laws of the Town of Upton, as amended, the remaining articles contained in the warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of the voters in Town Hall, Saturday afternoon, February 12, 1949, at two o'clock.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all town officers and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear reports of any committees appointed by the town, and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To hear a further report of the special Upton Memorial High School Building Committee, and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108 of Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Tax Collector, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Auditor, Cemetery Commissioners, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Road Commissioner and Tree Warden, and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue

of the financial year beginning January 1, 1949, and to issue a note or notes therefore, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 41, Section 97A, General Laws of Massachusetts, as most recently amended, establishing a Police Department under the supervision of an officer to be known as Chief of Police, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint one of its members as Chief of Police or Acting Chief of Police, and to establish a salary to be taken from the Police Appropriation for such appointee in accordance with the provisions of General Laws, Chapter 41, Section 4A, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more Constables for the town, thus eliminating the annual election of Constables, in accordance with Section 1, Chapter 41, General Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell and dispose of the Building known as Snow Grist Mill and its contents, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2500.00) for Chapter 90 Construction on Mendon Street, said money to be used in conjunction with any money which

may be allotted by the State or County, or both, for this purpose, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purchase of Snow Fence, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Two Dollars and Thirty-nine Cents (\$302.39) for payment of Industrial School bills incurred in 1948, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to transfer the sum of Nine Dollars and Ten Cents (\$9.10) from the Machinery Fund to the Machinery Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1948 Dog Tax Refund received from the County, to the School Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Sixty-six Dollars (\$366.00) in accordance with provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws for Pension Fund and Expense Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System for 1949, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to the Highway Employees' Vacation Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars and Nine Cents (\$939.09) for payment of Snow Removal bills incurred in 1948, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to repair the dam at Mill Pond, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for improving Wildwood Avenue, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to paint the exterior and repair windows of Grand Army Building, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to paint and make repairs at Town Hall Building, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to accept the By-laws as published in a pamphlet entitled "By-laws of the Town of Upton," revised and compiled, 1949, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to elect a non-salaried Board of Park Commissioners, consisting of three persons to serve as follows: One member to be elected to serve one year; one member to serve two years; one member to serve three years, to take effect at the next annual Town Meeting in 1950, and thereafter a member to be elected an-

nually to serve three years, all in accordance with Chapter 45, Section 2, General Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 372 of the Acts of 1946, as most recently amended, regarding Veteran's Housing and Housing Authority, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars (\$237.00) for the purchase of a Scott Air-Pak, safety breathing equipment, for the Fire Department, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars (\$237.00) for the purchase of a Scott Air-Pak, safety breathing equipment, for the Forest Fire Department, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant, with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
FEBRUARY 7, 1949.

THE COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.
Worcester, SS.

Pursuant to the foregoing Warrant, Moderator Halbert K. Struthers called the meeting to order and read Article 1. Chairman of Selectmen Earl G. Crockett moved that reading of the remaining articles be waived. Motion was seconded. George A. Whittemore addressed Mr. Struthers and stated in effect that he was moderator of the town of Upton and that there was no validity for the 1948 town election or 1949 town election. Moderator Struthers presented Selectman Crockett's motion and it was so voted without opposition. The Moderator read the remainder of the form Warrant and constable's return.

Raymond F. Lyford, Walter J. Stank, Kenneth W. Wood and Miss Grace Murphy having been appointed by the Selectmen as election officers had been duly sworn by the town clerk before the polls were declared open by the Moderator. Police Officer J. Harry Shears was in charge of the ballot box.

Cards of instruction and specimen ballots had been posted. A sealed package purporting to contain 1600 ballots were delivered to Messrs. Stank and Lyford prior to opening of the polls.

The ballot box had been shown to voters to be empty and indicator set at 0000. The box locked and keys retained by Police Officer Shears.

At various intervals during voting hours the ballot box indicator read as follows: 8 A. M., 52; 9 A. M., 85; 10 A. M., 134; 11 A. M., 186; 12 noon, 234; 1 P. M., 287; 2 P. M., 360; 3 P. M., 430; 4 P. M., 500; 5 P. M., 603; 6 P. M., 784; 7 P. M., 980, and 8 P. M., 1080.

Ballots were removed by election officials from ballot box as follows: 3.30 P. M., 250; 3.45 P. M., 200; 5.10 P. M., 100; 6.45 P. M., 100, and 8.15 P. M., 430. Total 1080.

Following persons appointed by Selectmen to canvass ballots reported at 4 P. M.: Joseph J. Driscoll, Gerald J. Shaughnessy, Mrs. Rita Cutler, Mrs. Helen Donham, Mrs. Elinor Varney, Mrs. Elizabeth Victor, Mrs. Yvonne Bissonnette and Samuel B. Young.

Reporting at 6 P. M.: Edward Curry, Ernest Aldrich, Gerald McAuliffe, Mrs. Helen Poirier, Douglas Gilchrist, Mrs. Ruth Sweet, Peter Bingel, Ernest Henchey and George Daigle.

Tabulating votes from tally sheets were: Edward Prentiss and Gerald Shaughnessy.

All of the above took oath to perform their respective duty.

At 4.30 P. M. Police Officer Oscar K. Bates relieved Police Officer Shears and remained on duty until after the counted ballots were sealed.

The polls were declared closed at 8 P. M. by Moderator Struthers.

Voting lists were compared after closing of the polls by Messrs. Lyford, Stank, Wood and Miss Murphy. They reported 1080 names checked: 581 men and 499 women.

Used and unused ballots and voting lists were placed in containers by election officials. The containers were placed in town vault.

With the canvassing of the vote and tabulation completed, public declaration was made by town clerk at 11.15 P. M. from tabulator's sheet.

PROCEEDINGS OF ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN
MEETING, FEBRUARY 12, 1949.

Moderator Malcolm C. Temple called the adjourned town meeting to order and requested the Town Clerk, on record of the election last Monday, (February 7, 1949) if it appeared that any one was elected to the office of Moderator.

The Town Clerk stated that on February 7, 1949 there were 1080 ballots cast and returned to him was a tabulation sheet. For the office of Moderator for one year Malcolm C. Temple received 866 votes; nine scattered votes, 205 blanks, total 1080. The Town Clerk added that Mr. Temple had taken his oath of office several minutes before opening of the adjourned meeting.

Moderator Temple asked if any one on the floor wished to protest this announcement.

George A. Whittemore stated that he did. He said in effect he was Moderator of the Town of Upton, that he was present here, the only man seated, and when the meeting was opened by somebody on Monday morning that he (Mr. Whittemore) took the floor, was recognized, and granted the floor by the person conducting the meeting, and stated that there was no meeting with any validity unless it was conducted by George A. Whittemore, the Moderator of the Town of Upton.

Following a discussion, Selectman Ernest B. Porter moved to take up the articles in the warrant which was duly seconded and so voted.

1948 TOWN REPORT.

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Harrison E. Bates, duly seconded, to accept the Town Report as printed.

Before the vote was taken George A. Whittemore stated he wished to call attention to Page 16 of the Town Report. He said the third paragraph was not a correct report of what happened at that time. In referring to Page 23 of the Town Report concerning proceedings of the adjourned annual town meeting, February 7, 1948, he said in effect, "is the first paragraph regarding what happened here. It is not complete and it leaves out a very pertinent part of that meeting, whatever it might be, that George A. Whittemore was ejected from the meeting by police officers. There are other discrepancies in this Town Report and previous Town Reports."

REPORTS OF COMMITTEES.

Article 3. Moderator Temple stated that the High School Building Committee had a report to make under Article 4.

MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Selectman Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, to accept a report made by Samuel B. Young, chairman of the Memorial High School Building Committee, and to further consider the report of the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee at an adjourned town meeting, February 19 at 2 P. M.

Previous to the vote, Mr. Young said that since the report for the Town Report was written—in fact on January 27th—that plans and specifications for the proposed Upton building, also estimates based on cost, of the proposed Wareham School building had been received. He said the Committee at this time did not recommend building. Mr. Young had pamphlets distributed giving information pertaining to the proposed Upton building.

SALARIES AND COMPENSATION.

Article 5. Salaries and expenses of certain town officers established:

Selectmen: Salaries, Chairman \$175, other two members \$150 each; clerk, \$150, making total of \$625; expenses \$50.

Town Treasurer: Salary, \$750; expenses \$250.

Voted: Favorable action taken on group of above items as recommended by Finance Committee, except those items which were temporarily deferred. Deferred items then taken up.

(*) Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow moved that the sum of \$4,500.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 81 Highways, and that, in addition the sum of \$13,200 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State to be restored upon their receipt to unappropriated available funds in the treasury. Voted.

