


"Our Early Days"

Upton was named for a village in Worcestershire, England. Small industries were inaugurated here, stimulated by water-power supplied by the Mill River and other streams. WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

MARCH 7, 1966

Worcester, ss.

To the Constable of the Town of Upton, in the County
of Worcester, GREETINGS:

In the name of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, you are directed to notify the inhabitants of the town of Upton, qualified to vote in Elections and in Town Affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Upton, on Monday, the Seventh (7th) day of March, 1966, punctually, at Seven (7) o'clock A.M.

Article 1. To choose necessary officers for the ensuing year: Moderator, Road Commissioner and Tree Warden, each for one year: one Selectman, one Collector of Taxes, one Assessor of Taxes, one member of Board of Public Welfare, one member of School Committee, one Sewer-Water Commissioner, one Cemetery Commissioner, one Park Commissioner, one Member of Board of Health, three Trustees of Public Library, each for three years; one member of Planning Board for five years, one member of Planning Board for four years, to fill vacancy; to Upton Housing Authority, one member for five years, and to fill unexpired terms, one for four years, one for three years and one for two years.

All of the above to be voted for upon one ballot.

The polls will be closed at Eight (8) o'clock P.M.
on day of said meeting.

The remaining articles in the Warrant will be acted on at adjourned meeting in Town Hall, Saturday, March 12, 1966 at Two (2) P.M.

Article 2. To hear reports of all town officers, or
do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 3. To hear the reports of any committees appointed by the Town, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to fix the salary and compensation of all elective officers of the Town as provided by Section 108, Chapter 41, General Laws, as amended: Moderator, Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Town Clerk, Collector of Taxes, Assessors of Taxes, Board of Public Welfare, School Committee, Cemetery Commission, Constables, Trustees of Public Library, Park Commission, Tree Warden, Road Commissioner, Water and Sewer Commission, Housing Authority, Planning Board, and the Board of Health, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 5. To raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray expenses of town departments for the ensuing year, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal, post-natal and pre-school nursing service: crippled children and well-child clinic service, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Town Treasurer, with the approval of the Selectmen, to borrow money from time to time in anticipation of the revenue of the financial year beginning January 1, 1967, and to issue a note or notes therefor, payable within one year and to renew any note or notes as may be given for a period of less than one year in accordance with Section 17, Chapter 44, General Laws, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Seventy-Seven Dollars and Seven Cents (\$4077.07) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 32, Section 22, General Laws for Pension Fund, Expense Fund, Military Service Fund and Workmen's Compensation Fund of the Worcester County Retirement System, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred and Thirty-Four Dollars and Ninety-Three Cents (\$834.93) in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 111, Section 85 of the General Laws for the town's assessment for the care and treatment of persons suffering from tuberculosis, and for the maintenance and repairs of the Worcester County Sanatorium, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Seven Thousand Nine Hundred Twenty Dollars and Thirty-Seven Cents (\$7920.37) for capital and operational costs of the Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District being the town's proportionate share of the interest, and installment reduction of bond principal, to become due on its bonds in the current year, together with expenses of school operation during this year, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate or transfer from the town treasury the sum of Seven Hundred and Ninety Dollars (\$790), said monies to be reimbursed the Tree Warden for supervisory work during the year 1965, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to transfer Three Hundred Dollars (\$300) from the Cemetery Sale of Lots Account to the Cemetery Care and Improvement Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$4650) for Chapter 81 Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State for this purpose, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Six Hundred and Fifty Dollars (\$2650) for Chapter 90 Maintenance Highway Work, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) for Chapter 90 Highway Construction Work on Williams Street and Fiske Road, said money to be used in conjunction with any money allotted by the State or County, or both, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Hundred Ninety-Three Dollars and Ninety-Five Cents (\$193.95), said monies to apply to an unpaid fuel bill in the Town Hall Account for the year 1965, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty-Eight Dollars (\$28), said monies to be added to the Street Light Account for the purpose of installing a 3500 Multi-Mercury Vapor Street Light on North Main Street on pole numbered 6, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Forty Dollars (\$40) to install 2 — 1000 Lumen Street Lights on poles numbered 3 and 11 on Westboro Road, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixty Dollars (\$60) to install 3 — 1000 Lumen Street Lights on poles numbered 16, 19 and 25 on Glen Avenue, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Dollars (\$20) to install 1 — 1000 Lumen Street Light on West Main Street on pole numbered 122, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Fifty-Six Dollars (\$1056) to meet the Town of Upton's share in the establishment and maintenance of quarters for a clinic operated by the Milford Area Mental Health Association, Inc., or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 22. To see if the Town will vote to amend the Town By-Laws by adding the following article: "No person shall permit one or more unregistered motor vehicles on his premises, or shall permit a disabled motor vehicle or parts thereof to remain on his premises unless permission to do so is given in writing by the Board of Selectmen. In no event shall an unregistered motor vehicle or a disabled motor vehicle or parts thereof be permitted to remain outside or to be stored outside in a front yard of a person's premises. The foregoing shall not apply to motor vehicles, or parts thereof, stored or garaged inside buildings."

