## ANNUAL TOWN MEETING WARRANT

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MARCH 4, 1957

Worcester, ss

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of  
Worcester, Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Fourth day of March, 1957, punctually, at Seven (7) o'clock A.M. to cast their vote for the following town officers:

Article 1. To choose all necessary town officers as follows: Moderator, Town Treasurer, Road Commissioner, Tree Warden and five Constables, all for one year; one member of the Board of Selectmen, one member of the Board of Assessors of Taxes, one member of the Board of Public Welfare, one member of the School Committee, one member of the Water and Sewer Commission, one member of the Cemetery Commission, one member of the Park Commission, three Trustees of the Public Library, and Collector of Taxes, all for three years; one member of the School Committee for one year, one member of the School Committee for two years, one member of the Housing Authority for five years, and one member of the Planning Board for five years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall close at Eight (8) o'clock P.M. on day of said meeting.

The remaining articles contained in the Warrant will be acted upon at an adjourned meeting of voters in Town Hall on Saturday afternoon, March 9, 1957 at Two (2) o'clock P.M.

Article 2. To hear the reports of all Town Officers, and do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear the reports of any committees appointed by the Town, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108, Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commission, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Park Commission, Tree Warden, Road Commissioner, Water and Sewer Commission, and Planning Board.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of Town Departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal, post-natal and pre-school nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1957, and to issue a note or notes therefor payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate One Thousand Four Hundred Fifteen Dollars and Eight Cents (\$1415.08) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.



Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of and the purpose of Chapter 128, General Laws, or for the support of demonstration work in Agriculture, Home Economics, or Boys' and Girls' Club Work, under the direction of the Agent or Instructor, or the Trustee, cooperating with local Town Director, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00), said money for payment of a 1956 bill of the Board of Health for administering Polio Vaccine, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Dollars (\$54.00) for installation of a 6000-lumen electric street light on Pole #23-59 at Main Street and Hartford Avenue, said sum to be added to the Street Lights Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) for installation of a 2500-lumen electric street light on #4, Milford Street, adjacent to property of George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, said sum to be added to the Street Lights Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Two Hundred and Eighty-eight Dollars (\$2288) for the laying of a water main of not less than four inches in diameter from Fiske Avenue to Memorial School, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to rescind that part of action taken at a Special Town Meeting, December 22, 1955, under Article 7 for the remodelling and repairs to Town Hall Building, in which the Selectmen were authorized to borrow the sum of Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00), repayable in equal installments over a period of not more than two years, and the Treasurer is hereby authorized to issue and sell serial, coupon bonds

or notes of the town, each issue of said bonds or notes to bear such date, such rate of interest, and to mature at such time, not exceeding two years from the date thereof, and to be in such form and to be sold in such manner as shall be determined by the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4500.00) for Chapter 81 Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State for this purpose, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) for Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the treasury, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) for Chapter 90 Highway Construction, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, or transfer from available funds in the treasury, Four Thousand Dollars (\$4000.00) for General Highway Maintenance on Chapter 81 Roads, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the purchase of Forest Fire Hose, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1956 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Seven Hundred Fifty-six Dollars and Fifty-six Cents (\$756.56) received from the County, to the School Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to increase the number of the Board of Selectmen from Three (3) to Five (5) Members as of the 1958 Annual Town Election, as petitioned for by more than ten registered voters, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to have the members of the Board of Selectmen elected for One (1) Year beginning with the 1958 March Election, as petitioned for by more than ten registered voters, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to accept the provisions of Chapter 332, Acts of 1955, as amended by Chapter 639, Acts of 1955, "An Act To Authorize The Levy Of Special Assessments To Meet The Cost Of Laying Water Pipes In Public And Private Ways", or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) as the Town's share of the cost of purchase and installation of a Two-Way Radio Communication System between the Upton Police Department and State Police, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1800.00) to be used with matching funds from Federal or State Civil Defense, or both, to purchase and install a Two-Way Radio Communication System to furnish communication for the Town Departments charged with the protection of life and property in the Town of Upton, said amount to be added to the Civil Defense Appropriation, or take any action in relation thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:—At each of the post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

## PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION

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MARCH 4, 1957

Pursuant to the Warrant, Moderator George W. Grebenstein called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

After reading the call of the meeting and Article 1 for the choosing of all necessary officers, Harvey L. Martindale moved that reading of the remainder of the articles be waived at this time as they would be acted upon at the adjourned Town Meeting, March 9 at 2 P.M. Motion was seconded and voted. Moderator Grebenstein then directed that the remainder of the Warrant and the Constable's return be read.

Preceding the opening of the meeting, Moderator Grebenstein invited any voter in the hall to inspect the ballot box. The box's indicator was set at 0000. The open ballot box was inspected by voters and election officials before the reading of the Warrant. Police Officer Edward C. Rock was on duty at the ballot box.

A sealed box purporting to contain 1900 ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to Moderator Grebenstein, who in turn delivered the box to the ballot clerks.

Checkers at the in-coming table were Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and Ernest J. Henchey (R) and at the outgoing table at ballot box, Mrs. Catherine M. Saucier (D) and LeRoy W. Prentiss (R).

William R. Rhodes was the first voter to cast a ballot.

Indicator at ballot box at hourly intervals read as follows: 8 A.M., 41 ballots; 9 A.M., 56; 10 A.M., 93; 11 A.M., 144; noon, 180; 1 P.M., 226; 2 P.M., 270; 3 P.M., 335; 4 P.M., 395; 5 P.M., 551; 6 P.M., 710; 7 P.M., 898 and 8 P.M., 1058.

Voting lists were checked and the checkers stated they corresponded in number of persons voting: 536 Men and 522 Women, total 1058; approximately 63½ percent of the town's voters.