(**) Road Commissioner Harry C. Snow moved that the sum of \$450.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Highway Maintenance and that in addition, the sum of \$900.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State and County's share of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury. Voted.

(***) Town Treasurer Leo F. Murphy moved that the sum of \$50.00 be raised and appropriated for Notes and Interest. Voted.

(****) Selectman-Acting Chief of Police Daniel H. Bates moved that \$1,500.00 be raised and appropriated for the Police Department. Finance Committee's recommendation was \$1,200. On standing vote declared by Moderator Temple the sum of \$1,500 was voted: Yes, 77; No, 24.

(*****) Harrison E. Bates, clerk of Finance Committee, moved that the School Department appropriation be

\$70,480. Voted. In discussion it was stated that the School Department receives income from Dog Tax Refund and Knowlton-Batchelor Trust Funds in addition to this appropriation.

(******) Selectman Ernest B. Porter moved that the sum of \$7,010.00 be raised and appropriated for Town Officers and expenses. Voted. Original recommendation, \$6,860.00.

BORROWING MONEY.

Article 7. Voted: That the Town Treasurer have the approval hereby authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the present municipal year, to issue note or notes payable within one year, notes as may be made for a lesser period in accordance with Section 17 of Chapter 44. Unanimous.

ESTABLISHING POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Article 8. Voted: to accept the provisions of Chapter 41, Section 97A, General Laws of Massachusetts, as most recently amended, establishing a Police Department.

Authorizing Selectmen to Appoint
One of Its Members as Chief or Acting
Chief of Police and Establish Salary.

Article 9. Voted: to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint one of its members as Chief of Police or Acting Chief of Police, and establish his salary at \$25 per month to be taken from the Police Appropriation.

SELECTMEN TO APPOINT CONSTABLES.

Article 10. Voted: to pass over this article to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more Constables, thus eliminating the annual election of Constables, in accordance with Section 1, Chapter 41, General Laws.

TO SELL SNOW GRIST MILL BUILDING.

Article 11. Voted: That the Selectmen be given power to sell the Grist Mill Building to the George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, for the sum of One Dollar. If refused by the said V. F. W. then the Selectmen will put the building up for public auction after due notice has been published.

MENDON ROAD CONSTRUCTION.

Article 12. Voted: that the sum of \$1,750.00 be raised and appropriated to meet the Town's share of the cost of Chapter 90 Construction work on Mendon Road, and that in addition, the sum of \$5,250.00 be transferred from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County to be restored, upon their receipt, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

SNOW FENCE POSTS.

Article 13. Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) for the purchase of Snow Fence Posts.

1948 INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL BILLS.

Article 14. Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred and Two Dollars and Thirty-nine Cents (\$302.39) for payment of Industrial School Bills incurred in 1948.

TRANSFER TO MACHINERY ACCOUNT.

Article 15. Voted: that the sum of Nine Dollars and Ten Cents (\$9.10) be transferred from the Machinery Fund to Machinery Account.

DOG TAX REFUND TO SCHOOLS ACCOUNT.

Article 16. Voted: that the sum of Six Hundred Ninety-four Dollars and Forty-one Cents (\$694.41) be appropriated to Schools Account.

RETIREMENT SYSTEM ASSESSMENT.

Article 17. Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Sixty-six Dollars (\$366.00) in accordance with provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund and Expense Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System for 1949.

HIGHWAY EMPLOYES' VACATION.

Article 18. Voted: that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to the Highway Employees' Vacation Account.

1948 SNOW REMOVAL BILLS.

Article 19. Voted: that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Hundred Thirty-nine Dollars and Nine Cents (\$939.09) for payment of Snow Removal Bills incurred in 1948. No opposition.

MILL POND DAM.

Article 20. Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to repair the dam at Mill Pond.

WILDWOOD AVENUE.

Article 21. Voted: that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) to improve Wildwood Avenue.

PAINTING GRAND ARMY BUILDING.

Article 22. Voted: to pass over article.

PAINTING INTERIOR OF TOWN HALL.

Article 23. Motion declared lost calling for an appropriation.

NEW TOWN BY-LAWS.

Article 24. Action deferred to adjourned town meeting, February 19.

PARK COMMISSION.

Article 25. Voted: to establish a non-salaried Board of Park Commissioners, consisting of three persons, to serve as follows: One member to be elected for three years, one member to be elected for two years, one member to be elected for one year, to take effect at the annual Town Meeting in 1950, and thereafter a member to be elected annually to serve three years, all in accordance with Chapter 45, Section 2, General Laws.

HOUSING AUTHORITY ACT.

Article 26. Voted: to pass over the acceptance of provisions of Chapter 372, Acts of 1946, as most recently amended, regarding Veterans' Housing and Housing Authority.

SAFETY BREATHING EQUIPMENT.

Articles 27 and 28. Voted: to raise and appropriate Two Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars (\$237.00) for purchase of a Scott Air-Pak, safety breathing equipment for the Fire Department, and Two Hundred Thirty-seven Dollars (\$237.00) for purchase of a Scott Air-Pak safety breathing equipment for the Forest Fire Department.

Moved to adjourn to Saturday, February 19, 1949 at 2 P. M. and so voted.

ADJOURNED ANNUAL TOWN MEETING,
FEBRUARY 19, 1949.

After Moderator Malcolm C. Temple called the meeting to order he stated that further action was desired on Article 7 (first acted upon at adjourned town meeting, February 12, 1949), if there was no opposition. Voted: to return to Article 7. Moderator declared vote was unanimous.

TO BORROW MONEY.

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Selectman Earl G. Crockett, duly seconded, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1949, and to issue note or notes therefor, payable within one year, and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws. There was no opposition.

SALARIES OF CERTAIN TOWN OFFICIALS.

Article 5. Moderator Temple stated because of an oversight in establishing certain salaries of town officers at the February 12, 1949 adjourned meeting, it was desired to return to this article if there was no opposition.

Selectman Ernest B. Porter moved to rescind action on the establishing of salaries of elected town officials taken February 12, 1949 for the reason that an oversight occurred in respect to the salaries of Moderator, Board of Public Welfare, Board of Assessors of Taxes, and Tree Warden. Motion seconded.

Voted: To rescind action on Article 5. Vote was declared unanimous by Moderator Temple.

Voted: To establish following salaries and expenses:—
Moderator: \$10 for annual town election, \$10 for first

adjourned town meeting, \$5 for each additional adjourned town meeting, \$5 for each special town meeting, and \$5 for each adjourned special town meeting.

Tree Warden: Services, \$1 per hr.; use of truck, \$1.85 per hr.

Board of Public Welfare: Chairman, \$100; clerk, \$140; third member, \$75.

Board of Assessors: Chairman, \$400; clerk, \$325; third member, \$300; expenses, \$450.

Tax Collector: \$850, retroactive from January 1, 1949; expenses, \$400.

Other salaries and expenses as originally acted upon February 12, 1949:

Selectmen: Salaries, Chairman, \$175; other two members, \$150 each; clerk, \$150; expenses, \$50.

Town Treasurer: Salary, \$750; expenses, \$250.

Cemetery Commission: Salaries, Chairman, \$30; member, \$25; clerk, \$30.

Town Clerk: Salary, \$350; expenses, \$225.

School Committee: Chairman, \$40; member, \$40; clerk, \$65.

Auditor: Salary, \$125.

Veteran's Service Officer: Salary, \$100.

Finance Committee: Salary, clerk, \$60.

Sealer of Weights and Measures: Salary, \$80; expenses, \$20.

MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

Article 4. Samuel B. Young, chairman of Upton Memorial High School Building Committee, stated that working plans for a proposed new High School Building had been re-

ceived by the Committee; that he had made a verbal report at the adjourned meeting, February 12, 1949 in addition to a report printed in the 1948 Town Report; that pamphlets had been distributed describing proposed building, and that the Building Committee did not favor construction of the building at this time.

PROPOSED NEW BY-LAWS.

Selectman Daniel H. Bates at this point moved to take up Article 24 pertaining to proposed set of new By-Laws of the Town of Upton as Town Counsel Henry C. Walker would be obliged to leave the meeting early. It was so voted.

A copy of the proposed By-Laws had been submitted by Mr. Walker in behalf of the Committee on By-Laws to Moderator Temple, February 12, 1949. Copies of the proposed By-Laws were distributed with Town Reports on election day, February 7, 1949.

BY-LAWS OF THE TOWN OF UPTON, MASSACHUSETTS (Revised and Compiled 1948)

NOTE: The following By-Laws will be presented to the Town for acceptance at the Annual Meeting of the Town on Saturday, February 12, 1949.

The duties, rights and responsibilities of town officers are not dealt with in detail in these By-Laws. These duties, rights and responsibilities are clearly defined by statute in the General Laws of Massachusetts, by which, the Town of Upton, like any other Town in the Commonwealth, is bound.

