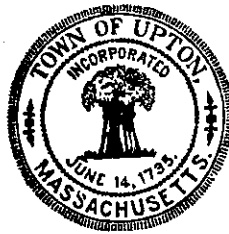
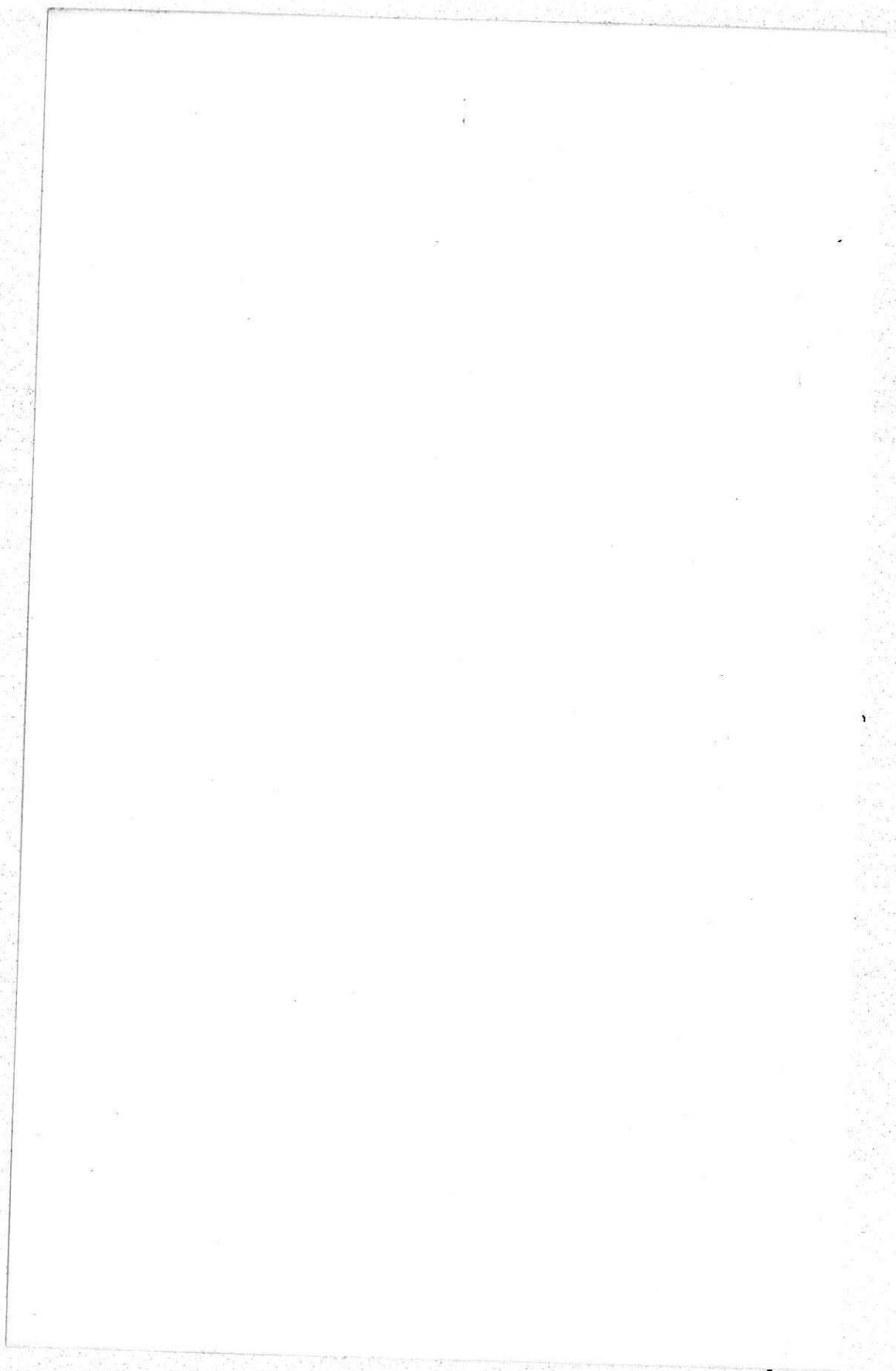


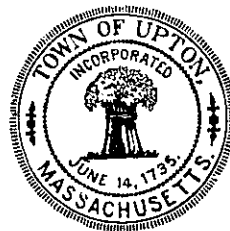

WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 1, 1965

Worcester, ss.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County of
Worcester, **GREETINGS:**

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the TOWN HALL, in said Upton, on MONDAY, the FIRST (1st) day of MARCH 1965, punctually at SEVEN (7) o'clock A.M.

Article 1. To choose necessary officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, One Assessor of Taxes (to fill vacancy), Tree Warden and Road Commissioner, each for one year; also Town Clerk, Selectman, one Assessor of Taxes, one member of Board of Public Welfare, one member of Sewer-Water Commission, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Park Commissioner, five Constables, three Trustees of the Public Library, one member of Board of Health, two members of Upton School Committee, one member of Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee and one member of Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District Committee, each for three years; also one member of Planning Board and one member of Upton Housing Authority, each for five years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls shall be closed at Eight (8) o'clock P.M. on the day of said meeting.

The remaining articles in the Warrant to be acted upon at adjourned meeting of the voters in Town Hall, Saturday afternoon, March Sixth (6th), at Two (2) o'clock P.M.

Article 2. To hear reports of all town officers, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear the reports of any committees appointed by the Town, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers to the town provided by Section 108, Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commission, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Park Commission, Tree Warden, Road Commissioner, Sewer-Water Commission, Housing Authority, Planning Board, and Board of Health, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of town departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000.00) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal and pre-school nursing service, crippled children, and well-child clinic services, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1966, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Hundred and Ninety Dollars and Ninety-Nine Cents (\$290.99) in accordance with the pro-

visions of Chapter 111, Section 85 of the General Laws for the Town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis, and for the care, maintenance and repairs of the Worcester County Sanatorium, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Nine Hundred and Twenty-Three Dollars and Eighteen Cents (\$2923.18) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1964 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Seven Hundred Sixty-Nine Dollars and Fifty-Two Cents (\$769.52) received from the county, to the School-Salary Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to accept a deed from Gustavus A. and Angelina M. Anderson to land situated off Main Street, in West Upton, adjacent to present town land needed for the maintenance of existing sewer line from the Memorial School, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred and Eighty-Two Dollars and Five Cents (\$882.05) from capital costs of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District, being the Town's proportionate share of the interest payment to become due in the current year on bonds of said district, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of Fourteen Thousand Dollars (\$14,000) for the purpose of laying water mains of not less than six (6) inches in diameter in Cross Street and High Street, and to meet said appropriation, Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000) be raised by taxation in the current year, and the Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, be authorized and directed to borrow under authority of the General Laws (Ter. Ed.) Chapter