First removal of ballots was at 3:25 P.M. when 300 ballots were removed from the ballot box and placed in envelopes in the presence of Moderator Grebenstein, Police Officer Rock, who held keys to the ballot box during voting hours, and election officials. At 6:30 P.M., 150 more ballots were taken from the ballot box and at 7:30 P.M., 100 ballots. The remaining ballots were taken from the ballot box after the polls closed — 508 ballots — making a total of 1058.

Tellers reporting at 5:30 P.M. to canvass the votes were: Mrs. Ada W. White (R), Mrs. Ruth A. Sweet (R), Eugene J. Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Yvonne M. Bissonnette (D), Mrs. Norma L. Taft (R), Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D), Mrs. Elizabeth Victor (D), Mrs. Ann E. Bingel (D), Mrs. Muriel S. Mitchell (R), Mrs. Adelaide E. Bartlett (R), Edward J. Gurry (D) and Mrs. Helen I. Donham (R).

Edward L. Prentiss (R) reported at 5 P.M. and Edward J. Furphy (D) at 5:30 P.M. They assisted at checkers' tables and to tabulate the vote.

Election officials took oath before the Town Clerk before assuming their respective duties.

Used and unused ballots were sealed and deposited in containers which were subsequently placed in the vault in Town Hall by Officer Rock.

Public declaration of the result of the voting was made at 11:13 P.M.

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## PROCEEDINGS OF THE ANNUAL ADJOURNED TOWN MEETING

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MARCH 9, 1957

Moderator George W. Grebenstein called the adjourned town meeting to order at the designated hour with more than a quorum (20 voters) present. The voting list was used at main entrance of the hall with Charles F. Caton (R) and Walter J. Stank (D) serving as checkers.

Mr. Grebenstein requested any non-voter seated on main floor to go to the balcony.

Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, seconded, that Town Counsel J. Laurence Doyle be permitted to be seated on main floor.

#### 1956 TOWN REPORT

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, seconded, to accept 1956 Town Report as printed.

#### NO SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

Article 3. No report by any Town Committee made.

#### ESTABLISH SALARIES AND EXPENSES

Article 4. In taking up Article 4, Selectman Rene E. Page moved to establish salaries and wages, amended by Halbert K. Struthers to take up each Department separately, seconded, and so voted.

Moderator Grebenstein said that if there was no objection, recommendation of the Finance Committee would be called. Voted: Salaries and expenses which had not been "passed". (a) Norman E. Walker, Chairman of Assessors, said he believed there was a misunderstanding regarding amount recommended for "Expenses" in Assessors' Department. Printed recommendation \$600.00. He stated that the Department had an appropriation of \$950.00 in 1956 and returned a balance to the treasury. Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale moved that the sum be increased for "Expenses" to \$950.00. Eugene I. Whiting, chairman of Finance Committee, endorsed the sum of \$950.00. Voted to establish "Expenses" at \$950.00. In view of an expected study of town officers' salaries-wages, Mr. Walker said he would not press for increase in the appropriation for salaries.

(b) and (c) Walter E. Hopkins, Jr., chairman of the Water-Sewer Commission, spoke at length on recommendations made to the Finance Committee and the recommendations of the said Committee, specially for the superintendent's salary.

Mr. Hopkins said the Commission had recommended the salary of \$1000.00 with the Finance Committee recommending \$800.00. (Salary was \$500.00 in 1956.)

Mr. Hopkins, Jr. asked Town Counsel Doyle if the town meeting set the salary of appointive town officer. Atty. Doyle replied that the article under consideration stipulated establishment of salaries or compensation only of elective officers of the town.

Oscar K. Bates asked the duties of the superintendent. Mr. Hopkins said it did not include use of privately-owned equipment.

In view of an expected study of town salaries and wages, Mr. Hopkins said the Commission would not request increase in remuneration at this time.

Oscar K. Bates then moved that "Salaries" and "Expenses" (not already established by vote) be set for town officers under the article as printed. Seconded. Voted.

It was then voted: On motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, with amendment by Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale, "that the Moderator appoint a committee of five to review and survey salaries and wages of town employes and town officials and report their recommendations at next annual town meeting or some earlier special town meeting called for that purpose."

Alexander Kennedy moved to reduce the special committee to three members. Standing vote directed by Moderator Grebenstein. Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols made the count. Result: Yes—31; No—47.

(Moderator Grebenstein subsequently appointed following committee: Alexander Kennedy, Eugene I. Whiting, Atty. Henry C. Walker, Robert E. Maynard and Olof Olson.)

## GENERAL APPROPRIATIONS

Article 5. Moderator Grebenstein stated that if there was no objection, each item of the Finance Committee's report under this article would be considered separately. He said that if a voter wished to be heard on an appropriation in the budget, the voter should say "Pass" when the item was called. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate Departmental items not "Passed."

(a) Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale stated that it was not required to appropriate: County Hospital Assessments, \$1,744.87 (as asked in budget) as Assessors included the assessment in establishing the tax rate. Voted: to "pass over" the item.

(b) Appropriations made when budget was being considered for Chapter 81, (\$4500.00); Chapter 90 Maintenance, (\$2,000.00) and Special Betterment and Maintenance of Chapter 81 Roads, (\$4000.00) were subsequently rescinded in that order when special articles pertaining to same items were reached in Warrant. Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale explained that this action was taken to have copies of articles and action to transmit to State and County officials.

(c) Insurance. Voted: to raise and appropriate \$2,600.00. It was explained by Selectman Rene E. Page that the increased amount was asked to provide more insurance on school buildings.

(d) Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale explained that the \$5,900.00 was for interest on the large Water Loan voted by the town. It was then voted on his motion to raise and appropriate the \$5,900.00.

(e), (f) and (g) Clement J. Lambert, agent of the Public Welfare Board, explained that it was his desire to have the appropriations of Old Age Assistance, Aid To Dependent Children and Disability Assistance (town's shares) combined in case there was a balance in one account and not a sufficient sum in one of the other two accounts which could be used to make payments near the end of a fiscal year.