(See General Laws of Massachusetts, Chapters 39, 40, and 41). Where a matter is comprehensively covered by statute, a town has no jurisdiction to legislate in the matter. Where the duties of a public officer are set forth by statute, a town By-Law may not vary or add to those duties.

CHAPTER I.

GENERAL PROVISIONS.

Section 1. The adoption of these by-laws by the Town shall have the force and effect of repealing all presently existing by-laws and regulations heretofore adopted by the Town, except that this repeal shall not apply to or affect any by-law, order or article heretofore adopted accepting or adopting the provisions of any statute of the Commonwealth. These by-laws shall be known and referred to as "By-Laws of the Town of Upton, Massachusetts".

Section 2. These by-laws shall not be retroactive.

Section 3. When these by-laws are approved by the Attorney-General of Massachusetts and adopted by the Town, they shall replace and be substituted for all presently existing by-laws and regulations of the Town except those which accept or adopt statutes of the Commonwealth.

Section 4. Whoever violates any provision of these by-laws whereby any act or thing is prohibited shall, unless other provision is expressly made, forfeit and pay a fine not exceeding fifteen dollars.

Section 5. Prosecutions for the breach of any of the provisions of any of these by-laws shall be commenced within one year from such breach.

Section 6. Any and all of these by-laws may be repealed, or amended, or other by-laws may be adopted, at any Town

meeting, annual or special, an article containing the subject matter of the proposed change having been inserted in the warrant for such meeting.

CHAPTER II.

TOWN MEETINGS.

Section 1. The annual Town Meeting for the election of town officers shall be held on the first Monday in March of each year. Official ballots shall be used as provided by law.

Section 2. All matters to be considered under the warrant for the annual Town Meeting, except the election of officers and the determination of such matters as are required by law to be elected or determined by ballot, shall be considered at an adjournment of such meeting to be held at 2 P. M., on the Saturday following the first Monday in March in the year for which the warrant is drawn. The warrant for every annual Town Meeting shall contain a statement by which the meeting is adjourned to such time for such purpose.

Section 3. The polls for the annual Town Meeting shall be opened at seven o'clock in the forenoon and shall remain open until eight o'clock in the evening, unless otherwise fixed by the Selectmen in the warrant for the meeting.

Section 4. Twenty legal voters of the town shall constitute a quorum, and such a quorum shall be necessary at all town meetings except that action on any article in a warrant calling for the election of various town officers at an annual election or an officer or officers at a special election shall not require the presence of a quorum.

Section 5. Notices of every Town Meeting shall be given by posting printed copies of the warrant for such meet-

ing in two or more conspicuous public places in the Town of Upton, and one copy thereof shall be posted at the Town Hall Building.

Section 6. Notice of every adjourned Town Meeting shall be posted by the Town Clerk in two or more conspicuous public places in the Town of Upton, and one copy thereof shall be posted at the Town Hall Building. In addition thereto the Town Clerk may, if he deems it practicable, publish the same in any newspaper published in the County having a circulation in the Town of Upton.

Section 7. The Selectmen, after drawing a warrant for a Town Meeting shall forthwith deliver a copy of the same to the Clerk of the Finance Committee.

Section 8. At any meeting, articles in the warrant shall be acted upon in the order in which they appear, unless otherwise determined by a vote of the meeting.

Section 9. All motions having to do with the expenditure of money shall be presented in writing; and other motions shall be in writing if so directed by the Moderator.

Section 10. If a motion is divisible, it shall be divided and the questions shall be put separately upon each part thereof if so directed by the Moderator.

Section 11. When a question is before the meeting, the following motions shall be received and shall have precedence in the following order. The first three shall be decided without debate:

To adjourn
To lay on the table
For the previous question
To postpone to a time certain

To commit, recommit or refer
To amend or substitute
To postpone indefinitely.

Section 12. When a question is put, the sense of the meeting shall be determined by the voices thereon, and the Moderator shall declare the vote as it appears to him. If the Moderator is unable to decide the vote of the article or matter by the sound of the voices, or if his decision is immediately questioned by seven or more voters rising in their places for that purpose, he shall determine the vote by ordering a show of hands or standing vote and may appoint tellers to make and return the count. A roll call shall be ordered by the Moderator if twenty members shall by rising to their places favor such motion.

Section 13. No vote passed at any meeting shall be reconsidered at an adjournment of that meeting unless notice be given in writing to the Moderator at the meeting that a motion to reconsider will be made at the adjournment thereof. No vote determining that any matter shall not be reconsidered shall be the subject of reconsideration, and no question shall be reconsidered more than once. No vote shall be reconsidered on a motion to adjourn, to lay on the table, or for the previous question. Any notice of motion to reconsider delivered to the Moderator shall forthwith be delivered by the Moderator to the Town Clerk.

Section 14. No meeting shall be dissolved until every article contained in the warrant has been acted upon, except that this provision shall not preclude postponement of consideration of any article to an adjournment of the meeting at a stated time and place.

Section 15. Any voter desiring to speak upon a question or matter in debate shall rise to his feet, and each person, shall in turn, be recognized by the Moderator. The speaker shall, before debate, announce his name.

CHAPTER III.

ELECTION OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Section 1. The Town shall, at its annual meeting in every year when the term of office of any incumbent expires, choose by ballot from its inhabitants who are registered voters, the following town officers for the following terms of office:

A Town Clerk for three years;
A Town Treasurer for one year;
A Tax Collector for one year;
Three Selectmen for terms of one year;
Three Assessors for terms of three years;
Three Members of Board of Public Welfare
for terms of three years;
A Road Commissioner for one year;
A Tree Warden for one year;
Three Members of the School Committee
for terms of three years;
A Moderator for one year;
Three Cemetery Commissioners
for terms of three years;
Nine Public Library Trustees
for terms of three years;
An Auditor for one year.

CHAPTER IV.

GENERAL POWERS AND DUTIES OF TOWN OFFICERS.

Section 1. All boards, commissions or committees, the members of which are elected by ballot, shall hold a regular meeting at least once each month and shall keep records exactly and in detail of all motions made, votes passed and business transacted. Such records, unless otherwise provided by law, shall be open to public inspection. When a book or record is completed it shall be delivered to the Town Clerk for safekeeping in the Town Vault.

Section 2. All elected officers, and all committees, commissions and trustees, and such appointive officers as the Selectmen may direct, shall, on or before the 10th day of January in each year, make a report to the Town of all business transacted in their departments during the last preceding fiscal year. Such reports shall be made by filing the original thereof with the Board of Selectmen, and a copy thereof shall be submitted to the Town Clerk for permanent record.

Section 3. The annual report of the officers of the Town shall include reports of all elected officers, committees, commissions and trustees and such appointive officers as the Selectmen may direct.

Section 4. The Selectmen shall appoint a Town Counsel who shall be a member in good standing of the Massachusetts Bar. The Town Counsel shall advise all executive officers, boards and committees of the town whenever requested by them and shall represent the Town in all legal proceedings by or against it whenever so directed by the Selectmen. All requests for opinions from the Town Counsel shall be in writing, and all opinions given by him on questions of law to any officer, board or committee shall be in writing and signed by him. A copy of each opinion shall be forwarded to the Town Clerk.

Section 5. The Selectmen shall have full authority as agents of the Town to institute and prosecute suits in the name of the town or its officers in their official capacities and to appear and defend suits brought against it or its officers in their official capacities, unless otherwise ordered by vote of the town, or provided by law.

Section 6. The Selectmen shall have authority to settle, compromise and adjust any and all claims for or against the Town. However, no claim or action against the town

shall be settled in excess of two hundred dollars unless the same has been reduced to judgment by a Court of competent jurisdiction, without a vote of the Town.

Section 7. No deed or grant of land, except as herein-after provided concerning tax titles and tax liens and land acquired thereby, shall be made without a vote of the Town. And wherever it becomes necessary to execute any deed for land, or any interest therein, or any other instrument required to carry into effect the vote of the town,* the same shall be executed by the Selectmen, or a majority thereof, in the name of the Town, unless otherwise provided by law or by vote of the town, and shall be sealed with the seal of the town.

Section 8. When the estimated amount of a proposed contract is \$500.00 or more, proposals shall be called for in the manner provided in this section. Such calls for proposals shall be advertised in a newspaper having a daily circulation not less than three times in said newspaper at intervals of two days, the last publication to be at least two days before the opening of the bids. The advertisement shall require such proposals to be sealed and properly designated and shall announce the place, day and hour at which they will be opened. The bids shall be delivered to the Department authorized to make the contract and shall be deposited in a box or other container, securely locked, and at the time and place named, shall be publicly opened in the presence of a majority of the Board of Selectmen, or a majority of the Board of Department calling for bids. No bids shall be received after the time advertised for the opening. So far as practicable, contracts for less than \$500.00 shall be awarded in such manner as to secure reasonable competition.