44, Section 8, Clause 5, the sum of Twelve Thousand Dollars (\$12,000), and to issue notes or bonds of the Town therefor, said notes or bonds to be payable in or within three years, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Three Thousand Dollars (\$3000), said money to be used to remodel or make necessary alterations in the section of Upton Town Hall once used as the town lock-up. This room to be used as a police station, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate or transfer from the town treasury the sum of One Hundred Ninety-Two Dollars (\$192), said monies to be reimbursed to the Tree Warden for supervisory work during the year 1964, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to transfer Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) from the Cemetery Sale of Lots Account to the Cemetery Care and Improvement Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to name the state-built dam at Jourdan Pond as "Crockett Dam" in honor of the late Dr. Earl G. Crockett and his widow, Gladys G. Crockett, both of whom were former state representatives and former Upton selectmen and in consideration of the legislative bill authorizing said dam having been filed by the said Gladys G. Crockett, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto on petition of David A. Colcord and others.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept Section 42A to 42F, inclusive of General Laws Chapter 40, relative to the collection of water rates, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$2600) for the purchase of a new police cruiser, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum of money for the publication of an assessment book of all real estate in the Town of Upton. This book to be sold to any and all interested parties at a price of One Dollar (\$1.00) per copy. All monies collected from the sale of these books is to revert back to the town treasury, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto on petition of Raymond E. Griffin and others.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to include in the assessment book, if so voted, all abatements granted by the assessors for the year 1964, and the reasons for which they were granted, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto on petition of Raymond E. Griffin and others.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$4650) for Chapter 81 Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Four Hundred Dollars (\$2400) for Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) for Chapter 90 Highway Construction Work on Williams Street and Fiske Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote that Housing Authority is needed in the Town of Upton for the purposes set forth in General Laws Chapter 121, Section 26K, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety Dollars (\$190), said monies to be added to the Street Light Account for the

purpose of changing the present street lights on Main Street on poles numbered 11-28-32-35-38-81 to 100 Watt, 4000 lumen mercury vapor lights, and add new installations on poles numbered 40-30-22, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Dollars (\$40) to install two (2) 1000 lumen street lights on poles numbered 34-37 on Hopkinton Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) to the Reserve Fund, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting: — At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION

MARCH 1, 1965

Warden Robert K. Sweet (R) called the meeting to order at 7 A.M. After Election Clerk Samuel Nahra, Jr. (D) read Article 1 (town officers to be elected on said date) and notice of adjourned town meeting to take place Saturday, March 6, 1965 at 2 P.M., Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter moved to dispense the reading of the remaining articles at this time. Motion seconded and voted. Remainder of Warrant and constable's return of posting was then read after which Warden Sweet declared the polls open to receive ballots.

Prior to opening polls, Warden Sweet invited voters to inspect the ballot box. The indicator was set at 0000. George W. Grebenstein (R), also deputy warden, was on duty at ballot box. After inspection, the ballot box door was locked.

A box purporting to contain 2000 ballots was turned over by the Town Clerk to Warden Sweet before polls opened. The latter delivered the ballots to the check-in ballot clerks.

Checkers at in-coming table were Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and Chester W. Walker (R). At the out-going table at ballot box, Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R) and Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D).

Deputy Clerk Mrs. Shirley E. Kirby (D) was on duty.

Leo J. Lamanuzzi of Warren Road was first male voter and Mrs. Marie Ange Bartlett of Plain Street, first woman voter.

Ballot box indicator at hourly intervals registered as follows: 8 A.M., 54 ballots; 9 A.M., 83; 10 A.M., 131; 11 A.M., 191; 12 Noon, 244; 1 P.M., 279; 2 P.M., 346; 3 P.M., 401; 4 P.M., 505; 5 P.M., 658; 6 P.M., 806; 7 P.M., 1025 and 8 P.M., 1170.

Approximately 72 per cent of total registered voters (1632) voted during the 13-polling hours. Weather conditions: sun at times, cloudy part of day. No rain or snow.

(1) Item 117. Board of Health—Maintenance of Town Dump. Motion by Edward C. St. Andre, new member of the Board, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$900.00 for maintenance of town dump, was declared lost on voice vote by Moderator. Finance Committee recommended \$780.00, and so voted.

(2) Item 123. Board of Health—Clerk. Motion by Mrs. Marjorie R. Wilcock, R.N., member of Board, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$100.00 for clerk, was declared lost on voice vote by Moderator. Finance Committee did not recommend any appropriation. Board had requested \$100.00.

(3) Highways—Item 132, Chapter 90 Construction; Item 133, Chapter 90 Maintenance and Item 134, Chapter 81 Highways not acted on at this time as there are special articles in the Warrant for these projects.

(4) Item 157 — Schools — Salaries. Town Accountant Charles H. Ferris explained that the 1964 Dog Tax Refund and School, Interest of School Trust Fund are applied toward payment of "salaries". He mentioned that credit of \$200 from Interest, seconded, be voted to "Salary Account." Favorable action. Subsequently \$769.52 was appropriated from 1964 Dog Tax Refund to same account. "Salaries" by taxation, \$132,537.48; total for "Salaries", \$133,507.00.

(5) Item 190. "Conservation Expense". \$1,000.00 requested and recommended. It was explained the proposed money would be used on land purchased at Jourdan Pond (also known as Lake Wildwood) by the Town in 1964, said project to include erection of a fence. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Porter, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$1,000.00.

(6) Item 198. Sum of \$4,000.00, "requested" and "recommended" for general water mains extension was "passed over" after it was voted to take up Article 13 which was favorably acted on by standing vote. Result of vote: "YES—129; NO—3" announced by Moderator. Count was made by Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Rudolph J. Scholl.

PURCHASE POLICE CRUISER

Article 19. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Porter, duly seconded, "to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the Town Treasury, the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$2,600.00) for the purchase of a new Police Cruiser."

PASS OVER PRINTING OF REAL ESTATE PROPERTY VALUATION

Article 20. Prior to "pass over" action, Raymond E. Griffin moved, seconded, that "the Town of Upton vote to publish an assessment book with the assessed value of all real estate in Upton for the year 1964 and on the third year hereafter. Mr. Bates retired today (March 6, 1965) as police chief after 16 years. (Town voted to establish a Police Department, February 7, 1949).