Charles F. Caton, a member of the Public Welfare Board, also spoke in favor of such action.

Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of \$63,500.00 as the town's share for Old Age Assistance, Aid to Dependent Children and Disability Assistance. Motion duly seconded.

(h) Schools. Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale requested that the voters act on Article 20 at this time. The article asked for appropriating \$756.56 received from proceeds of the 1956 Dog Tax Refund to salaries account. Request was granted, there being no opposition.

Mr. Martindale then moved that the sum of \$756.56 be so appropriated from the 1956 Dog Tax Refund to the "Salaries" Account under "Schools." Motion was seconded and so voted.

Mr. Martindale then moved that the sum of \$56,665.84 be raised and appropriated for "Salaries" for "Schools". Motion seconded and so voted.

Finance Committee originally recommended \$57,572.40 for "Salaries-Schools." Mr. Martindale also explained that interest from another account is to be applied to the "Salaries" account so that the original recommendation could be reduced to \$56,665.84.

(i) Town Officers and Expenses. Voted: to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,867.25 on motion of Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale, duly seconded.

Mr. Martindale asked to have item "Passed over" when it was originally called until action had been taken on appropriations for the Water and Sewer Departments.

(j) Water and Sewer Department, Maintenance. Voted: on motion of John J. Fitch, member of the Water-Sewer Commission, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,940.00 for Water and Sewer Department Maintenance. (Commission originally asked for this amount.) Finance Committee recommended \$5,590.00)

During discussion on motion, Mr. Fitch said it would include a salary of \$1000 for the superintendent of the Department who was subject to call, 24 hours a day.

Other voters speaking included James Gallagher, clerk of the Finance Committee; Chairman Walter E. Hopkins, Jr. of the Water-Sewer Commission and Harrison E. Bates.

(k) Voted: To raise and appropriate the sum of \$475.00 for clerk and clerical supplies for the Water-Sewer Department. (Water-Sewer Commissioners requested \$600; Finance Committee recommended \$450.00.)

#### DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION

Article 6. Voted: on motion of Mrs. Elsie J. Craib, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal, post-natal, and pre-school nursing services, crippled children and well-child clinic services.

#### AUTHORIZATION TO BORROW MONEY

Article 7. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale, duly seconded, that the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be and hereby is authorized to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1957 and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws.

#### COUNTY RETIREMENT COMMITMENT

Article 8. Voted: on motion of Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred Fifteen Dollars (\$1415.00) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws, for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System.

#### COUNTY AID TO AGRICULTURE

Article 9. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, duly seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Dollars (\$50.00) to be paid to the

Trustees for County Aid to Agriculture, in accordance with the provisions of and the purpose of Chapter 128, General Laws, or for the support of demonstration work in Agriculture, Home Economics, or Boys' and Girls' Club Work, under the direction of the Agent or Instructor, or the Trustee, cooperating with local Town Director."

#### UNPAID 1956 BILL—BOARD OF HEALTH

Article 10. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, duly seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300.00) for the payment of a 1956 bill of the Board of Health for administering of Polio Vaccine. Moderator Grebenstein declared it an unanimous vote, there being no opposition.

#### ELECTRIC LIGHT

Main St. at Hartford Ave.

Article 11. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, duly seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty-four Dollars (\$54.00) for installation of a 6000-lumen electric street light on Pole #23 - 59 at Main Street and Hartford Avenue, said sum to be added to the Street Lights Account.

#### ELECTRIC LIGHT—MILFORD STREET

Article 12. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. Page, duly seconded, that the Town raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-four Dollars (\$24.00) for installation of a 2500-lumen electric street light on Pole No. 4, Milford Street, adjacent to property of George L. Wood Post, Veterans of Foreign Wars, said sum to be added to the Street Lights Account.

#### MEMORIAL SCHOOL WATER MAIN EXTENSION

Article 13. Voted: on motion of Walter E. Article 14. Voted: on motion of Selectman Rene E. It was explained by Mr. Martindale that there were special articles for these items, copies of which and action are sent to State and County officials. Motion to rescind was seconded and voted.

Standing vote: Yes—67; No—29. Count made by Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols.

Gordon E. Benson, Gustavus A. Anderson and Donald A. Wellman were nominated and elected from the floor to serve on the Special Committee as per motion.

Original motion was made by Donald A. Wellman, duly seconded, "that a Committee of Three be appointed from the floor, to investigate the radio communications needs of the Town of Upton, said Committee to report at a later meeting."

Fire Chief George N. O. Poirier then motion (as above voted) to amend Mr. Wellman's motion and it was duly seconded.

Moderator Grebenstein asked Selectman Ernest B. Porter to preside while he (Grebenstein) took the floor to speak on the subject. Mr. Grebenstein is local director of Civil Defense and also connected with the State Civil Defense. Halbert K. Struthers, a former moderator, was previously invited to temporarily preside but declined.

On motion of Town Clerk George G. Newton, duly seconded, a rising vote of appreciation was given to Leo F. Murphy for his faithful and efficient service to the townspeople as Town Treasurer for the past 22 years; also as a former Tax Collector and a former member of the Fire Department.

Town Treasurer Harvey L. Martindale moved, duly seconded, that the Warrant be dissolved and the meeting adjourned. Voted.

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REGIONAL SCHOOL QUESTION  
PROCEEDINGS OF  
SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

JUNE 10, 1957

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In the absence of Town Moderator George W. Grebenstein, who was at Hanover, N. H., observing his 50th anniversary of graduation from Dartmouth College, the meeting was called to order at the designated hour by Town Clerk George G. Newton.

Nominations were asked for a temporary moderator of the meeting.

Chairman of Selectmen Rene E. Page nominated Halbert K. Struthers as temporary moderator, seconded by Selectman Gladys G. Crockett.