Whenever such a contract is awarded to a person other than the lowest bidder therefor, the department authorized to make the contract shall submit, in writing, at the time of

awarding such a bid, a full, complete and detailed explanation of the reasons for the rejection or non-acceptance of the lower bid or bids, a copy of which shall be filed with the Town Clerk as a public record.

Section 9. Obligations or contracts involving five hundred dollars or more shall be in writing and signed by a majority at least of the board or committee authorized or having control of the appropriation against which such obligation is incurred; and such board or committee shall retain a signed copy of every such contract which shall be filed with the Town Clerk for permanent record.

Section 10. A bond for the faithful performance of any contract may be required where it is deemed necessary or desirable by the Selectmen, School Committee, or board or committee having in its charge the execution of such contract.

Section 11. The Town Treasurer, with the advice and consent of the Selectmen, is authorized to sell and assign any tax lien held by the Town and/or bargain, sell and convey any property to which the Town has or may hereafter acquire title through the foreclosure of tax liens, or under the statutes relating to Lands of Low Value. The Treasurer is authorized to sign, execute and deliver in the name of the Town, any and all legal instruments under seal, necessary to convey to the assignee or purchaser all right, title and interest of the Town in such property.

Section 12. No board or officer shall make any contract on behalf of the Town, the execution of which shall necessarily extend beyond one year from the date thereof, unless otherwise provided by law, unless authority for such contract has been specifically given by vote of the town.

Section 13. No town officer or member of any board or committee chosen by the town shall have any pecuniary interest in any contract, agreement, sale, bargain or the settlement of any claim by or against the town made or approved on behalf of the town by himself or any board or committee of which he is a member.

Section 14. The Town Treasurer shall be the custodian of all funds and securities of trust funds and shall invest and reinvest trust funds in accordance with the laws of the Commonwealth. He shall have custody of all insurance policies covering town property.

Section 15. The Town Clerk shall record any and all instruments conveying land to the town, or any interest therein at the proper Registry of Deeds, and shall have in his custody all deeds and other instruments so recorded.

Section 16. The Town Clerk shall notify any board, officer or committee of the Town of any vote or action taken by the town concerning the duties of any officer, board or committee. He shall furnish the Selectmen for publication in the annual report, a copy of his record of all town meetings held during the preceding year and vital statistics recorded during that year.

Section 17. The Road Commissioner shall have in his charge the care and maintenance of public ways, guide posts, street and highway signs, sidewalks and drains, except where otherwise provided by statutes relative to State, County and Federal supervision and control.

Section 18. There shall be a Road Machinery Account for the purpose of purchasing, repairing, maintaining and operating road machinery. The custody of all tools and machinery for roads and highways shall be under the general supervision of the Road Commissioner who shall annually

report to the Town, an inventory of the same. The Road Machinery Account shall be under the general supervision of the Road Commissioner.

CHAPTER V.

FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Section 1. There shall be a Finance Committee consisting of nine citizens of the Town, other than Town officers elected by ballot, who shall be sworn to the faithful performance of their duties. The term of office for members of said Committee shall be three years and the Selectmen shall, not later than the first day of May, appoint three members to such committee. Vacancies in said committee shall be filled by the Selectmen within thirty days after the vacancy occurs. The member appointed to fill such vacancy shall complete the term of the membership vacated. Said Committee shall choose its own officers.

Section 2. To this Committee shall be referred all articles calling for an appropriation of money in any warrant for a Town Meeting. It shall be the duty of the Selectmen after drawing the Town warrant to transmit immediately a copy of the same to the Clerk of the Finance Committee.

Section 3. It shall be the duty of the Finance Committee to make a recommendation concerning each article or transfer relating to finances of the Town. Such recommendation may, at any special meeting of the Town, be made verbally to the voters through the Chairman, or the Clerk of the Committee, and at the annual meeting of the Town, shall be reduced to a printed report available to the voters on the Monday preceding the Saturday in each year when annual appropriations shall be acted upon and considered.

Section 4. No motion relating to an expenditure of money or an appropriation shall be acted upon at any Town Meeting until it has been submitted to the Committee, except where provided otherwise by law.

CHAPTER VI.

FINANCIAL.

Section 1. All moneys received by any town officer or department, except as otherwise provided by law and except fees provided for by statute, shall be paid by such officer or department upon their receipt into the town treasury. Any sums so paid into the town treasury shall not later be used by such officer or department without a specific appropriation therefor, except that sums allotted for highway purposes by the Commonwealth or the County, which shall be used only for the purposes specified by the officials making the allotment or to meet temporary loans issued in anticipation of such allotment as provided by law shall be available therefor without any appropriation.

Section 2. Trust funds, including cemetery perpetual care funds, unless otherwise provided or directed by the donor thereof, shall be placed at interest in savings banks, trust companies incorporated under the laws of the Commonwealth, or national banks, or invested by the Treasurer in shares of cooperative banks, or in securities which are legal investments for savings banks.

Section 3. Funds given to the town in trust, whether by will, declaration, or otherwise, for specific purposes, shall not be mingled with other funds, but shall be kept and invested separately and used only in accordance with the terms of the gift.

Section 4. All bills incurred during the year shall be submitted to the Selectmen on or before the last day of each year.

Section 5. There shall be a Workmen's Compensation Fund from which shall be paid in accordance with the Workmen's Compensation Act; compensation and awards, and payments therefrom shall be made under the general direction and supervision of the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer.

Section 6. Five hundred dollars shall be appropriated annually for this fund, unless in the judgment of the Selectmen, in any year before the annual meeting, it appears that an appropriation of this amount is unnecessary because of a sufficient balance in said fund at that time. The fund shall be deposited in savings or national banks under the direction and control of the Town Treasurer.

CHAPTER VII.

LICENSES AND PERMITS.

Section 1. The Selectmen shall be the licensing authorities for the town, except where otherwise provided by law.

Section 2. Fees for all licenses and permits shall be established annually by the Selectmen except where fees are established or set by statute.

Section 3. The Selectmen may make such rules and regulations not inconsistent with law as may be deemed proper relative to the licensing of junk or second hand dealers, taxis or taxi stands.

Moderator Temple read each section of proposed By-Laws to assembled voters before section was taken up for consideration.

Voted: on motion of Selectman Daniel H. Bates to accept Chapter 1, after sections were read.

After reading of Section 1, Chapter 11, "Town Meetings", Selectman Ernest B. Porter stated there was a desire to change the date of election of town officers from the first Monday in February (present election date) to the first Monday in March as stated in proposed By-Laws to afford more time for town officers in preparing material and printing of the Town Report.

After reading of Section 2, Chapter 11, "Town Meetings", Moderator Temple requested Samuel B. Young to take the chair. Mr. Temple then moved that the business session of the annual Town meeting take place at 2.00 P. M. on the first Saturday after the first Monday in February, and election of town officers take place on the first Monday of March in each year as stated in the report. Motion was duly seconded by Gordon E. Benson. Result of standing vote declared by Mr. Young: Yes 20, No. 17.

Voted: On motion of Mr. Temple that the Selectmen with Town Counsel take any legislative proceedings necessary to attain the above changes.

Section 4, Chapter 11. Gordon E. Benson moved that 35 legal voters be required to constitute a quorum instead of 20 as stated in proposed By-Laws. Motion was not seconded.

Voted: Section 5, Chapter 11. Moderator Malcolm C. Temple moved that wording of this section be changed to read that one copy of the warrant of every Town Meeting be posted "on the exterior of the Town Hall Building" in addition to the two or more to be posted in conspicuous public places in the Town of Upton.

Voted: Section 6, Chapter 11 on motion of Moderator Malcolm C. Temple that notice of every adjourned Town Meeting shall be posted by the Town Clerk in two or more conspicuous public places in the Town of Upton, and one

copy thereof shall be posted "on the exterior of the Town Hall Building". Remainder of section as printed.

Voted: Section 13, Chapter 11. Added to section as printed: "No motion can be reconsidered at a Town Meeting after one hour from time vote is declared by presiding officer."

Voted: On motion of Donald B. Johnson to defer action on remainder of proposed By-Laws at this time and take up Article 4.

Voted: On motion of Selectman Earl G. Crockett to adopt Chapter 11 of proposed By-Laws to and including Section 13 with changes and additions.

MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

Article 4. Walter H. Allen spoke at length on the need of a new school building.

Donald B. Johnson, chairman of the School Committee, spoke on increased enrollment of pupils in the elementary grades; the advantages of a consolidated school for such pupils, and regional high schools.