Prior to being appointed police chief, Mr. Bates served 17 years as acting police chief.

Also, his service includes: Elected constable, 46 years, (February, 1919 to March, 1965); deputy game warden, 17 years, (1926 through 1942); dog officer, 10 years, (1937 through 1946); local representative to State Industrial Accident Board, 7 years, (1940 through 1946); field driver and pound keeper, 2 years, 1935-1936, and measurer of lumber, 1922.

Mr. Bates was a member of the Board of Selectmen 10 years, 1945 through 1954, being chairman in 1947.

REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Emergency Operating Center of the Massachusetts C. D. Agency is located at 400 Worcester Road, Framingham, Mass., below the ground and is fully equipped for any type of emergency. The Area 3 Headquarters at the Lyman School in Westboro has moved to its new underground headquarters and Harold F. Rossi is Area Director. The Area 3 Sector 3B offices are at the Milford High School (Tel. GR 3-6141) under full time operation. Theodore W. Apt is Sector Director and Upton is in this Sector 3B.

Fallout Shelters. Should be built in all new public buildings, school houses and in private homes.

Surplus Property. On January 26, March 26, October 29 and November 23 we were assigned to the Myles Standish warehouse at Taunton, Mass. for surplus property with the usual good results.

During the year 1965 your Upton Civil Defense unit has been slowly but steadily improving its capabilities. In the early part of the year, we were very fortunate to acquire the recently retired Upton Chevrolet fire truck. We have been transferring our equipment, including our portable generator, to this truck. This work has been done under the supervision of Paul W. Taylor. The pump still remains on the truck in operating condition so that it can be used as reserve equipment for the fire department. It was used in this manner for a short period last spring when the forest-fire truck was off the road to have a new engine installed. We also made use of this during the black-out this fall. Some of you may have seen it at the town hall supplying power to the police station. The truck still needs more work and can be improved on greatly as equipment and funds become available.

Our communications men are still making their monthly check-in with Sector 3B under supervision of Joseph A. Deering. They also assisted the police department during Halloween patrolling. Several trips have been made to Taunton for equipment which can be used.

We have acquired two new Walkie-Talkie units. The plans being for the police department and maybe the fire department to acquire two more units each. This will give us six very good portable units to assist in woods operations, such as lost children or large wood fires when requested by the other departments.

Since our old Civil Defense headquarters was taken over for the new police station, a new headquarters is to be constructed in the basement of the town hall. Our plans for the coming year include a new receiver on the national emergency frequency, an inter-communications set up between the police chief's office and the new headquarters. Another small generator, if one becomes available at Taunton, and as always the job of trying to interest more of Upton's citizens to help us build a larger and thus more useful C. D. unit.

Meetings. Your director has attended many area and district meetings accompanied by Chairman of Selectmen Ernest B. Porter, Eugene I. Whiting, Joseph A. Deering, Paul W. Taylor and others.

The Defense Council members are Charles R. Stuart, Edward Prentiss, Henry J. Poirier, Edward Kuczinski and Dr. Bernard F. McKernan.

REPORT OF HISTORICAL COMMISSION

Upton, January 7, 1966

To the Board of Selectmen,
Ernest B. Porter, Chairman
Gentlemen:

We are pleased herewith to submit our second annual report of the Upton Historical Commission.

Foremost on last year's agenda was liaison work in connection with restoration of the Town Pound on Elm Street, a project undertaken by the Woman's Club under direction of Mrs. Ruth Newton. The club provided a handsome wooden marker and with trust funds provided by the Selectmen, the wall was relaid and grading done in the enclosure and at approaches. The Commission this spring will replace the boxed wooden gate at the entrance.

The Commission is deeply indebted to H. Daniel Fay and others who did yeoman service in listing graves of Revolutionary War soldiers buried in the Old Cemetery. We are also indebted to Mrs. Etta (Fiske) Gibbs and Rev. David F. Raymond's Historical Committee for research and data. Some graves have been repaired and others will be, with the help of the Massachusetts Daughters of the American Revolution.

The Commission has answered dozens of letters anent historical sites and well-known Upton personages.

In December, the Commission sponsored a three weeks exhibit of old-time local pictures at the Town Library. The display was well received.

Gifts last year included views of the old Benson & Nelson hat shop which stood at School and Main Streets and the Nelson & Ladow plant which stood farther down School Street; also a handsome hand-tinted photo of the Warren Homestead on Mechanic Street, the work of the late Elsie Lincoln Ball. These were gifts from Gordon E. Benson.

Wood, the right of way to the lakeshore property at Lake Wildwood was widened in accordance to the regulations established by the Department of Natural Resources. Brush and trees have been cleared by the Tree Warden and crew with some volunteer assistance donated by community minded citizens of the Town. Roadwork and preparatory construction has made good progress in developing a beach area. A cedar rail fence now marks the border on the right of the road to the area. Multiflora Rose bushes will be set out in the spring to further mark borders and provide wildlife food and cover.

The Board of Health has met twice monthly, with the exception of the summer months, and feels that progress has been made in matters relating to the Public Health during the past year.

A Rodent Control program was initiated at the Town Dump in October with improvement noted. Health hazards have been reduced as a result of this program.

Many inspections have been made to houses condemned as unfit for human habitation and appropriate court action taken. Correction of these buildings is a lengthy process. However, due to financial limitations it is difficult for the Board to enforce even minimum standards of sanitation.

Upton was an active participant in the Vaccination Assistance Program which was conducted in Massachusetts. This immunization program included adults, in addition to the programs for children, in immunization against Tetanus and Diphtheria.

The Board would express its appreciation to our Animal Inspector, Mrs. Bird, and to all dog owners who cooperated in having their pets immunized against Rabies following the emergency caused due to the finding of a rabid bat in Upton. As a result of a recent advisory from the Massachusetts Department of Public Health we would once again stress that Rabies is becoming more prevalent in this area, and therefore we would urge participation in the 1966 Rabies Clinic.

The Board also expresses its appreciation to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, the Board of Selectmen, Town Counsel, appointed officers, all Town Departments, volunteer clinic workers, Bernard F. McKernan, M.D., Christian W. Aussenheimer, M.D., homeowners and contractors who have assisted in the past year.

REPORT OF PLANNING BOARD

January 15, 1966

To the Selectmen:

The Planning Board met regularly the second and fourth Wednesdays of each month during 1965, in addition to special sessions devoted to work on the Master Plan.