Article 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to appoint a Five-Member School Building Site Committee, said Committee to investigate the location of, and recommendations for, acquiring sites for future school building needs, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1000), said sum to be set up as a Conservation Fund under the direction of the Upton Conservation Commission, according to General Laws (Ter. Ed.) Chapter 40, Section 5, Sub-Section 51, as amended in 1964, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Three Hundred Dollars (\$300), said monies to be used by the Board of Assessors for the purpose of printing 200 assessed valuation books of the Town of Upton, and be authorized to establish a price per book, not to exceed in total income the cost of compiling and printing, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 26. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Eighty-Four Dollars (\$684) for the purchase and installation of a Mobile FM 2-Way Radio to be installed in the town ambulance, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Six Hundred Five Dollars (\$605) for the purchase of a Handie-Talkie FM Radio to be used and housed at the Fire Station, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Four Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$4500), said monies to be expended by the Board of Selectmen to install a new boiler with burner and change the heating system to zoned hot water heat in the Town Hall Building, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000), said monies to be expended by the Board of Selectmen to renovate the northeast corner of the basement of Town Hall into a Three-Room Welfare Department, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eight Hundred Dollars (\$800), said monies to be expended by the Board of Selectmen to change over the electrical service of the Town Hall Building to 150 or 200 AMP, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Eighteen Hundred Dollars (\$1800), said monies to be expended by the Board of Selectmen to replace the present slate roof with asphalt on the northwest portion of the Town Hall roof and do all necessary repairs on the dormers, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 32. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Fourteen Hundred Dollars (\$1400) for a Summer Recreation Program under the direction of a committee appointed by the Park Commission, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 33. To see if the Town wil vote to appropriate the proceeds of the 1965 Dog Tax Refund, the sum of Six Hundred Sixty Dollars and Sixty-Nine Cents (\$660.69) received from the County, to the School Salary Account, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 34. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000)

to the Stabilization Fund, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

Article 35. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate from available unappropriated funds in the town treasury, the sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5000) to the Reserve Fund, or do or act in any manner pertaining thereto.

And you are directed to serve this Warrant, by posting attested copies thereof at each of the following places in said Town, seven days at least before the time of holding said meeting:— At each of the Post-offices and on the Town House in said Town.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Town Clerk, before the time and place of meeting aforesaid.

PROCEEDINGS OF ANNUAL TOWN ELECTION

MARCH 7, 1966

Warden Robert K. Sweet (R) called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

After Election Clerk Samuel Nahra Jr. (D) read Article 1 (town officers to be elected) and notice of adjourned town meeting to be Saturday, March 12, 1966, Selectman James J. Gallagher moved to dispense with reading of the remaining articles at this time. Motion seconded and voted without a dissenting voice. Remainder of Warrant and constable's return of posting read. Warden Sweet then declared the polls open.

For the second consecutive year, Mrs. Marie-Ange Bartlett was the first woman voter and Leo J. Lamanuzzi, first male voter.

Prior to opening of polls, Warden Sweet invited voters in the hall and election officials to inspect the ballot box. The box's indicator was set at 0000. George W. Grebenstein (R), deputy warden, was on duty at ballot box which was locked after inspection.

PROCEEDINGS OF

After all items in "General Budget" were read it was voted to raise and appropriate, duly seconded, monies for all items as recommended by Finance Committee which were not requested to be held.

"Hold" items were then taken up for action.

(a) Item 51 — Assessors, Expenses. Mrs. Mabel T. Flaherty inquired why cost of printing book to contain 1966 assessed valuation of personal and real estate was not included in the Assessors' budget instead of being a special article in the Warrant. Samuel Nahra Jr., chairman of Assessors, replied that when the Board received the final estimated cost to print the valuation book, the Finance Committee had completed consideration of the "General Budget". It was then a special article for an appropriation to print said book was requested to be inserted in the Warrant. Selectman Harold F. Francis moved, seconded, and so voted to raise and appropriate \$700 for Assessors' expenses.