Selectman Daniel H. Bates moved, duly seconded, to accept the report of the special Memorial High School Building Committee as one of progress and dismiss the Committee. Motion lost.

Voted: Selectman Daniel H. Bates moved, duly seconded, that the report of the Memorial High School Building Committee be accepted as one of progress.

Voted: On motion of Selectman Earl G. Crockett, duly seconded, that the Memorial High School Building Commit-

tee be instructed to contact William Upham (architect of proposed building) for final settlement and report back to the citizens at a special town meeting.

Voted: On motion of Mrs. Beatrice Wood that the School Committee with Superintendent of Schools be empowered to investigate Regional Schools outside of the town and Consolidated Elementary School within the town and report progress at a future meeting.

PROPOSED BY-LAWS.

Voted: Selectman Daniel H. Bates moved to take up Article 24 from the table pertaining to adoption of remaining sections of proposed new By-Laws of the Town of Upton.

Moderator Temple began reading of Section 14, Chapter 11.

Selectman Ernest B. Porter called attention to wording of Chapter 111, Section 1, "Election of Town Officers." It was also stated that since the proposed By-Laws were drawn up, action had been taken at the first adjourned annual town meeting, February 12, 1949, to elect three Park Commissioners beginning in 1950 and to continue the annual election of five Constables. Chapter was referred to the Town Counsel, who was not in the hall at the time.

Voted: Chapter IV, Section 8, "General Powers and Duties of Town Officers" to read "the last publication to be at least seven days before the opening of the bids," instead of "two days."

Voted: Add to second paragraph of Chapter IV, Section 8, "A copy to be sent to lowest bidder."

Voted: Chapter IV, Section 10, on motion of George N. O. Poirier, duly seconded, "A bond for the faithful per-

formance of any contract *shall* be required by the Selectmen, School Committee, or board or committee having in its charge the execution of such contract, and that a certificate shall be filed by the contractor showing compliance with the Workmen's Compensation Laws."

Voted: To accept Chapter IV with changes voted.

Voted: Chapter V, Section 3, that "a printed report available to the voters on the first Saturday after the first Monday in February."

Voted: To adopt Chapters V, VI and VII with any amendments or changes made.

Voted: To dissolve warrant.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
JULY 26, 1949.

Moderator Malcolm C. Temple called the meeting to order and read the call of the meeting. Over 30 voters were present.

Article 1 was read. Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter moved to take Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to be added to Chapter 90, Mendon Street Construction, and in addition, the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) be taken from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State's and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County be restored, to unappropriated available funds in the treasury. The motion was seconded.

George A. Whittemore did not receive recognition by the chair when he declined to address Moderator Temple as moderator. Mr. Whittemore stated to the voters present that any action taken at the meeting would not be valid. He said he was moderator of the town of Upton.

MENDON STREET.

Article 1. Voted: that the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) be taken from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, to be added to Chapter 90 Mendon Street Construction, and that in addition, the sum of Nine Hundred Dollars (\$900.00) be taken from unappropriated available funds in the treasury to meet the State and County's shares of the cost of the work, the reimbursements from the State and County be restored upon their receipt to unappropriated available funds in the treasury.

Motion made by Selectman Porter and duly seconded. Finance Committee reported favorable action, sum for the job not to exceed Two Hundred Dollars.

HARTFORD AVENUE BRIDGE.

Article 6. Voted: to take from unappropriated available funds in the treasury, the sum of Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) to be used in rebuilding a bridge on Hartford Avenue.

Finance Committee reported it did not recommend the article at this time from information received. Road Commissioner motioned for the Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) which was duly seconded.

Selectman Crockett motioned to dissolve warrant at 8.55 P. M. and it was so voted.

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING
AUGUST 9, 1949.

George A. Whittemore was at the moderator's chair and claimed he was moderator of the town of Upton when Moderator Malcolm C. Temple arrived in the hall.

Moderator Temple asked the voters if they sustained him as moderator. The response was "Yes."

Moderator Temple directed Officer Arthur F. Bartlett to remove Mr. Whittemore from the hall unless the latter would be seated and act in a decorous manner. Mr. Whittemore did not take a seat and left the hall, escorted by the officer.

Moderator Temple then called the meeting to order and directed the town clerk to read the warrant.

REPORTS ON REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL AND
CONSOLIDATED GRAMMAR SCHOOL.

Article 1. School Committeeman Robert E. Maynard read a report of the School Building Committee, (comprising members of the School Committee and Superintendent

of Schools) on the possibility of joining with other towns in a Regional High School program.

In part, the report stated, that the existing state law now permits 65% financial reimbursement to member townships who participate in building a joint Regional High School; that Upton would be eligible to receive the maximum; that the law expires in 1951 unless renewed by the Legislature, and that the State School Building Assistance Commission is to make a complete survey in Upton with recommendations by November 1949.

The report further stated that the towns of Upton, Hopkinton and Southboro have a general committee which is to obtain statistics to be used in connection with the survey by the State School Building Assistance Commission.

The report further set forth that Former Federal Commissioner of Education Dr. John W. Studebaker urged consolidation of high schools to provide wider curriculum and vocational guidance.

(Report on file at town clerk's office.)

School Committeewoman Mrs. Elsie J. Craib read "A Report on the Condition of Upton Schools and the Need for Consolidation."

The report stated in part: In September there will be 434 pupils attending public schools from the town of Upton. There are 250 pupils in the first six grades, who will be taught in the Knowlton and Ball schools. Another 103 will go to Northbridge in Grades 7, 8 and 9. Grafton High School will take the remaining 81 pupils.

To take care of the first six grades in the Upton buildings, the report stated, it will be necessary to transport 27

pupils from West Upton to the Ball school, and 19 from Upton Center to the Knowlton school. This is necessary to distribute the number of pupils more equally among existing classrooms and teachers.

In the fall of 1950 the problem will be more complicated, the report stated. In the fall of 1953 there will be nearly 400 pupils in the grammar school alone, almost the total of grammar and high school pupils this fall.

Under the School Building Assistance Law, which expires in 1951, 50 per cent of the cost of a new elementary school building would be allotted if its construction and site meet with state specifications. The town initially has to defray the entire cost of the building, the report further set forth. The sum of \$200,000 is the highest amount the town can pay for any building under existing tax setup, State officials informed the Special Committee.

The Committee's plan calls for using three rooms at the Ball school and eight in the proposed elementary school to house all elementary pupils in town.

The report stated that the Knowlton school is now obsolete for an up-to-date educational program. Wooden stairs, poorly ventilated basement toilets, and inadequate playground area are among the defects of this building, the Special Committee set forth.

Additions to the Knowlton and Ball schools were considered by the Committee but not deemed advisable, they reported.

(Report on file at town clerk's office.)

Norman E. Walker moved that the School Committee be authorized to continue study and confer with adjacent towns

on the development of a Regional High School to include the town of Upton. Motion seconded. Voted.

Selectman Earl G. Crockett moved that the reports presented be accepted as reports of progress. Motion seconded. Voted.

**\$200,000.00 APPROPRIATED FOR
NEW ELEMENTARY SCHOOL.**

Article 2. Voted on motion of Chairman Donald B. Johnson of the School Committee, duly seconded, "that the town of Upton raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000 for the purpose of acquiring land, if necessary, and of constructing thereon and originally furnishing and equipping an elementary school building, by appropriating the sum of \$27,000 from fire loss insurance on the Upton High School building which was burned, \$700 from the sale of the town infirmary, \$2300 by taxation the first year, and to authorize the treasurer, with the consent and approval of the Selectmen to borrow the sum of \$120,000 under authority of Chapter 1487 of the Acts of 1947, and \$50,000 under authority of Chapter 44 of the General Laws, and authorize the Treasurer to issue bonds or notes of the Town therefor payable in not more than twenty years from the dates thereof in accordance with Chapter 44 of the General Laws." Standing vote: Yes, 143; No, 1.

Preceding the taking of the vote there was a discussion.

Peter Robson, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that the said Committee recommended the appropriation provided that the State reimbursed the Town 40 per or more.

Selectman Daniel H. Bates motioned to appropriate the money for the school building as contained in the article.

Mr. Johnson stated he had a motion written out to present to the voters. Mr. Bates said he yielded to Mr. Johnson.

Henry R. Hoyle inquired concerning the cost of enlarging the present school buildings.

Chairman Johnson said it was the opinion of the School Committee that additional rooms to the Ball building would exceed \$20,000 and related conditions of the Knowlton building. He said he believed that if some action was not taken by the town to provide school accommodations that the State would step in.