Work on the Master Plan, being done with Thomas Associates, proceeded satisfactorily during 1965, with the expectation that the plan will be completed early in 1966. In addition to the regular meetings, all of which are open to the public, one special open hearing was held for discussion of the plan.

There was also one meeting devoted entirely to discussion of the Natural Resources Inventory, which will be incorporated in the Master Plan. Federal and state experts in soil conservation, natural resources, wildlife, and forestry attended, along with members of the Conservation Commission, Selectmen, and Mrs. Carol Thomas of Thomas Associates.

An invitation to join the Central Massachusetts Regional Planning District was endorsed by the Planning Board. However, it was decided to defer action until a special town meeting sometime in 1966.

During the course of the Master Plan study, it became apparent to the Board that if Upton is to take advantage of the many state and federal financial assistance programs for such projects as extending water and sewer services, professional consultation must be available to the town officials involved. The Planning Board has requested funds for such services in its 1966 budget.

A series of open meetings and special hearings will be held in 1966 to familiarize everyone with recommendations of the Master Plan and contemplated zoning by-law amendments.

Preparation of the Master Plan required much time and effort on the part of many town officials, boards, and citizens. We wish to thank all those who cooperated so fully.

The resignation of Robert R. Mainville as member and chairman was regretfully received.

REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Upton School Committee and the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee:

It is a pleasure to submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools. Your continued guidance and support makes the demands of the position easier to bear.

We request that you give careful consideration to the detailed reports of the Supervisor of Elementary Schools, the Principal of Nipmuc Regional High School, and other Supervisors whose reports are included.

The problem of providing additional space to meet the needs of a growing school population at Nipmuc is still unsolved. We have now reached a very critical stage and unless some solution is found, our pupils will definitely show the adverse consequences. Supplementary reports during the year have noted the conditions under which we are now working and will have to work in the future if we cannot have adequate space. It would be regrettable to allow a strong growing school program to recede at a time when competition requires progress.

Your teachers and administrators are endeavoring to take the necessary steps to make the systems eligible for Federal funds as provided by the National Defense Education Act, the new Elementary and Secondary Education Act, and the Vocational Education Act. Public notices will be given as details are worked out and grants made available. These grants, however, will not effect the local tax rates, and we still implore the citizens to take an active part in urging those in official positions to revise the tax base so that relief for the real estate taxpayer will be forthcoming. Under conditions which exist today, anticipating a reduction in the school budget is wishful thinking.

According to the Department of Education officials, there is considerable interest being shown, by an increasing number of towns, in forming regions for grades K through 12. To date, only one such organization is operating. It is in the best interests of the two towns to at least study the plan to determine whether or not it would be an improvement in our organizational set-up and to see if there may be financial advantages.

We are particularly pleased with the cooperation and esprit de corps of our employees. Their teamwork is a necessary factor in operating a sound school system. We extend our appreciation to them.

It is a pleasure to report that Upton has adequate classroom space for grades 1 through 6. Present projections indicate that this should be true for a few years. However, we cannot expect to escape growth, and again we recommend that the town purchase additional land now for future school buildings. Competent authorities state that Upton will increase in population and that suitable land will become scarce and thus more expensive.

Risteen funds have been used for the purchase of library books, playground equipment, instrumental music lessons, and new drapes for the multi-purpose room at the Memorial School.

In our planned program of maintenance, another room at the Ball School received a new floor, and the cellar entrance was enclosed. Two rooms at the Memorial School were painted and an area in the rear of the school was hot-topped. Money has been budgeted for 1966 to continue the program.

In conclusion, let me express my gratitude to all those who have been of assistance to our schools during the past year.

UPTON ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

It is a pleasure to submit my second annual report as Supervisor of Elementary Schools for School Union #59, Mendon and Upton.

The first part of the year was centered around a total evaluation of the elementary school curriculum with stress placed on the reading, language, and mathematics programs.

Of significant importance was a definite coordination of the Elementary Supervisor with classroom teachers and the remedial reading teacher, not only in terms of aiding pupils with reading problems, but assisting in the evaluation and improvement of the total reading program. A pupil is now placed in a reading group according to performance, diagnostic test results and the recommendation of the Elementary Supervisor, teacher, and the remedial reading teacher. Plans are in progress to update the basic reading books and consumable workbooks will be utilized by grades 4, 5, and 6 which will begin in September of 1966.

Several teachers from Mendon and Upton attended a conference on the non-graded school held in Foxboro, Massachusetts. Some aspects of the non-graded school in conjunction with a modified team teaching approach could be introduced to insure greater flexibility in order to provide for individual differences. Several teachers from Mendon and Upton attended a Reading Conference held at Worcester State College and wrote summary reports which were distributed to all teachers in Mendon and Upton. Pertinent information was obtained on all the various types of phonetic approaches in the teaching of reading.

During the summer a physical education guide was developed with the purpose of giving impetus and direction to the physical education program. Low organizational activities, skill games, relays, stunts, basketball, softball, baseball, and many skills which develop coordination skills were incorporated in the guide. The guide will be increased in volume with new types of activities being added. We plan the pur-

chase of an all-purpose gym apparatus which includes basketball nets, volley ball nets, rope climbing and chinning. The equipment is portable and can be used in and out of doors. Each class from grades 1-6 is scheduled for gym twice a week.

The elementary schools of Mendon and Upton are currently utilizing functional grouping in arithmetic. The grouping is done within each class and there are no more than two groups per class. As in reading where grouping is necessary, arithmetic skills follow the same patterns as pupils differ widely in arithmetical abilities. We expect a pupil to function at his level. When pupils complete a grade we cannot assume that their skills are equally developed because of the very nature of individual differences. Therefore, at the beginning of a given grade, the pupil will begin where he left off at the end of the previous year.

Long-range projects in reading, arithmetic, science, and geography developed by the Mendon-Upton administration and teachers were submitted to the State Department of Education in Boston and approved. The projects span a period of 5 years and are now required to obtain funds for audio-visual tools, equipment, and materials under Title III of the National Defense Educational Act. The projects give our school systems direction by planning our educational steps over an extended period of time.

The language books were brought up to date in grades 3, 4, and two of grade 5 classes. The third 5th grade class and the three 6th grade classes will be brought up to date in 1966.

In science plans are in process to develop the "shoe box concept". Shoe boxes are collected whereby children bring to school items related to science to fill the box. Science under this concept becomes meaningful because the pupils learn by doing the experiments with the simple items in the box.