(b) Item 53 — Assessors, Clerical. Voted: on motion of Gerard J. Matthews, duly seconded, to raise

and appropriate for clerical hire, \$900, pay to be \$1.50 per hour and not to exceed \$900 for the year. Among those speaking on the item included Mrs. Eva V. Bolack, Norman E. Walker, chairman of Finance Committee; Chairman Nahra of Assessors, and Mr. Matthews.

(c) Item 71 — Change caption to read for "Primary, Elections and Town Meetings". Appropriation of \$1000 to be raised for this item on motion of Town Clerk Newton.

(d) Item 73 — Town Hall, Expense. Voted: on motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$3800 for Town Hall Expenses.

(e) Item 76 — Planning Board, Expense. Voted: on motion of James R. Wheeler, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the recommended sum of \$955.

(f) Item 77 — Master Planners Services for 1966. James R. Wheeler explained that the additional appropriation was being asked to further planning service desired by the Planning Board.

Mr. Wheeler motioned that \$750 be raised and appropriated, duly seconded. Moderator Burnham directed a standing vote on the motion when he said he was unable to determine result of voice vote. Constables Alfred H. Nichols and Alvin H. Nichols were named by Moderator to make count. They reported:

YES — 60: NO — 57.

Result of voting was questioned. Moderator Burnham called for a second standing vote with count made by the same two constables. Result:

YES — 65: NO — 59.

(g) Item 82 — Building Inspector. Voted: to raise and appropriate \$100 for Building Inspector's salary. Before action on motion, Raymond E. Griffin inquired why the town had a building inspector inasmuch as it had no building code. Selectman Porter replied that the building inspector has inspected buildings and had other duties.

(i) Item 92 — Police Officer, Full-Time. Alanson J. Varney, Finance Committee member, asked to have Item 92 taken up for consideration before (h) Item 88 —

Operating Expense, Police Department, and so voted. Chairman of Selectmen Porter then motioned, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$4200 for a full-time police officer, two months of 1966 having passed. Moderator declared vote unanimous.

(h) Item 88 — Police — Operating Expense. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Porter, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$7300, as recommended by Finance Committee, for operating expense of Police Department.

(j) Items 103, 104 and 105 — Firemen, salary; Captain, salary, and Lieutenant, salary. Chairman of Selectmen Porter explained it had been decided this year to present the salaries of the firefighters, captain and lieutenant of the Fire Department separately. He then made three separate motions and so acted on to raise and appropriate Item 103, \$2300, firemen's salary; Item 104, Captain's salary, \$125, and Item 105, Lieutenant's salary, \$125.

(k) Item 114 — Tree Warden General Expense, and (l). Item 115, Tree Warden, Dutch Elm and Pest Control. After explanation, Gerard J. Matthews moved, duly seconded, and so voted to raise and appropriate as recommended, \$1500 for general expense in Tree Warden's department after which it was voted to raise and appropriate \$1,750 for suppression of Dutch elm and pest control.

(m) Item 127 — Town Dump Maintenance. Voted: on Motion of James B. Seitz, member of the Board of Health, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$1000 for town dump maintenance. (Board requested this sum; Finance Committee recommended \$900.)

(n) Item 130 — Food Service Sanitation. Board of Health requested \$1200, a proposed new account. The Finance Committee did not recommend any appropriation. Mrs. Marjorie R. Wilcock, R.N. of Board of Health explained the purpose of the proposed service. Motion to raise and appropriate \$1200, duly seconded, was declared lost by Moderator on voice vote.

(o) Item 144 — Highways, Vacation. After Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier explained increase of \$120 in 1965 to \$260 in 1966, Chairman of Selectmen Porter moved, duly seconded, and so voted, to raise and appropriate \$260 for Highways, Vacation.

(p) Item 152 — Veterans' Benefits. Voted: On motion of Samuel Nahra Jr., director of veterans' services, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$8000 for veterans' benefits.

(q) Item 164 — Schools (local). Salaries. Voted: on motion of Town Accountant Charles H. Ferris, duly seconded, that the budget for schools to be raised by taxation be established at \$187,921.91.

Before above action, Edward S. Henderson, member of the School Committee, motioned to raise and appropriate \$145,730.60 for teachers' salaries. At this point, privilege was asked to now act on Article 33. There was no objection.