Among others speaking during the discussion included Halbert K. Struthers, Selectman Earl G. Crockett, Mrs. Mabel Sanders, Mrs. Sarah E. Pearson, Town Counsel Henry C. Walker, George N. O. Poirier and George Nydam.

Mr. Hoyle moved that the vote on the motion made by Mr. Johnson to appropriate the \$200,000 be taken by a written ballot. Motion seconded. Moderator Temple declared Mr. Hoyle's motion lost on a voice vote.

Mr. Johnson assured the voters that the proposed new building would not be built unless 40 per cent or more is to be received by the town from the Commonwealth.

Police Officers A. Frederick Bartlett, Alfred H. Nichols and Edward L. Orff took the count of the standing vote at the request of Moderator Temple.

Result announced by Moderator after counting: In favor of the motion, Yes 143; opposed, One (1).

During the discussion period and before vote on appropriation motion was taken, Moderator Temple instructed Officer Bartlett to inform Mr. Whittemore he might return

at any time into the hall if he conducted himself in a proper manner.

NAMING OF COMMITTEE.

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Chairman Donald B. Johnson, duly seconded, "that a school building committee be elected consisting of the three members of the Upton School Committee, the Superintendent of Schools, who will serve in an advisory capacity only, without the power to vote, and four other members who shall be inhabitant registered voters of the town, one of whom shall be a member of the Finance Committee, and that they be empowered to acquire land, if necessary for a building site, and enter into all agreements and contracts for constructing and equipping an elementary school building in Upton."

Prior to the vote, Selectman Earl G. Crockett moved to amend that part of Mr. Johnson's original motion to read that there shall be "four" inhabitant registered voters instead of "three" in order to make an uneven number on the committee with voting authority. Mr. Johnson accepted Selectman Crockett's amendment and it was embodied in his original motion.

Norman E. Walker moved that the four inhabitant registered voters be elected from the floor, singularly, and so voted the Moderator declared.

Peter Robson nominated Gordon E. Benson to represent the Finance Committee which was duly seconded. Voted.

Charles V. Goodhue nominated George N. O. Poirier, duly seconded. Voted.

Allan S. Donham nominated Allan S. Donham, duly seconded. Voted.

David A. Colcord nominated Miss Marjorie Taft, duly seconded. Miss Taft declined nomination.

Peter Robson nominated Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded. Voted.

Voted: that the balance of the School Building Committee be empowered to elect a successor to succeed Mr. Benson, if his membership on the Finance Committee is terminated, or to elect a successor to any member named at this meeting who can no longer serve on the Committee.

RESCIND VOTE OF OLD HIGH SCHOOL SITE
FOR MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL BUILDING.

Article 4. Voted: on motion of Selectman Earl G. Crockett, duly seconded, that the town rescind the vote of April 29, 1946 relative to the use of the old High School Site for an Upton Memorial High School Building. No dissenting voice, Moderator declared.

REPORT OF UPTON MEMORIAL HIGH SCHOOL
BUILDING COMMITTEE.

During the year 1949 the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee conducted five meetings.

Brochures emphasizing the more important features of the Proposed High School Building were prepared by Mr. Wm. G. Upham, Architect and distributed to the voters at the Annual Town Meeting in February.

Mr. Samuel B. Young, Chairman, gave a verbal report at the February Town Meeting as a supplement to the written report which appeared in the 1948 Town Report.

On February 19th at the adjourned Annual Town Meeting it was voted to instruct the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee to contact Mr. Wm. G. Upham, Architect, for final settlement of the contract between Architect and the Town of Upton, dated August 22, 1945.

The settlement of said contract was affected on August 10, 1949 in the amount of nine thousand seven hundred sixty-four dollars and sixty-eight cents (\$9,764.68) and copies of settlement agreement signed by William G. Upham, Architect, and Samuel B. Young, Chairman, were forwarded to Mr. George G. Newton, Town Clerk and Mr. Leo F. Murphy, Town Treasurer.

Three (3) sets of working drawings and three (3) Books of Specifications of the Proposed Upton Memorial High School Building are stored in vault in Town Hall Building. All other records and minutes of the many, many meetings which have been held during the past four and one-half years will be turned over to the Town Clerk upon the discharge of the Upton Memorial High School Building Committee.

REPORT OF TOWN COUNSEL.

December 31, 1949.

TO THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN, TOWN OF UPTON:

As Counsel for the Town, I submit my tenth annual report.

During the year 1949, written and oral opinions were rendered to the Selectmen, Tax Collector, Board of Public Welfare, School Department, Assessors and Town Clerk.

There is pending with the Worcester Superior Court a land damage case brought by Emale Newton against the Town. This case is now ready for settlement and will be disposed of without trial during 1950.

A claim was presented to the United States Fidelity and Guaranty on default of a Town Officer and check for Eleven Thousand (\$11,000.00) Dollars was received, which was turned over to the Town Treasurer.

New by-laws were acted upon at the annual meeting in 1949 and an approved set has been forwarded by the office of the Attorney-General as of December, 1949. Steps to complete the by-laws will be taken within the next few weeks.

Several conferences were held with the Department of Corporations and Taxation relative to tax rate and approval of transfer of funds used for Town purposes.

Conferences were held with the Building Committee in connection with the elementary school project.

Claim was brought against the Town for land damage on the Mendon Road. However, the claim was not seasonably brought and is consequently dismissed, with no payment to be made by the Town.

With reference to the Ella W. Risteen funds held by the Hartford-Connecticut Trust Company, as Custodian for the Town, Henry F. Long, Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation has made the following recommendation: "It is my opinion that at some future town meeting an article should be inserted transferring the actual custody of the securities from the Hartford-Connecticut Trust Company to the Town Treasurer as provided by law." Inasmuch as there is likely to be no particular activity on this account, so far as sales or exchanges of securities are concerned, it is my recommendation that the custody of the securities be placed with the Town Treasurer. The securities now held by the Trust Company are all registered in the name of the Town and the list is the same as previously reported.

I recommend the Town seriously consider complete building and zoning laws which will be of unmeasured value to the Town and will act as a definite protection to the property owners in Upton. The lack of proper building laws encourages the building of inferior and nondescript housing. Without proper laws in Upton, nothing can be done to prevent erection of inferior buildings. This condition leaves the property owner in the position of running a daily risk as to what type of building will be erected and occupied by his new neighbor. Towns which have proper laws governing construction are reaping the benefits of new homes of a desirable type, thus appreciating the value of present property in town.

The cooperation of townspeople and town officers and employes is appreciated.

REPORT OF THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS' SERVICE.

To the Honorable Board of Selectmen and voters of Upton:

This is the first Annual Report of this Department since it replaced what was formerly known as Soldiers' Relief and Military Aid.

With the ending of World War II there was a need for a greatly expanded department to assist Veterans and Veterans' dependents in obtaining their allowable benefits under the G. I. Bill of Rights. All these rights come under the supervision of the Veterans Administration and this Office has acted as sort of a medium between the Veteran and that Office. It aids in helping Veterans file and properly present all claims with the Veterans' Administration.

In 1946 the town purchased for this department Photostat equipment with which to make our own official copies of discharges and other official papers needed when filing claims and applications with the Veterans' Administration and various State agencies.

This Office also extends financial aid to needy Veterans and Veterans' dependents who file proper applications and meet the requirements of Chapter 115 of the General Laws of the Commonwealth. All moneys expended under this Chapter are subject to State Approval and investigation, after which the Town is reimbursed one-half.

As the Director of this Department for the past year I have found great pleasure in assisting our local Veterans and their dependents who have requested aid from this Office.

Seventeen Veterans applied for Assistance from Veterans' Benefits, eighty-two were assisted in other various Veterans affairs, and approximately two hundred and sixteen discharges and legal documents were photostated.

I wish to thank the Board of Selectmen for their fine co-operation and their confidence in me which has helped so much in performing the duties of this Office. Also I want to extend my thanks to the people and local agencies who have assisted me.

Sir:

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the

period from December 9, 1947, the date of the previous audit, to December 12, 1948, and submit the following report thereon:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined and checked, and a balance sheet, which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on December 12, 1948.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The appropriation ledgers were analyzed and checked, the appropriations as recorded being checked with the town clerk's records of appropriations voted by the town. The receipts, as recorded, were compared with the records of the departments collecting money for the town and with the other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury, while the payments were checked with the approved orders of the selectmen authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds. The cash book additions were verified, and the cash balance on December 12, 1948 was proved by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit, by examination of a savings bank book, and by actual count of the cash in the office.

The securities and savings bank books representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed, the income being proved and the withdrawals verified.

The tax title deeds on hand were examined and listed, the amount transferred from the 1948 tax levy being verified.