The departmentalized program in grades 5 and 6 was modified for two basic reasons. Pupils are on a rotating schedule. This means that the pupils are not fixed for a given subject the same period every day. The last period of the day which is scheduled for one hour affords the opportunity for the homeroom teacher to provide guidance, experience, spelling, penmanship, and special projects. Grade 5C was self-contained because it was felt that this class needs more time for the reading and arithmetic programs.

Safety programs were held in the Memorial and Ball Schools. Rudolph Scholl, Chief of Police, and Policewoman Dorothy Bishop showed films on bicycle safety and gave lectures on the rules and regulations of proper bicycle procedures. Safety patrol leaders were organized to assist at vital street crossings for the pupils of the Ball and Memorial Schools. A representative from the Registry of Motor Vehicles conducted a program of bicycle safety as a follow-up to our local programs.

Mrs. Janet Stockwell, School Nurse, tested eyes, ears, and measured weight and height. A new policy was adopted whereby parents are responsible for making provisions to take the child home in the event of illness, accidents, etc. Emergency cards were sent home to be filled out and signed by the parents giving the schools the authority to take proper steps in aiding the child if the parent can not be contacted. Pupils in grades 1 and 4 have physical examinations each year.

Beginning in September 1966, Mr. Thomas Cullen, Guidance Director and School Psychologist, will handle individual testing and work with a limited amount of emotional referrals. Within a few years public schools will be obligated to make a strong effort in this area. I feel that a school adjustment counselor serving both towns would be very desirable within the next two years.

Mrs. Peggy Ann Jenness, Art Supervisor, is stressing art appreciation. The program is adequate for grades 1-4, but some difficulties are evident in grades 5 and 6 because of the nature of a departmentalized program, and time limitations of the lesson. Plans are now being geared to the time factor involved.

Miss Arlyne Marcy, Vocal Music Supervisor, did a fine job with the pupils and conducted two excellent Glee Club concerts held at the Regional High School. Miss Marcy is now devoting part of the music periods for note reading.

Mr. Donald Thatcher, Instrumental Music Supervisor, and Mr. Henry Mussulli, did an excellent job training the Elementary School Band which culminated in a first place prize at the May Music Festival held in Worcester. The band marched in the Memorial Day parades in Mendon and Upton and played very well. The band participated in the dedication ceremonies of the new addition to the Mendon Center School and performed well in the Christmas Concert.

The remedial reading program under the instruction of Mrs. Grace Hutchinson is most certainly proving its existence. Mrs. Hutchinson is doing an excellent job providing help to pupils. This program is part of our long range plans in reading and we hope to gradually increase the materials needed to carry out an effective program.

National Education Week was highly successful. More than 90% of the parents attended a conference with the teachers to discuss the pupils' progress. Parent-teacher conferences were held in June to discuss each child's Iowa Achievement Test results.

Field trips were conducted in April, May, and June, giving pupils the opportunity to visit historical places and museums which supplement learning experiences in the classroom.

The library program is a definite asset for the total school program. Every year we allocate approximately \$600.00 from the Risteen Fund to increase our volumes. Each class is scheduled to the library once a week and required to take a book out to be read at home. Teachers with the assistance of Mrs. Barbara Burke, School Librarian, make use of the library for reference when carrying out special projects. Mrs. Burke is assisted by the following volunteer mothers:

The "21-inch" TV classroom has proven successful as a supplement to the regular school curriculum. Programs in phonics, literature, science, music emanate from Channel 2 in Boston.

I would like to thank the School Committees, Mr. Sharp, all school Personnel, the Parent-Teacher Associations, the Band Booster Club, local governmental departments, and the Townspeople for their kind cooperation and assistance in making our schools a continuing success.

To the Citizens of Mendon and Upton:

During the year of 1965, the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee held regular scheduled meetings. A special meeting was held with Selectmen and members of the Finance Committees of both Upton and Mendon. A public hearing on the school budget was also held.

As Chairman of the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee, I am pleased to report that an excellent educational program has been maintained. In order to provide a consistently high standard of education it has been necessary to recommend an increase in the 1966 school budget. This increase will be approximately 10.7% over that proposed last year. Much of this increase has been the result of revisions to the teachers' salary schedule.

Increased school population, particularly at the junior high level, has resulted in a "Critically Over-Crowded Situation." Until such time as additional classrooms and facilities can be provided, it may be necessary to pursue one of three courses; increase the number of students per class, consolidate certain classes, or (as a last resort), conduct double sessions. Plans for providing additional classroom space and facilities are progressing. An architect has been engaged, on a consultant basis, to study and recommend the best approach to the problem. It is the hope of the committee that construction can be started early this year.

The committee wishes to extend its thanks to the administrators, teachers, town officials and citizens of both Mendon and Upton for their assistance in the operation of the Nipmuc Regional School system.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Once again an over-crowded school population is the major problem to be reported. With an enrollment of over 620 pupils since September, carrying on our regular school program has necessitated the use of the auditorium for three junior high school academic classes and many study halls and of the cafeteria for one academic class and six daily study halls. Holding classes and study halls in these areas does not lend to good teaching-learning situations.

The congested traffic problem before and after school and between periods has also created serious problems.

With another seventh grade of approximately 130 pupils anticipated next September, a compounding of the present problem is inevitable. Undesirable as they may be, double-sessions for the seventh and eighth grades for next year have been recommended as an immediate solution to the existing problem.

Double-sessions will bring problems of their own; not only at school but in many of the homes of the children involved. If double-sessions are planned within the proposed school budget, with no increase in staff, there will result a curtailment of some activities of the pupils involved. All pupils will be assured of a full schedule of academic subjects; but in the areas of home economics, industrial arts, music, band, art and physical education, there will have to be a definite curtailment.

An alternative to double-sessions would be to increase the class sizes in the seventh and eighth grades to accommodate the anticipated number of pupils. This would bring the number of pupils in each section to 35 or more, which would result in a poor learning situation at the secondary level. Classrooms would be seriously over-crowded and result in serious problems of traffic and pupil control, as well as the effectiveness of the teaching.

The over-crowding is not limited to the junior high school. With more pupils each year entering the high school than are graduating or leaving, many high school classes are at capacity and maintaining our schedule of classes becomes more and more a problem. As it is at this moment, all classrooms and laboratories are being used every period during the day, with the cafeteria and auditorium being used as study halls. With an ever-increasing enrollment and space for expansion not available, problems of serious import are inevitable.

On the brighter side, I am happy to bring to your attention the result of the two-year progress report which was required by the New England Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools as a follow-up of the 1963 evaluation of our school by that organization. Following is a direct quote from a letter received from the above-named association.