Voted: on motion of Selectman Gallagher, duly seconded, to appropriate the proceeds of the 1965 Dog Tax Refund, \$660.69, received from the County to Schools — Salary Account. Also voted, \$200 from Bachelor School Interest Account, making total of \$860.69, reducing amount by taxation of item to \$144,-869.91. There was no objection. Town Accountant Ferris then presented his motion to establish the local school budget at \$187,921.91.

(r) Item 167 — Nipmuc Regional School — Salaries. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen Porter, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$155,-469.89 for the "Instruction Account".

Town Accountant Ferris moved and so voted to establish the total amount of Upton's share of cost of Nipmuc Regional Junior-Senior High School at \$199,-639.54 by taxation; total \$218,695.12, less credits of \$19,055.58.

(s) Item 185 — Insurance. Voted: on motion of Selectman Gallagher, duly seconded, that the sum of \$6,500 be raised and appropriated for Insurance.

Preceding action on the motion, Donald A. Wellman asked how many town employees were included in the Blue Cross-Blue Shield plan in effect. Town Accountant Ferris replied there were 38. Chairman of Selectmen Porter stated that a town employee working at least 20 hours a week or earning a minimum of \$1500 a year was classed by the Selectmen as eligible for the insurance, partially paid by the town.

(t) Item 193 — Summer Recreation. Voted: on motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$500 for Summer Recreation Program.

A motion by Gerard J. Matthews, seconded, to "pass over" the item was declared lost by Moderator on voice vote.

In a discussion on the motion to appropriate the money it was stated it would be used for baseball.

(u) Item 194 — Maintenance of Town Lawns — Voted: on motion of Jerald C. Rice, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$450 to be used in maintenance of town lawns.

Chairman of Selectmen Porter explained that it was the intent to have lawns of certain town properties mowed and otherwise cared for.

(v) Item 214 — Water Loan 1958. Voted: on motion of Samuel Nahra, Jr., duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$3,000 for payment of 1958 Water Loan.

(w) Item 217 — Maturing Debt, Water Loan 1965. Voted: on motion of Gerard J. Matthews, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate \$12,000 for payment of extension of water mains on School, Cross and High Streets after officials explained the purpose of the loan. Moderator declared vote unanimous.

(x) Item 228 — Interest, Water Loan 1965. Voted: on motion of Gerard J. Matthews, duly seconded, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$276 for payment of interest on the 1965 Water Loan.

DISTRICT NURSING ASSOCIATION

Article 6. Voted: motion of Selectman Francis, duly seconded, "to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2000) to be used by the Upton District Nursing Association for pre-natal and pre-school nursing service; crippled children and well-clinic service." Moderator declared vote unanimous.

AUTHORIZATION TO BORROW

PROCEEDINGS OF SPECIAL TOWN MEETING

JUNE 21, 1966

Moderator George W. Burnham called the meeting to order at 7 P.M., stating there was more than a quorum (20 voters) present. (Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R) and Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) checked voting list at main door. They reported 34 voters' names checked during the meeting: 28 men and 6 women.)

The Moderator in reading the Warrant at the request of the Town Clerk stated he would waive reading the three articles at this time if there was no objection. There was none.

Before action by voters on each of the three articles, John E. Craib of the Finance Committee reported the said committee recommended favorable action.

ADDITIONAL APPROPRIATION FOR NEW HEATING SYSTEM IN TOWN HALL BUILDING

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Selectman Ernest B. Porter, duly seconded, "that the Town vote to raise and appropriate the sum of Nine Thousand Dollars

(\$9000), said monies to supplement the original Forty-five Hundred Dollars (\$4500) voted under Article 28 at the annual adjourned town meeting of March 12, 1966, to be used to install a new boiler and burner and change heating system to zoned hot water in the Town Hall Building."

Before action on the motion, Chairman of Selectmen James J. Gallagher read a report by George B. Torrens, a heating engineer, captioned "Rehabilitation of Heating System, Town Hall", written May 27, 1966.

The report in part: "The existing system consists of space heating in the various areas on the basement, first and second floors and fresh air supply and exhaust for the main hall or auditorium. System of heating is principally one and two pipe steam with gravity return of condensation to the boiler plant. The system is supplied with steam by means of an oil fired cast iron boiler. In addition to the above steam system there are two forced hot water heating systems obtained by means of a convertor off the steam boiler and pump circulation.

"The standing radiation in the various areas except the basement is of cast iron column type except for a new tube type in the Selectmen's office and Tax Collector's office on the first floor and in a hall on the second floor. All other cast iron radiation is of one pipe steam connection. Finned pipe radiation is installed in the basement rooms that are heated.