Town Clerk asked for other nominations. No other name was submitted. Motion was made to close nominations, seconded, and voted.

Town Clerk appointed Mrs. Adelaide E. Bartlett (R) and Mrs. Helen T. Jonis (D) as checkers and tellers in the election of a temporary moderator. Ballots were distributed by Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin P. Nichols. Twelve ballots were cast. Same number of voters' names were checked on voting list. Mr. Struthers was declared elected temporary moderator and took oath of office.

Mr. Struthers read Article 1. Eugene I. Whiting, chairman of the Finance Committee, stated that although no appropriation was asked in the Warrant, the Committee accepted the Regional School plan in principle.

Donald B. Johnson, one of the three members and clerk of the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Planning Board, spoke on the Committee's report contained in the brochure which had been mailed to townspeople.

He stated that after 12 years the voters were still grappling with the school housing situation; that if a Mendon-Upton Regional district was favored, it would be the smallest such district in the Commonwealth; that it had approval of state authorities owing to the "dire necessity of this town" and need in Mendon, and that Upton could not afford to build its own junior-senior high school at this time.

Several questions were asked of Mr. Johnson and there was a discussion on the general subject. Among those speaking were Robert M. Stuart, Selectman Crockett, Francis Caputo, George N. O. Poirier, Gordon E. Benson, George H. Donham, Donald A. Wellman and Raymond Whiting.

Voted: on motion of Eugene I. Whiting to accept report on the Mendon-Upton Regional School Committee, seconded by Selectman Gladys G. Crockett. No opposition voiced.

With no further discussion, Temporary Moderator said that balloting on the question contained in Article 2 of the Warrant would begin if there was no opposition. There was none.

Temporary Moderator appointed Edward L. Furphy (D) and Edward L. Prentiss (R) as ballot clerks and Mrs. Bartlett (R) and Mrs. Jonis (D) as checkers at ballot box. They also were named to serve as tellers. Constable Alfred R. Nichols was at the ballot box.

At 9:45 P.M. Town Clerk Newton motioned that the voting be continued until 10 P.M. Motion was seconded and so voted with no opposition. Temporary Moderator Struthers closed the balloting at 10 P.M.

During the voting period, 199 men and 130 women, total 329, cast a specially prepared ballot.

(Upton had 1545 names on the voting list as of today: 758 men and 787 women.

After vote was announced that it favored Upton entering a Regional School District for the purpose of establishing a junior-senior high school, Temporary Moderator Struthers appointed Mrs. Elsie J. Craib, a former member of the School Committee, and Howard B. Sether as two members of the Regional District School Committee if Mendon took favorable action on the same question. The third Upton member would be appointed by the School Committee.

(Voters of Mendon rejected the proposed district plan by a vote of Yes—212; No—285, on the same evening.)

Motion was made to dissolve the Warrant and adjourn, seconded, and voted.

Atty. Henry C. Walker moved to amend the motion to read that there be a levy of a special assessment of Thirty (30) Per Cent in place of "to meet the whole or part" of costs. The amendment was seconded and accepted by Selectman Crockett as part of her original motion.



Subsequently Selectman Ernest B. ## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

---

To the Board of Selectmen:

The year 1957 has passed and Upton is still located in a *Reception Zone* in Area 3, Sector 3B with Sector Headquarters located at the Milford High School (Tel. Milford 851). The Area Headquarters continue to be at the Lyman School in Westboro. *Theodore Aptt* is *Sector Director* and *Harold F. Rossi* the *Area Director*, both of whom are efficient and cooperative at all times.

Whenever there is a *War Emergency* or when the Governor of Massachusetts has declared a *State of Emergency* and disaster has struck, all of Upton's requests for outside aid and assistance are to be transmitted to Sector 3B Headquarters via telephone to Milford 851 or over our Gonset Communicator now installed at our *Control Center* in the basement of the Upton Town Hall. The frequency is 53.50. Our Control Center may be contacted by telephoning LAkeside 9-6901.

*Use of Matching Funds.* A two-way Motorola Radio communication system has been ordered and will soon be installed in Upton with the *Main Station* at the Central Fire Station on Church Street with *Remote Control* at the residence of the Chief of Police on Main Street and a *Portable Radio Phone* is to be located at the Civil Defense Headquarters in the Town Hall. *Four Mobile Units* will be installed as follows:

- One in the new 750 gal. *Fire Dept. Pumper*
- One in the *Forest Fire Truck* for the *Fire Dept.*
- One in the *Auto of the Chief of Police* and
- One in the *Service Truck of the Supt. of Streets* for use of *Highway and Water Departments.*

The committee and I believe that this equipment will be of greater value over the years than can be appraised by anyone at this time. In time of any emergency this system will be of great service to all the Town Departments and to all citizens of Upton and West Upton. The cost through Civil Defense Matching Funds \$1800.

*Radioactive Fallout.* The "fallout" is very dangerous to everyone, and the only way to detect it is by radiological monitoring with instruments to measure radiation. On March 18, 1957 at the Memorial School the Rev. Thomas Smith, S.J., of the Holy Cross College Physics Department and Radiac officer for the 79 cities and towns of Area 3 Massachusetts Civil Defense spoke on "Radiac Fallout" and explained to all those present what the people should do in case of an enemy bombing attack.

*Training Course.* Eugene I. Whiting, *Upton Radiac Officer* has held a training course at the Central Fire Station. The personnel of the Upton Fire, Police, Water, Sewer and Highway Departments and the local Red Cross took this course which it is believed was very constructive and beneficial to the citizens of the town in order to be prepared for a disaster. We have two complete sets of instruments for monitoring and testing "fallout". One set of the equipment is located in the Church Street Fire Station with Francis E. Aldrich in charge of same. The other set is at the home of Radiac Officer Eugene I. Whiting. Additional dosimeters are being ordered.