"The Commission on Public Secondary Schools, at a meeting held on November 1, approved the two-year progress report from Nipmuc Regional High School. It was well pleased with the progress that has been made and hopes that in the next three years, before the five-year report is due, progress can be continued."

I wish to extend appreciation to all persons who have assisted in the operation of the Nipmuc Regional High School during the past year.

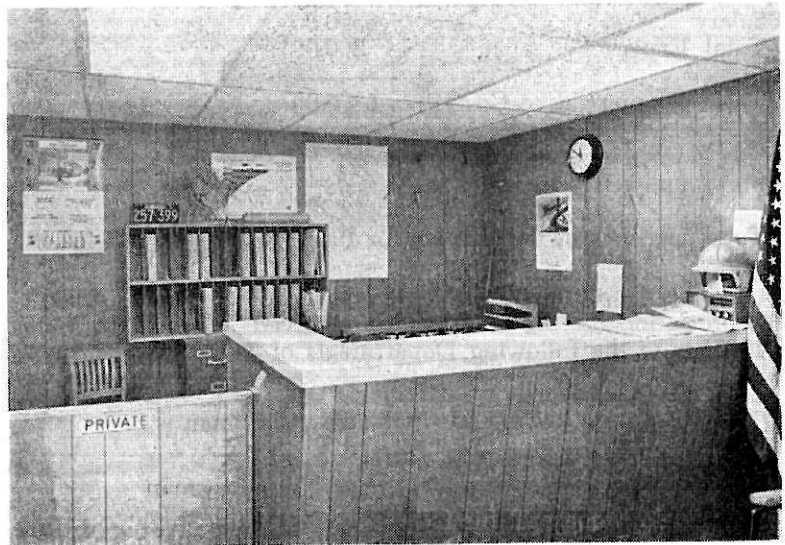

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF SELECTMEN

The Board of Selectmen met following the adjourned annual Town Meeting on March 6, 1965 and elected Ernest B. Porter, Chairman of the Board and appointed Mrs. Celestine Mason, Clerk. Other appointments made at this time were Charles H. Ferris, Town Accountant; Jacob Oppewal of Whitinsville, Town Counsel; and Rudolph J. Scholl, Chief of Police, filling the vacancy caused by the resignation of Daniel H. Bates.

During the year Selectman James Gallagher and Road Commissioner Henry Poirier have preambulated the bounds between all the bordering towns with the exception of Milford, this being required by the State.

The installation of several new street lights this past year is affording increased protection to our citizens and we hope that we will be able to continue this program of better lighting.

The Board of Selectmen has used some of the income from our Trust Funds to good advantage during the past year. Two new aluminum doors were installed in the Town Hall and monies were also used to finish the very attractive new police headquarters built in the basement. At the present time a new headquarters for our local Civil Defense Unit is being built in another section of the basement of the Town Hall.

After many years a final settlement has been made with regard to the West Hill Dam project and an easement was obtained on the former Steele property on South Street.

At a special Town Meeting on December 27, 1965 a sum of \$2,900.00 was appropriated from available funds to bring tax title property up-to-date. It is hoped that the Town will recover a considerable amount of money from this property, and also get this property back on the tax roll.

Resignations were received during the year from Custodian of the Town Hall, Ormand Bates and Building Inspector, George N. O. Poirier. Donald Bleyle was appointed to fill the position of custodian while at the present time, the position of Building Inspector remains unfilled.

The Board recognizes the need of repairs to both the interior and exterior of the Town Hall building and we hope to be able to start a program this year to remedy this situation. The heating system in the Hall is also in dire need of repair or replacement and we hope that the citizens will recognize this and take steps to remedy it.

We have enjoyed serving our Town and its citizens during the past year and realize one of the greatest challenges to be met in the coming year will be to run the Town efficiently and to the best advantage of its citizens, and at the same time to try to maintain a respectable tax rate. This we hope to be able to do with the cooperation of all department heads and townspeople and the hope of some type of tax relief from our State Legislature.

We have been impressed with the attendance at all of our meetings of members of the newly formed Taxpayers Association. Interest of this type is most certainly a healthy outlook for any town.

Sincere thanks and appreciation are due to our Finance Committee who spend many hours during the year and particularly at the end of the year on our forthcoming appropriations. We should give careful consideration to each of their recommendations in order to hold to a minimum any anticipated increase in our tax rate for 1966.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank \$16.11 known as the Knowlton School Fund, with the Town Treasurer as Trustee, to be used by the School Committee to defray extraordinary expenses at the Knowlton School.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Ella (Whitney) Risteen Fund in Trust, with the Town Treasurer and School Committee as Trustees. The income to be divided between two pupils in our High School who make the most progress during the year. Interest of \$49.90 was received this year and \$100.00 was expended.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institute for Savings One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) known as the Dr. Carpenter Library Fund. The income to be used for the Public Library.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the Charlotte A. Batchelor Library Fund in Trust with the Town Treasurer as Trustee. The income to be used for the Public Library. Interest of \$100.00 was received this year.

Charlotte A. Batchelor and George W. Knowlton established a Trust Deed at the Worcester County National Bank with the Bank as Trustee. The income to be paid to the Town of Upton for use of the Knowlton School.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank a Fund known as the Library Construction Fund (Vote of Town, May 15, 1958). Interest of \$225.28 was received this year and the balance of the account on December 31, 1965 was \$5,802.06.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000.00) known as the George W. Knowlton Fund. The income is subject to withdrawal by the Town Treasurer on order from the Selectmen and is to be used to help Townspeople who are in distress. Interest of \$262.56 was received this year and the balance as of December 31, 1965 was \$6,762.09. Nothing was expended this year.

The Industrial Accident Fund established in 1937 is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank. Interest of \$115.86 was received this year and the balance as of December 31, 1965 was \$2,897.05. Payments from this fund are to be made in accordance with rules established by the Board of Selectmen. \$87.00 was expended this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Federal Savings Bank \$40,176.50 known as the Stabilization Fund. Interest of 1,644.97 was received this year and the balance of the account on December 31, 1965 was \$42,362.20.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank \$20,000.00 known as the Stabilization Fund. Interest of \$821.46 was received this year and the balance of the account on December 31, 1965 was \$21,154.80.

Total balance of the Stabilization Fund as of December 31, 1965 was \$63,517.00.

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) known as the George H. Schultz Library Fund in Trust, with the Town Treasurer and Library Trustees as Trustees. The income from this fund to be used only for the purchase of books. Interest of \$82.51 was received this year.