The books and accounts of the tax collector were examined and checked in detail. The tax and motor vehicle and trailer excise accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitments were audited and compared with the warrants issued by the board of assessors. The abatements, as recorded, were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the cash book entries were checked in detail to the commitment book postings, the recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer as shown on the treasurer's cash book, and the outstanding accounts were listed.

In order to verify the outstanding accounts, as listed, notices were sent to all persons whose names appeared on the collector's books as owing money to the town. In response to these notices, replies were received from a large number of persons who claimed that their taxes were paid but not credited to their accounts on the books of the collector. These claims were called to the attention of the collector who acknowledged the receipt of the taxes in question, and, moreover, submitted a large number of duplicate receipts representing items of taxes which were collected by him but which were not entered on his books nor paid over to the town treasurer. These collections, aggregating \$11,719.10, were subsequently entered by the tax collector in the cash books.

The collector resigned before the completion of the audit and, consequently, the audit of his accounts was extended to December 22, 1948, the final reconciliation of the collector's accounts indicating a net cash shortage on that date of \$11,305.63.

A corrected list of outstanding taxes was drawn off as of December 22, 1948 to be recommitted by the assessors to the temporary tax collector.

The records of licenses and permits issued by the selectmen, the town clerk, and the health department were examined and checked, and the payments to the State and the town were verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the sealer of weight and measures and of the police, highway, public welfare, veterans' benefits, school, library, and cemetery departments were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing a reconciliation of the treasurer's and the collector's cash, summaries of the tax, motor vehicle and trailer excise, tax title, and departmental accounts, as well as tables showing the transactions and condition of the trust and investment funds.

During the audit, cooperation was received from all town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

It is my pleasure to submit my fifth annual report on the Public Schools of the Town of Upton.

It is fitting at this time to pay tribute to a teacher of long and devoted service. Mrs. Lora D. Dearth began teaching in the Upton Public Schools in 1917. From that time until June 1949 she served the youth of this community with faithful and loyal devotion. Fortunate indeed are those who came under her tutelage. Fortunate the community which is privileged to have the high quality of service she rendered for so many years. I am sure the townspeople join this department in wishing her many happy years of retirement.

The following interesting observation is made from information obtained from the Massachusetts Department of Labor and Industries as issued by the Massachusetts Teachers' Federation. The figures below are the average weekly wages for the week ending October 15, 1949, multiplied by 52.

\$3,656.00—Plumbing and Heating.
3,406.00—Building Construction.
3,365.00—Masons and Plasterers.
3,320.00—Building General Labor.
3,306.00—Painters.
3,243.00—Carpenters.
3,230.00—Binderies.
3,180.00—Classroom teacher of Massachusetts.
2,250.00—Classroom teacher of Upton.

(Average October, 1949.)

The School Committee in adopting a salary scale with a \$2,200.00 minimum and a \$3,000.00 maximum has taken a step forward to remedy this unfair condition. As may be seen from the figures above our maximum is still below the average for the State as a whole. I shall repeat again a paragraph from my last two reports:

"When in competition with larger towns and cities, small towns are at a disadvantage because they generally offer smaller salaries and because teachers are anxious to work in larger systems which furnish greater opportunity for professional advancement. To offset these conditions and to fill vacancies which are bound to occur, we must be prepared to meet or even surpass the salaries of larger towns. We must face these facts and make provision for meeting them."

This past Fall the School Committee voted to employ a part time instructor in Physical Education. Physical Education in the elementary grades is characterized by two things: It is informal, and it is largely non-competitive. When first introduced in the school, physical training largely consisted of formal drills and calisthenics. The trend has changed and now the work is practically all in the form of games, dances, and informal activities. Among the chief objectives may be listed the development of interest in play and recreation, i. e. (1) the ability to gain pleasure from games and physical activity, and (2) the development of social and moral standards, such as good sportsmanship, faithfulness to duty, devotion to serious tasks, team work, and many other qualities. The report of the physical education instructor follows this report.

MAINTENANCE AND EQUIPMENT.

This past year the interior of the Ball School was painted in a pleasing pastel shade which adds to the attractiveness and lighting efficiency of the classrooms.

Repairs were made in the plumbing in both boys' and girls' toilets at the Ball School. Many minor and unforeseen repairs were done to improve both the Ball and the Knowlton Schools.

During the coming year I recommend that new lights be installed throughout the Ball School, that the roof be resealed, and that the driveway be filled and tarred.

The hard surfaced play area at the Knowlton School, begun two years ago, was enlarged this year. This has proven to be one of the best possible investments for the children attending this school because it offers at least a small area free from mud where the pupils may play during the spring and winter months.

It is very important in any organization to maintain and improve the equipment with which that organization does business. That is true of our schools, and, even though increased costs seem almost prohibitive, it is unwise economy to "let things go" until everything is needed at the same time.

Last year and again this year we have replaced old and obsolete furniture with new and improved pieces. Now we have every classroom completely furnished with new, modern, up-to-date pupils' seats and desks. Much (at least five complete class-rooms) of this new furniture can be moved directly to the new building when completed, thus eliminating some expense at that time.

In addition, we have added the following to our equipment:

- 1 Ditto Liquid Duplicator.
- 1 Film Slide Projector.
- 1 Radiant Screen.

- 1 Portable Record Player.
- 1 RCA Victor Record Library.
- 1 Set Book of Knowledge.
- 1 Picture Reference Library.
- 2 Metal Filing Cabinets.
- 1 Set of Book House.
- 12 Swings for Playground.
- 1 Set Elementary History Maps
- 1 Beginners' Globe Map.

This is a partial list of the equipment necessary to operate a modern school to meet the needs of the boys and girls of today. It is my recommendation that we continue to supply the necessary tools and equipment for the proper instruction of our boys and girls.

THE FUTURE.

The educational opportunities for the young people of Upton have been advanced in many ways during the past year. By far the most important, however, took place when the townspeople at a special town meeting held August 9th, voted to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,000.00 for the purpose of erecting and equipping a consolidated grammar school. This was to be done providing the State would reimburse the town at least 40 % of the cost. At this meeting the school building committee, made up of the following members: Donald B. Johnson, Elsie J. Craib, Robert E. Maynard, Ernest B. Porter, Allan S. Donham, Gordon E. Benson, and George N. O. Poirier, was authorized to enter into such contracts as were necessary to carry out the intent of this vote.

It is not within the province of this report to give in detail the accomplishments of the school building committee. Suffice it to say an architect has been selected and that plans

are being drawn for the erection of such a Consolidated Grammar School upon the site originally occupied by Upton High School.

It is predicted by the architectural firm designing the building that it will be ready for occupancy early in the school year 1950-51.

Due to prevailing uncertainties it is impossible to determine, however, what our administrative schedule will be until plans are further advanced. Therefore, I recommend that we maintain our present arrangement until such time as it is certain that our pupils can be provided for in the new building.

With the continued support of the townspeople, which has been so generously given in the past, the educational future seems bright for the young people of Upton.

In closing I wish to express appreciation to all school employees for their co-operation during the past year. I am particularly grateful for the advice and assistance given me by the School Committee.

REPORT OF THE
SUPERVISOR OF PHYSICAL EDUCATION.

Mr. Ralph C. Sturke, Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Supervisor of Physical Education in the Public Schools of Upton.

Physical Education through regular use of the tools at hand aims to put into the everyday life of the boy and girl those experiences out of which will come common sense in action, sound judgment in making decisions, delight in doing, and joy in accomplishment. The tools are the game, the skill, the team, the stunt, the dance; the rules, the score, the playground, the playroom, and the equipment. The use of these to their fullest extent for the enrichment of the life of the pupil is the general purpose of Physical Education.

By reason of the experiences provided in Physical Education under guidance of the teacher, boys and girls at the end of the fifth grade should be able to:

- Follow directions.
- Wait their turns willingly.
- Play without fighting.
- Learn game fundamentals.
- Stand, walk, sit in good posture.
- Run and hop without falling.
- Skip, walk, gallop, turn, march in rhythm.
- Jump over a knee-high object.
- Leap and touch an object held about two feet above his reach.
- Do and enjoy rhythms and dances.
- Catch and throw a ball using underhand, overhand, chest and side arm throws.

- Bounce a ball to himself and to another.
- Perform stunts.
- Play games, and know them by name.
- Know the names, uses and care of equipment.
- Initiate useful activity on the playground.
- Win or lose gracefully.
- Show sportsmanship at all times.

Objectives in one grade are carried over and stressed in the next.

The facilities are the playground, the classroom, the corridor, and the playroom. The Physical Education program is adapted to such facilities as are available.

The time allotted to this program is as follows:

- Instructional period—30 or 40 minutes once a week.
- Organized play and recess—30 minutes daily.
- Before school and lunch periods—allow the pupil to take part in the activities that have been taught in the instructional period.