*C. D. Meetings and C. C. X's.* There have been numerous meetings and exercises at Area and Sector Headquarters which have been attended by your Director and by members of the Upton staff.

*Communication Tests* are made on the 1st and 3rd Wednesday evenings of each month between 7 and 8 P.M. with *C. D. Sector Headquarters* by Gerald Shaughnessy, Edith Shaughnessy and Joseph A. Deering assist on occasion.

*Civil Defense Literature.* *Alert Today—Alive Tomorrow.* All citizens must realize by now that *Survival Literature* may be obtained by simply requesting same from

your local C. D. Director. An *Air Raid Instruction* card (size 8" x 11") should be in every household!

The *First Aid Class* of the American Red Cross concluded the new type course of five (5) weeks in December. The following *Explorer Scouts* received certificates.

## WATER AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS

For the year ending December 31, 1957

This past year all the meters were sealed, and all old meters replaced. Water was extended to the new school and a hydrant set in place. Pipes were driven at each well and each valve at the well field, so they may be located in the future.

There was a large break in the water main going over the bridge on Milford Street. We replaced this section with cast iron pipe.

The Upton Grange gave markers for each hydrant for which we wish to express our thanks.

## NEW CONSTRUCTION

In the early spring water mains will be installed on Elm and Milford Streets. These projects will be done under the betterment system. That, we think, is a step in the right way for all future water extensions.

We feel that the Town should be warned about our sewerage disposal plant in W. Upton. We have been informed by the State Board of Health that it will have to be rebuilt in 2 to 5 years. The Federal Government is now allowing thirty per cent of cost to Towns towards construction. But this will still leave a large sum to be expended by the Town. We would like to have the Town start, by establishing a fund each year towards this new disposal plant, so that a large sum would not have to be spent all at once.

During the year 1957, we pumped 47,905,076 gallons of water. The month of July was the largest, with the total of 5,289,800 gallons used.

## REPORT OF THE HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

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Chapter 81 funds maintained Chapter 81 roads by graveling, patching, surface treatments and drainage.

The 1957 work on Chapter 90 Construction on Pleas-

ant Street, started at the town line, in order to coincide with the Northbridge Chapter 90 project. At the present time the sub-grade is nearing completion.

Out of Chapter 90 Maintenance Special account, which was set up for the Hartford Avenue culvert near the DeMarco residence, a retaining wall was built and new concrete pipe laid from the fire hole to the catch basin, replacing part of the stone culvert. The fire hole was filled in as a safety measure.

Upkeep of Chapter 90 roads, Hopkinton, Mendon and Westboro, was taken from Chapter 90 Maintenance.

Due to better weather conditions, the Snow Removal account shows an unexpended balance of \$2,005.82.

With Chapter 81 Maintenance and Betterment monies we were able to finish widening and oiling Prospect Street and Ridge Road.

From the Sidewalk account, further extension of sidewalk was made from the Donald property to the Young property on Maple Avenue, and a new sidewalk begun on Grove Street, in front of the Methodist Church.

The Bridge account provided the replacement of the deck on the Grafton Road bridge. The small bridge on South Street was replanked and new guardrail erected.



At this time, I wish to thank all the Town Departments, the Department of Public Works, and the Townspeople, for their cooperation, in any way, during the year.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the fiscal year 1956, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. William Schwartz, Assistant Director of Accounts.

Sir:

As directed by you, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the fiscal year 1956, and report thereon as follows:

The records of the financial transactions of the several departments receiving or disbursing money for the town or committing bills for collection were examined, checked, and verified by comparison with the records and reports in the offices of the town accountant and the treasurer.

The books and accounts of the town accountant were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were compared with the treasurer's books and with the records in the several departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, while the recorded payments were checked with the selectmen's warrants authorizing them. The appropriations and transfers, as entered on the ledger, were checked with the town clerk's records of town meeting votes and with the transfers from the reserve fund as authorized by the finance committee.

The general and appropriation ledger accounts were analyzed, the necessary adjusting entries resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, a copy of which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on December 31, 1956.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked. The cash book was added throughout, and the cash balance on February 18, 1957 was verified by actual count of the cash in the office, by examination of a savings bank book, and by reconciliation of the bank balances with statements received from the banks in which town funds are deposited.

The recorded receipts were analyzed and checked with the town accountant's books, with the records of the several departments collecting money for the town, and with other sources from which money is paid into the town treasury. The payments were compared with the treasury warrants authorizing the treasurer to disburse town funds and with the town accountant's ledger.

Payments on account of maturing debt and interest were proved with the amounts falling due and with the cancelled securities and coupons on file. The outstanding coupons on February 18, 1957 were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account as shown by a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investment of the trust and investment funds in the custody of the treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed, the income being proved and the withdrawals verified.

The payroll deductions from employees' salaries and wages for Federal taxes and for the county retirement system were examined and checked. The amounts withheld were compared with the treasurer's recorded receipts, and the payments to the Federal depository and the county treasurer were checked with the vouchers on file.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked in detail. The amounts added to the tax title account were compared with the collector's and the accountant's books, and the redemptions were checked with the entries in the treasurer's cash book. The tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed and reconciled with the ledger controls, and all transactions were checked with the records at the Registry of Deeds.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked. The tax and excise accounts outstanding at the time of the previous examination, as well as all subsequent commitments, were audited and proved with the assessors' warrants issued for their collection. The cash book additions were verified; the recorded collections were compared with the treasurer's cash receipts; the abatements were checked with the assessors' records of abatements granted; the transfers to the tax title account were verified; and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the respective controlling accounts in the ledger.

The records of departmental, water, and sewer accounts receivable were examined. The commitments were verified; the recorded collections were proved with the payments to the treasurer; the abatements as recorded were compared with the departmental records of abatements granted; and the outstanding accounts were listed, checked with the available records in the several departments, and reconciled with the controlling ledger accounts.