There is deposited in the Milford Savings Bank \$2.90 known as the Nellie Bagley Lakeview Cemetery Improvement Fund, with the Town Treasurer and Cemetery Commissioners as Trustees. Nothing was expended this year.

CEMETERY PERPETUAL CARE FUNDS

There is deposited in the Worcester County Institution for Savings \$22,735.00.

There is deposited in the Milford Federal Savings Bank \$13,195.00.

Receipts are deposited each year and the interest received is used by the Cemetery Department to care for lots covered by perpetual care. In 1965 deposits were \$1,330.00 and interest received was \$1,406.57.

REPORT OF THE WATER AND SEWER COMMISSIONERS

We hereby submit the following report of the Water and Sewer Department's activities for the year of 1965:

During the year we put 1800 ft. of 8 in. main with three hydrants and 12 new services on School, Cross and High Streets; put approximately 700 ft. of 8 in. water main on lower Pleasant Street to Blackstone Valley Vocational School, which was no cost to the Town for this project.

During the very dry season from August to December we had a hydrant open on Church Street and a place at the Fire Station for the public to get water.

During the past year 60,422,400 gallons of water was pumped, with the month of February being the highest with 5,629,600 gallons, and November being the lowest with 4,434,000 gallons.

At this time we wish to thank the Townspeople for their cooperation.

Regular School Committee meetings are held at the Hopedale Junior-Senior High School on the first and third Thursday of each month at 7:30 P.M.

During the year of 1965 the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional District School Committee held twenty-four regular meetings and six special meetings.

The following were elected to serve on the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional District School Committee at their respective annual town meeting.

 Kevin R. Sherin, Legal Counsel

On January 21, 1965 the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional District School Committee voted to authorize the School District attorney to take the necessary steps to acquire the Voss property on Pleasant Street in West Upton for the site of the new Regional Vocational Technical High School.

The architectural contract with the Wendell T. Phillips Associates of Milford, Mass. was approved by the Regional School Committee on February 18, 1965.

The Emergency Finance Board of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts authorized the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District to borrow the sum of \$1,200,000 for the construction of the regional vocational school on January 22, 1965.

In March, Mr. Charles E. Burnham the Committee member from Hopedale resigned after having faithfully served the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District for four years. The Committee regrets that the pressure of other business necessitated Mr. Burnham's decision to resign, but his substantial contribution to the work of the Committee over the years is greatly appreciated. Mr. Harrison N. Thibault was appointed by the Board of Selectmen of Hopedale to serve for the balance of Mr. Burnham's term.

Final plans for the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School were approved by the Committee on April 26, 1965.

On May 6, 1965 Mr. Paul G. Bazinet of Grafton was selected by the Committee as the Clerk of the Works for the regional school.

On May 20, 1965 the site development contract in the amount of \$103,184. was awarded to Arthur Schofield, Inc., 265 Old Connecticut Path, Wayland, Mass.

The outstanding event of the year occurred on May 25, 1965 when the ground breaking ceremonies were held at the school site in West Upton. Mr. James Kellett, Chairman of the Ground Breaking Committee, introduced Mr. Matthew Krajewski, Chairman of the District School Committee, who welcomed the large gathering.

The invocation was given by Rev. Richard Leonard of the Methodist Church in Douglas.

The principal address on this occasion was given by House Speaker John F. X. Davoren; other speakers were Paul J. Sullivan, Superintendent-Director; Mr. James Mullaney, former Chairman of the District School Committee; Mr. Matthew Krajewski, present Chairman; and Mr. Walter J. Markham, Director of the Massachusetts Division of Vocational Education.

At the conclusion of Rep. Davoren's speech, the entire school Committee broke ground for the new building with thirteen gold-painted shovels.

The ceremonies were concluded with the benediction, given by Rev. Rene Julian, pastor of the Assumption Church in Bellingham.

On June 24, 1965 A. Mason & Sons, Inc., Thompson Rd., Webster, Mass. was selected as the General Contractor to build the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical School for the sum of \$1,464,184.

Due to the fact that the lowest bid for the construction of the school was considerably higher than expected, the Regional School Committee voted on June 24, 1965 to incur additional debt of \$475,000, making a total of \$1,675,000.

Approval of the additional indebtedness was received from the Emergency Finance Board of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts on July 28, 1965.

For the first time in the history of vocational education Federal money was made available for the construction of a vocational school when a grant of \$55,625 was made to the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical School. We have been assured by Mr. Walter J. Markham, Director of the Massachusetts Division of Vocational Education, that additional Federal funds will be made available as the construction progresses.

On October 21, 1965 the Massachusetts School Building Assistance Commission announced that a grant of \$93,925.40 was being made to the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District for planning expenses.

Charles D. Peckham, the Secretary of the Regional School District since September 12, 1963, resigned on December 1, 1965. A party was arranged by the School Committee members for him as an expression of their appreciation for the fine service that he gave to the Regional School District over the last two years.

Mr. Arthur C. Young, our Treasurer, was elected Secretary by the Regional School Committee to serve for the balance of Mr. Peckham's term.

On December 1, 1965 the Regional School District offered for sale school bonds in the amount of \$1,675,000. The bonds were sold to the Hartford National Bank & Trust Company and Associates, the lowest bidder, at a price of 100.1699 with a 3.7 percent interest rate.

The construction of the Regional Vocational Technical High School has been progressing very satisfactorily with the exception of the structural steel and the bar joists. We have

been most fortunate in having unusually good weather so far this fall and winter, with the result that the general contractor has been able to complete a much larger percentage of the concrete and masonry work than was expected. This has enabled the contractor to make up much of the time that has been lost due to the lack of steel. Fortunately, the missing steel did arrive at the very end of the year so that it will now be possible to go ahead more rapidly and unless some unseen event should occur, we will be able to start classes next September.

The Superintendent-Director has visited the schools in every town of the Regional School District to talk to the boys in the eighth grade about the aims and objectives of vocational education. In his talks the Superintendent-Director stressed the importance of having both a high school education and a vocational skill. He also described the vocational courses that will be offered next September and showed slides of a vocational school in operation. At the conclusion of the program, a brochure describing the school and applications were passed out to each boy. They were asked to discuss the matter with their parents, then to fill out the application if they were interested, and have it signed by their parents.

The response on the part of the boys and their parents has been tremendous. At the present time we have almost three hundred applications and more are being received every day.