Activities are such as to provide reasonable protection against injury. Training in self-protection through the development of alertness, and by removing or avoiding physical hazards are progressively given throughout the grades.

PROCEDURE:

Introductory Exercises—5% of Physical Education Program:

Forming in line, and forming a circle, first by measuring distance or joining hands, and later by judging with the eye, constitute primary training in space relationship. Skill in

this must be developed early. Frequent use of circles, lines, and moving freely in imitation play, avoiding contact with others, will aid the development of the sense of space and distance and independent movement.

Examples of Imitation Play:

- Thanksgiving Turkey Hunt.
- Trimming the Christmas Tree.

Self-Testing and Stunts—10% of Program:

These activities are challenges to physical ability. They develop a sense of balance, and also give the child an opportunity to "show off" in a situation which is wholesome, and they often meet the need of the child who has not found himself in his group.

Examples of Self Testing and Stunts:

- Bean Bag Toss into a Circle.
- Elephant Walk.

Rhythms—25% of Program:

Dancing is fun, and it is a form of self expression. Singing games and folk dances appeal very strongly to the elementary pupils.

Examples of Rhythms:

- Do You Know the Muffin Man?
- Hickory Dickory Dock.
- Virginia Reel.

Games—60% of the Program:

Games afford great enjoyment and offer opportunities for the wholesome direction of the child's interests and energy. Some types of games are: running and chasing; athletic contests; games using equipment; relay races.

Examples of Games:

Hill Dill, Come Over the Hill.

Squirrels in Trees.

Kickball.

REPORT OF THE MUSIC SUPERVISOR.

Mr. Ralph C. Sturke,
Superintendent of Schools.

I should like to submit to you my annual report of the music program in the Schools of Upton, Massachusetts.

The aim of the program is to foster an enjoyment and appreciation for music so that it becomes a vital part of each pupil's everyday experience. Through the constant efforts of the elementary grade teachers, we are trying to develop daily the skills and fundamentals of theory into a foundation upon which we may build more fluent music readers and more accurate musicians.

Many children in the first grade are just beginning to use their singing voices, so great emphasis is put upon the quality of tone, pitch, diction and breathing. During the first year we attempt to develop good singing while building a repertory of

songs. Rhythmic expression is evidenced through activity songs, interpretation of the music, through swaying, marching and rhythm band.

This program is continued into the second year where the elementals of theory are introduced and children become familiar with the staff, scale and note arrangements.

Gradually, through drill and practice in the third and fourth grades, the children are trained to eye and ear recognition of familiar patterns, to singing figures at sight, and to comprehension of time, until, in the fourth year, they are able to sing a new song with a minimum of assistance from the teacher.

When the reading skills have been acquired, attention may be given to more difficult problems of theory, two and three-part singing and interpretation. Music appreciation and dancing add variety to the daily program. In this plan of study for the fifth and sixth grades often times listening and interpreting may stimulate creative activity. This as a phase we shall attempt to develop later in the year.

In the execution of the whole program total co-operation is essential to the administration and parents whose support sponsors this music training, to the teachers who so conscientiously carry out the program, to the students whose active participation contributes to the enjoyment of teaching, I offer my sincere appreciation for this co-operation which I have always found throughout the entire system.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ART.

Mr. Ralph C. Sturke,
Superintendent of Schools:

I hereby submit my second annual report as Supervisor of Art in the Public Schools of Upton.

Art Education is essential to general education. It enriches the lives of the children and contributes to the full development of each child for the community in which he lives. Participation and enjoyment in its many forms of expression are among the finest contributions that our schools offer to the children of today. To give them what art has to offer helps to refine, enrich and uplift their lives. Only one child in a hundred may eventually adopt art as a profession but the other ninety-nine may be helped to develop many desirable habits.

The aims of art education can be gathered into four categories:

1. Development of creative ability.
2. Appreciation and enjoyment of art.
3. Awareness and practical knowledge of art in everyday life.
4. Development of accepting responsibilities and working with others.

These aims serve as a basis for the art curriculum:

Development of creative ability:

Creativeness has to do with thinking and feeling as well as doing. In the primary grades, life situations are utilized to give point and purpose to the simple creative urges of the child. Units of work on familiar things, such as the home,

school, farm, community, seasonal activities, holidays, and favorite stories, are developed. At first, the class is motivated by either lively discussion, dramatization, or music. The individual needs of the children are met through the use of a variety of media such as crayons, colored construction paper, plasterline, and fingerpaint, which are used in both individual and group work. The child is encouraged to organize well and express ideas and feelings freely and adequately.

In grades 4-6, some of the art work is correlated with subjects such as social studies, geography, English, history, etc. Imagination, organization, observation, plus workmanship, are stressed and expressed through color, line, dark and light, form and texture. Projects in crayon, watercolor, chalk, cut paper, paper sculpture, paper mache, murals, scale models, blockprinting, and lettering have been carried out.

In general, a child's impulses, emotions and capacities are respected and he responds with direct and fearless statements. Creative art develops alertness, freshness of outlook, imagination, and resourcefulness, all of which are needed in our rapidly moving, modern civilization.

Appreciation and enjoyment of art:

Art is not merely drawing and painting but an appreciation of art in its many forms. Every child is given the opportunity to enjoy the beauty in the out-of-doors—the color, shapes, and rhythms in various effects of nature. Therefore, when weather permits, many art classes are conducted out-of-doors in an effort to absorb the natural beauty that surrounds us. This phase of art experience gives much joy to the child and is valuable to him in many ways.

In order to appreciate and enjoy art, the child must understand certain phases of it. In all grades the child is taught to understand the beauty of color, the many effects that light

has upon it, and ways in which color expresses emotions, such as happiness and gaiety, sadness and dreariness, strength and forcefulness. Along with color, dark and light are considered. The ways in which dark against light is used to make things stand out as more important than others, and the balance of dark and light in various forms, are recognized. Form and texture, both in drawing and painting and in three-dimensional work, such as modeling, paper sculpture, scale models, etc., are also considered. These and other important phases of art are stressed. They are approached in accordance to the child's age level and capacities.

Appreciation is a natural growth of participation, and opportunities are given for class discussions of their own work in an endeavor to build desirable attitudes and appreciations toward the efforts of others. Many important points of emphasis are carried over to the children by their seeing and discussing art work of the old masters and contemporary artists.

Awareness and practical knowledge of art in everyday life:

When art is really understood and felt, it becomes a part of daily living. Arranging furniture in a room, hanging pictures, choosing a color for the walls, arranging flowers in a bowl, recognizing good design in advertising, book jackets, Christmas cards, and designing our own—any of these become a design experience when there is an effort to do the things as well as possible. Every child is encouraged to develop good taste. Opportunities for experimenting with these practical experiences are offered in art classes at all levels according to the age levels and capacities of the children.

Development of accepting responsibilities and working with others:

Group projects help in the experience of exchanging of ideas with one another and developing them. The children

learn to work together harmoniously, share responsibilities, and give constructive criticism to their classmates and to themselves. Committees are formed, whose duties are to organize the various groups and see that the work of each child is finished and up to standards set by the class. Students are also responsible for the distribution, care, and collection of the materials used in this work. Group projects have included murals, table displays, scale model villages, and a scale model house, with each piece of furniture designed and executed in wood, plus papering walls and upholstering furniture, which was carried out by the sixth grade class.

Modern teaching inducts the child into the sphere of living art, and the aim of modern art instruction is to develop a sound feeling for art that will be of service in whatever situation the child may find himself in later life.

REPORT OF HANDWRITING SUPERVISOR.

Mr. Ralph C. Sturke,
Superintendent of Schools.

I am pleased to submit the following report of the operation of the handwriting program in the Upton Schools for the school year of 1948-1949.

In the initial handwriting tests administered in September 1934, 26% of your pupils received a grade of "A" (Excellent); 26% received a grade of "B" (Good); and

48% were graded less than "B". In the tests administered in June 1949, 87.2% of your pupils received a grade of "A", 7.7% received a grade of "B"; and 5.1% scored less than "B". Handwriting certificates were awarded to 77% of your sixth grade pupils.

During the school year we graded approximately 2000 formal samples of handwriting for your pupils. A formal test was administered monthly and a report was sent to each teacher giving a careful diagnosis of the handwriting of each pupil in her room.

We furnish the following instructional materials: monthly teachers' outlines, pupil folder outlines, room motivation certificates, handedness tests, individual handwriting certificates for eighth grade pupils who qualified, monthly and term envelopes, seals, etc.

My supervisors join with me in expressing our appreciation for the splendid cooperation we have received from you and your teachers at all times. We are very pleased with the results obtained in your schools.