Verification of the tax, excise, water, and sewer accounts was made by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The computation of the tax rate for 1956 was examined and checked. The records of abatements granted by the board of assessors were checked with the books of the collector and the accountant, and the warrants to the collector were listed and compared with the detailed commitments.

The receipts of the town clerk for dog and sporting licenses issued and for miscellaneous receipts were examined and checked with the records of licenses issued, the payments to the town treasurer and to the Division of Fisheries and Game, as well as the cash on hand, being verified.

The appropriations as voted by the town meetings were listed from the records of the town clerk and compared with the aggregate appropriations raised by the assessors.

The surety bonds of the various town officials required by law to furnish them were examined and found to be in proper form.

The records of the board of selectmen, the sealer of weights and measures, the wire inspector, and the milk inspector, as well as of the police, fire, highway, public welfare, veterans' services, school, library, and cemetery departments, were examined and checked, the payments to the treasurer being verified.

Appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, are tables showing reconciliations of the treasurer's and collector's cash, summaries of the tax, excise, departmental, and water accounts, as well as schedules showing the condition and transactions of the trust and investment accounts.

During the progress of the audit cooperation was extended by the several town officials, for which, on behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation.

## REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

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December 31, 1957

To the Board of Selectmen of Upton:

The activities of the Planning Board have naturally divided themselves into two distinct groups: subdivision control and general planning.

During the past year in the Subdivision Control category plans were endorsed as not requiring approval by the Board. One subdivision on Plain Street was approved after a public hearing and conferences with the Water and Sewer Commissioners, the Highway Department, the Board of Selectmen, and the subdivider.

Under the general planning heading the Board provided the town with a street map, attended and participated in public hearings and Selectmen's meetings when the future welfare of the Town was involved, and participated in a series of seminars conducted by Clark University in which all phases of planning were discussed.

Proposed regulations regarding sewerage disposal and water supplies were submitted to the Board of Health in hopes of insuring safe water supplies to all persons in the Town.

In the addition to the above and of greatest concern to the Board has been the consideration of a Zoning By-Law which will protect the present and future residents of the Town. A special committee has drawn up a tentative By-Law and map which are now being reviewed and amended by the Board as a whole. The Planning Board expects to present to the voters a just and workable Zoning By-Law which will help to protect the health, safety, and welfare of the Townspeople by providing a plan for future growth and development. Without a plan of this nature put into the form of a Town By-Law we will continue to suffer the agonies of a growing community. With

a Zoning By-Law we can plan and regulate the location of various types of activities and alleviate, to a great extent, these growing pains.

In our plans for the coming year, after completion of the proposed Zoning By-Law, we hope to provide the town with a reasonable and equitable plan for the growth of the water system so that the town water may be extended as far as possible, bearing in mind that the system must be as self supporting as soon as is possible.

## LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

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To the Trustees of the Upton Library:

The librarian respectfully submits her annual report with library statistics, list of periodicals, and the catalog of new books.

Books have been added to the Dr. Carpenter alcove as required.

Gifts of magazines and books have been received from Mrs. Rosalie Lent, Mrs. Eleanor Merrill, Mr. Chester Walker, Mr. David Colcord, Mr. Carl Paulson, Mr. Halbert Struthers and the Kiwanis Club.

This year, 82 new borrowers were registered; 45 children and 37 adults. Our approximate registration is 650; of which 460 are active borrowers, 250 juvenile and 210 adult.

Last summer a total of 90 children registered in the two Reading Clubs and Story Hour.

The older children formed a World Travelers Club. They traveled all over the world by way of books; learning about the customs ways of people in other countries. When a book was read and reviewed, travel labels were pasted on their cardboard suitcases. At the end of the summer, two foreign students from Clark University were procured to speak to the children. Miss Kaniz Yusuf from Pakistan and Mrs. Yukiko Nichols from Japan with her small daughter, Kiyo. They wore native costumes.

The Flight Club composed of the younger readers received wings when they had read ten books. The two

clubs were combined for the party with the foreign students, held on the lawn at the librarian's house. Some of the members of the club brought a wonderful display of foreign dolls. The children liked Miss Yusuf and Yukiko and little Kiyo and asked many intelligent questions showing their keen interest. I was proud of them.

If children start the reading habit early, they will benefit from it all their lives, I believe. Learning about other people and other countries will help strengthen an understanding and unity in the world for which we all hope.

It is a pleasure during Book Week in November to give book reviews to every grade introducing the new books to the children. Both teachers and pupils are enthusiastic and appreciative.

We have loaned 100 books to the school library. Children living too far away to use the town library now have access to books. Library Day at the school is looked forward to each week. There is an average circulation of 160 books weekly.

I wish to thank Miss Helen Fay for substituting for me during my vacation.

I am grateful for Joann Smith's able help. The new electric clock in the library is most appreciated.

I thank the Trustees for their generous support and cooperation.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

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To the Upton School Committee

Upton, Massachusetts

Mrs. Kathleen Maynard and Gentlemen:

It is a pleasure to submit my fifth annual report in relation to educational achievement and progress in the Upton Public Schools. Working together and achieving together constitute the formula which stimulates the progress of educational development in the Upton schools.

The present period of school administration is beset with many major administrative problems. These problems are not local in nature, but constitute an all-over pattern in the field of education. Increased costs due to inflationary trends, the demand for an improved quality of education, together with the demand for increased facilities resulting from more children to be educated, all tend to compound the problems confronting superintending school committees everywhere.

1. The Superintendent of Schools recommends to the Upton School Committee and urges the citizens of Upton to continue to study into the problem of housing and providing adequate secondary school facilities for Upton students.

2. The Superintendent of Schools recommends to the Upton School Committee and urges the citizens of Upton to study the need for additional space requirements for elementary school pupils.