During this year many problems have arisen which have been successfully solved by the Regional School Committee and all indications for the coming year point to the successful completion of the Regional Vocational Technical High School and the start of the long-awaited vocational training opportunities for the young men of the region.

APPORTIONMENT OF COSTS INCURRED BY
THE DISTRICT

(A) CLASSIFICATION OF COSTS

For the purpose of apportioning assessments levied by the District against the member towns, costs shall be divided into two categories: capital costs and operating costs.

(B) CAPITAL COSTS

Capital costs shall include all expenses in the nature of capital outlay such as the cost of acquiring land, the cost of constructing, reconstructing and adding to buildings, and the cost of remodeling or making extraordinary repairs to a school building or buildings, including without limitation the cost of the original equipment and furnishings for such buildings or additions, plans, architects' and consultants' fees, grading and other costs incidental to placing school buildings and additions and related premises in operating condition. Capital costs shall also include payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations issued by the District to finance capital costs.

(C) APPORTIONMENT OF CAPITAL COSTS

Capital costs shall be apportioned annually in December for the ensuing year as follows:

- (1) Each member town's share of the capital costs incurred in connection with the construction, equipping and placing in operation of the initial district school building, including the payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations of the District to finance such capital costs, shall be determined by computing the ratio which the sum of its public school male pupil enrollments in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, on October 1 of the three years next preceding the year in which the Committee votes to authorize the incurring of such capital costs bears to the sum of the public school male pupil enrollments in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, of all the member towns on October 1 of the same three years; and in the

case of capital costs consisting of the payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations issued by the District, the ratio shall not be changed during the period in which such bonds, notes or other obligations are outstanding, except as provided in subsection VII(A). For the purpose of this clause (1) of Section (A) above, public school male pupil enrollments shall be defined as the number of male pupils in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, residing in each member town and receiving education at such town's expense.

I submit herewith my report of an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the period from October 14, 1962 to May 25, 1965, made in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 44, General Laws. This is in the form of a report made to me by Mr. William Schwartz, Assistant Chief of Bureau.

In accordance with your instructions, I have made an audit of the books and accounts of the town of Upton for the period from October 14, 1962, the date of the previous audit, to May 25, 1965, and report thereon as follows:

The financial transactions, as recorded on the books of the several departments collecting money for the town or committing bills for collection, were examined, checked, and verified by comparison with the records in the offices of the town treasurer and the town accountant.

The town accountant's ledgers were analyzed, the appropriation accounts being checked with the town clerk's records of appropriations, transfers and loan authorizations voted by the town meetings and with the finance committee's authorizations of transfers from the reserve fund.

The necessary adjustments resulting from the audit were made, and a balance sheet, a copy of which is appended to this report, was prepared showing the financial condition of the town on May 25, 1965.

The books and accounts of the town treasurer were examined and checked in detail. The recorded receipts were analyzed and compared with the town accountant's books, with the records of the departments making payments to the treasurer, and with other sources from which money was paid into the town treasury. The disbursements were checked with the warrants approved by the selectmen and with the accountant's books.

The cash book was footed, and the treasurer's cash balance on May 25, 1965, was proved by actual count of the cash in the office, by certification of the United States Treasury bills, and by reconciliation of the bank balance with a statement furnished by the bank of deposit.

A considerable amount of time was spent in reconciling the treasurer's check register balances with the bank statements, in which connection it is recommended that the treasurer reconcile the bank balances with the bank statements promptly upon their receipt, and that a prominent record be kept of such reconciliations.

The records of payroll deductions for Federal and State taxes and the county retirement system were examined and proved. The payments to the proper agencies were verified and the balances on hand were reconciled with the controlling ledger accounts.

The maturing debt and interest payments were proved with the amounts falling due and were checked with the cancelled securities on file. The outstanding bonds and coupons were listed and reconciled with the balance in the bond and coupon account, as shown by a statement received from the bank of deposit.

The savings bank books and securities representing the investments of the several trust and investment funds in the custody of the town treasurer and the trustees were examined and listed. The income was proved and all transactions and balances were verified and compared with the books of the town accountant.

The records of tax titles and tax possessions held by the town were examined and checked. The amounts transferred from the tax levies to the tax title account were compared with the collector's books, the payments to the treasurer were checked with the treasurer's recorded receipts, and the tax titles and tax possessions on hand were listed and reconciled with the ledger controls.

In connection with the investment of general revenue cash in United States Treasury bills, attention is called to the provisions of Section 55, Chapter 44, General Laws, which prohibits the investment of the proceeds from temporary loans in such manner and prohibits the issuance of temporary loans while such revenue cash remains invested in U. S. Treasury bills.

It is also recommended that the treasurer take steps to foreclose tax title liens held by the town for a period in excess of two years as required by Section 50, Chapter 60 of the General Laws.

The books and accounts of the town collector were examined and checked in detail. The tax, excise, and assessment accounts outstanding at the time of the previous audit, as well as all subsequent commitments, were audited and proved. The recorded collections were checked with the payments to the treasurer, as shown by the treasurer's and the accountant's books, the abatements, as entered, were compared with the assessors' records of abatements granted, the transfers to the tax title account were proved, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the controlling accounts in the town accountant's ledger.

The records of departmental and water accounts receivable were examined and checked. The commitments were proved, the recorded collections were checked with the pay-

ments to the treasurer, the abatements were compared with the departmental records of abatements granted, and the outstanding accounts were listed and reconciled with the ledger controls.

The outstanding tax, excise, assessment, and water accounts were further verified by mailing notices to a number of persons whose names appeared on the books as owing money to the town, the replies received thereto indicating that the accounts, as listed, are correct.

The records of the board of selectmen, the town clerk, and the wire inspector, as well as of the police and health departments, pertaining to licenses and permits issued, were examined, and the payments to the State and to the town were verified.

The surety bonds of the officials required by law to furnish them for the faithful performance of their duties were examined and found to be in proper form.

In addition to the departments mentioned, the books and accounts of the sealer of weights and measures, and of the public welfare, veterans' services, school, library, and cemetery departments, as well as of all other departments in which money was collected for the town, were examined and checked. The payments to the treasurer were verified and the cash on hand in the several departments was proved by actual count.

There are appended to this report, in addition to the balance sheet, tables showing reconciliations of the several cash accounts, summaries of the tax, excise, assessment, tax title, departmental, and water accounts, together with schedules showing the transactions and condition of the trust and investment funds.

On behalf of my assistants and for myself, I wish to express appreciation for the cooperation received from the several town officials during the progress of the audit.