3. The Superintendent of Schools recommends a continual study of adequate salaries for school teachers in conjunction with recommendations now pending before the General Court.

The School Committee of Upton, acting for the citizenry, is to be commended for its ever-present willingness to come to grips with problems demanding solution in the interests of the children of Upton.

The Union Committee took a forward step in providing increased supervision and direction to the eight elementary schools comprising the School Union in the appointment of a Director of Elementary Education.

The following statistical reports will provide an analysis showing how well Upton is meeting the educational needs of its children in terms of dollars:

Chart #1 — Comparative Per-Pupil Costs of Towns Comparable to Upton and the average Per-Pupil expenditure state-wide.

Chart #2 — How the School Dollar was spent in 1957.

Chart #3 — Enrollment Projection for 1955 - 1964.

1. That Grafton and Upton Union #8 is among the oldest School Unions in the State?
2. That the cost per pupil in Massachusetts Public Schools is \$275.57, and in towns comparable to Upton it is \$264.77, and that in Upton it is \$256.08?
3. That we transport 502 pupils?
4. That we have 19 students graduating from Northbridge High School in the Spring, and our entering class in the fall will be 63.
5. That the proceeds from the Risteen Fund are used for the improvement of the Public Schools of Upton?
6. That we have instituted a new Achievement Testing Program in all grades, and the results show the strength and weaknesses in the areas of study and are valuable in adapting teaching to the needs of our students?

7. That the gross business of the cafeterias of the Union amounts to \$50,000.00?
8. That the gross amount of School Budgets amount to \$591,890.00?
9. That the Town of Upton received \$56,188.31 in reimbursements from the State in 1957?
10. That our teachers are constantly improving themselves through professional courses, conferences and group meetings?
11. That the Union has employed a Director of Elementary Education rendering service to the eight elementary schools?
12. That an Instrumental Music Program has been established in our elementary schools under the direction of Professor Warren Freeman, formerly Dean of Music at Boston University?

May I urge you to read the reports of the several supervisors employed by the Upton School Committee. These reports are both enlightening and informative.

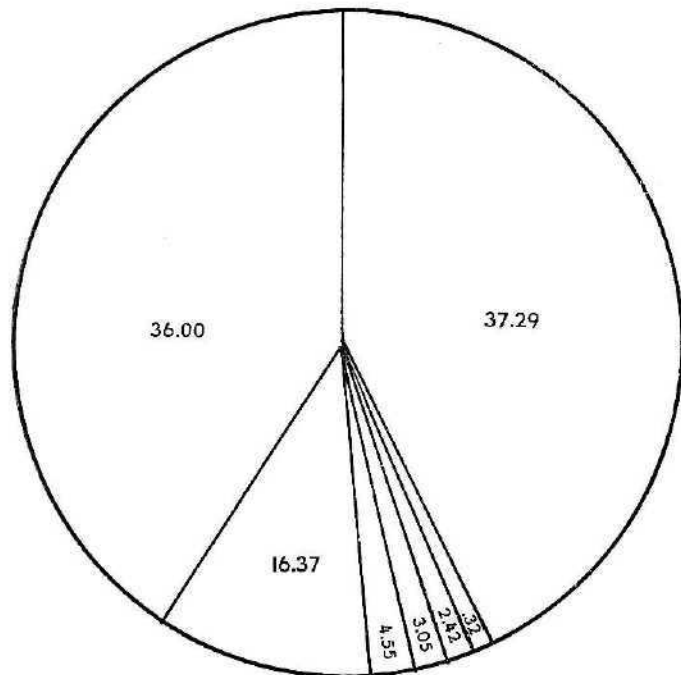

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## REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF ELEMENTARY EDUCATION

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Mr. Harry Y. Hilyard

Dear Mr. Hilyard:

It is with pleasure that your Director of Elementary Education submits his first annual report, through you, to the Upton School Committee.

The nature of the Director's activities is to supervise the operations of the elementary schools by co-ordinating the program of studies; increasing the efficiency of the curriculum so that optimum rewards are received by the children in terms of mental, physical, social, emotional, and psychological growth; administering to the needs of the physical plants, teaching and non-teaching personnel, and attending to related administrative detail which directly and/or indirectly affects the maturity and safety of the children of this community.

The academic success of the elementary schools in this community can be attributed, in large part, to the co-operative attitude of the parents toward the schools, the professional fitness of teaching personnel, and the co-operation of other employees of the school department.

Of the fourteen classrooms available in the two elementary schools, twelve are now in operation with an average classroom load of 30 pupils. Grade enrollment and classroom distribution on December 1, 1957, was as follows:

Based on sound educational practice, the pupil load per classroom has reached its ideal maximum for grades 2-6. Grade one is dangerously over-populated in both schools. In order to satisfy the variant needs of grade one pupils during this most crucial of all school grades it is necessary for class size to be kept small; thereby, affording the teacher a better opportunity to determine the readiness, social maturity, and mental ability of these pupils so that remedial practices can be exercised in the fundamental concepts which are prerequisites to, and which determine, the mental and emotional development of these children.

A projected study of enrollment for these schools, based on the next five years, shows that this situation will continue.

Assuming that all factors remain constant, the first grade enrollment for the school year 1958-59 will be 69 pupils, according to the 1957 school census.

The projected average grade enrollment for the next five years is as follows:

As a continuation and elaboration upon the testing program which was instituted by this department last year ("Superintendent's Report", ANNUAL TOWN REPORT, 1956) standardized tests for Reading, based on the basic reading text, are in the process of being incorporated. These tests assist teachers and administrators in determining rates of achievement and areas requiring remedial attention in the basic reading skills.

This department is now in the process of scoring mental maturity (I.Q.) tests which were administered early in December. Evaluation of these tests along with SRA Achievement Tests already administered and those which will be administered in the Spring of 1958 will assist the department in determining the growth of ability, in each pupil, class, and school, in each subject area tested. Analysis of all tests will assist in determining:

1. the rate of progress of individual pupils
2. the curriculum areas needing revision
3. the suitability of the present textbook program

which in turn will aid this department in analyzing its program in terms of pupil growth, teaching competence, and administrative efficiency.

During this school year six buses and one ranch wagon are transporting on 11 routes, 502 pupils to 4 towns including two schools in Upton, as follows:

Approximately 118 of the total enrollment of 363 pupils attending the Memorial and Ball Schools live within legal walking distance of the schools.

It is expected that an increase of 44 pupils will be transported to the Northbridge Jr.-Sr. High School beginning in September 1958. This situation is created by the graduation of 19 Upton Seniors and the entrance of 63 pupils to grade 7.

The transportation of pupils is in the process of a thorough survey. The invaluable assistance being rendered to this administration by school-bus contractees will permit an exhaustive study in this area, which will further

enhance the competency of operation of pupil transportation.

Beyond this, your Director is applying himself to the needs of the individual teachers and parents, to thorough studies of textbooks and supplies, and to all other areas which are directly or indirectly connected with pupil growth and department efficiency.

Grateful appreciation is extended to all who are assisting this administrator in the execution of his program.

I herewith submit my annual report as Supervisor of Music.

The aim of music instruction is to cause children to know, to love, and to understand music in as many forms as possible, and thus to bring added joy into their lives and added culture and refinement into their nature.

The general outline for the school music program is as follows:

Three essentials are found throughout the school music program in our schools, namely, voice culture, music interpretation, and music reading.

In the lower grades is begun the foundation of music. Time and Tune is taught in the first grade by rote songs. From the second grade through the fourth grade music reading is greatly developed through a reasoning process which is taught by a pedagogical arrangement of Time and Tune. This is presented in a manner that is understandable to a child with a given age and correlative with his other studies. Part-singing is introduced late in the fourth grade and advanced throughout the fifth and sixth grades. Weekly assignments are left with each grade teacher to be followed and each teacher is instructed how to follow them.

At Memorial Time a musical program is given by each grade, in Memorial School, which is opened to the public. This is an annual event which the parents and the different organizations of Upton look forward to with a great deal of interest. This program gives us all a chance to evaluate our work in music during the year.

I wish to express at this time my grateful appreciation to you, my Superintendent, the School Committee, the teachers and the townspeople for their assistance, support and cooperation at all times.

## REPORT OF THE HANDWRITING SUPERVISOR

Once again I am pleased to report on the operation of the handwriting program for the past year, in your Upton Schools.

Your teachers have continued to give us the splendid cooperation which has become traditional in your schools and for the many courtesies extended to me and my personnel I am most grateful.

Our records show at the conclusion of June 1957 that 99% of the papers scored were Excellent or Good. It is reasonable to conclude, therefore, that 99% of the papers were eminently satisfactory. Only 1% of the papers were rated Fair or Unsatisfactory.

During the past school year we graded and diagnosed approximately 8700 samples of handwriting for your pupils. A formal test was administered at four teaching-week intervals and a report was furnished each teacher in writing giving a careful diagnosis of the handwriting of each pupil in the room. We supplied the following instructional and motivational materials to your pupils and teachers: teacher outlines and folders, pupil folders, motivation graphs, individual certificates to pupils who qualified, diagnostic charts, handedness tests, envelopes, seals, etc.

Our primary objective is to teach your students to read and write both cursive handwriting and hand lettering in order that they may have these two tools as efficient aids in school, business, and social correspondence.



At each grade level we attempt to achieve the standard norm in speed and never lose sight of the fact that the concomitants of neatness, accuracy, and attention to detail in doing work are desirable characteristics that need to be developed along with technical skill.

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## REPORT OF THE SCHOOL NURSE

I am pleased to submit the following report as School Nurse.

The annual routine of weighing and measuring pupils, rechecking on previous reported defects, and general health inspection was carried on throughout the year. All findings are recorded on the pupils' School Health Cards. Home visits were made to consult with the parents on health, hygiene, and social problems, and to help correct these problems.

Classroom visits and consultations with the principal and teachers are made frequently.

Pupils taken ill in school are transported home as are accident cases, after being given first-aid if necessary.

Dr. McKernan assisted by the School Nurse has com-

pleted the annual health examination on all pupils in grades one and four and all new admissions as required by law. Defects are recorded and notices sent home. Home visits were made by the School Nurse when necessary. Home visits for pupils attending Northbridge High School are made when requested by the Principal or the Nurse.

Vision test is completed and many defects are corrected with glasses.

The hearing test was given in December 1956, follow-up work was carried on through this year. The hearing test for the school year 1957-1958 will be given when we receive the loan of the audiometer from the Mass. Department of Public Health.

The Parent-Teacher Association in March engaged a Dental Hygienist from the Mass. Dept. of Public Health. Notices were sent home to the parents to sign for permission to examine their child's teeth. Pupils requiring dental care received notice to be given to their parents asking them to take the child to their dentist. I would like to have this dental examination continued annually.

The third injection of Salks Poliomyelitis Vaccine was given to pupils this year who had only received two injections.

This has been a very interesting year.

I would like to extend my sincere thanks to the Superintendent of Schools, Mr. Hilyard, The School Committee, and to the Principal, Teachers, and to the parents for their assistance to promote better health in our schools.

At present, we are serving nearly 300 meals each day. For the Special Milk Program, milk is provided in the morning for those who wish to have it, at no charge to the children.

Much new, needed equipment has been purchased including a chopping, grating, slicing machine, a cook's table with bins for storage, and tables and benches for the lunch room at the George S. Ball School.

Our largest repair bill was for repainting the kitchen and auditorium at the Memorial School.