"The heating units for ventilation comprise unit heaters with propeller fans installed in the fresh air ducts are of two pipe steam connections.

"From computations of building heat loss it has been determined that the total calculated load is practically equal to the installed radiation load although the compression room by room is not. Oversized radiation has been installed in areas of minimum heat loss and by chimney effect of stairwells, open doors, high ceilings and convection effect warm air is distributed in such a manner that in general adequate heating is available throughout the building.

"Temperature control of this building consists of three thermostats, one for the steam radiation in the building,

the second for the hot water heating on the first floor and second floor and the third for basement radiation. Overheating occurs in the steam heating system when heating required in the library.

"It is recommended that the system of heating be zoned. Four zones of heating would be provided, first, for all rooms on the first floor except the auditorium, stage and ante rooms; second, for all rooms on the second floor, i.e. hall and two offices; third, the auditorium and associated rooms in the basement. System of heating for zones No. 1 to 3, inclusive, will be forced hot water served by circulating pump under control of thermostats, one for each zone. The fourth zone will comprise the existing steam heating system. Mr. De-Flavio, State Inspector, has advised that the existing ventilation installation for the auditorium will suffice if no structural changes are made to the auditorium or its method of heating.

"A time clock will be provided for lowered night or unoccupied periods of operation. A sump is also included to remove water from the boiler, heating systems and pit under boiler.

"The new installation will include an oil fired cast iron sectional steam boiler, smoke-flue, induced draft fan, additional oil storage tank, hot water convertor, cast iron pattern, hot water radiators, pumps, supply and return piping, valves, accessories and protective devices, pipe and boiler covering, thermostatic control, fresh air duct for combustion and electric wiring of oil burning system, pump, motors and controls.

"It is proposed to reuse as much of the existing material and equipment as possible. Cast iron radiation has been selected in place of finned pipe radiation in order to conserve floor space especially in heavy work areas (Library offices, etc.) Black steel pipe will be used because of the existing high cost of copper. The entire installation to meet the requirements of the Department of Public Safety, Commonwealth of Massachusetts."

Edward L. Prentiss said the 1966 tax rate had not been established to date and suggested that action on the

article be deferred until after the rate was set. He stated there had been a report the rate increase was to be approximately four dollars, (\$37 to \$41).

Selectman Porter explained that the \$9000 requested would reflect about 75 cents on the rate. He added the Selectmen favored having the proposed appropriation included in this year's tax rate and not voted from available funds in the town treasury.

Donald A. Wellman asked if \$9000 could be voted from available funds (free cash) if such an amendment motion was made. Selectman Porter replied that the article specifically called for the sum to be "raised and appropriated."

No motion to amend the original motion was presented.

When the voice vote was taken, the Moderator declared favorable action. He stated there was one dissenting voice.

INSTALL ONE 1000-LUMEN STREET LIGHT ON CIDER MILL LANE

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Selectman Porter, duly seconded, "to authorize the Board of Selectmen to install a 1000-Lumen Street Light on Cider Mill Lane." Moderator declared unanimous vote.

In reply to an inquiry by William H. Sadler, Selectman Porter said the cost of such a light is approximately \$28 a year. For the remainder of this year, the cost would be about \$12.

Selectman Porter explained that voting on installation of street lights usually took place at the annual town meeting. He said the Selectmen favored installation of one light at this time on Cider Mill Lane, a short street, in view of new homes and property valuation of approximately \$75,000.

TRANSFER OF STATE AID GRANT TO LIBRARY EXPENSE ACCOUNT

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Selectman Porter, duly seconded, "to transfer the sum of Seven Hundred Eighty-One Dollars and Seventy-Five Cents (\$781.75)

from the State Aid to Libraries, Anticipation of Appropriation Account, to Library, Expense Account." Moderator declared unanimous vote.

At 7:18 P.M., voted on motion of Selectman Porter, duly seconded, to dissolve the Warrant. Vote declared unanimous.

Article 1. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen James J. Gallagher, seconded by Tax Collector Clement J. Lambert, "that the Town vote to accept gifts

of money given to the Town of Upton in memory of Mrs. Alice M. Hall, in the amount of Two Hundred Eighty-Six Dollars and One Cent (\$286.01), including interest, said monies to be added to the Library Construction Fund." Moderator declared voice vote unanimous.

Chairman of Selectmen Gallagher then requested that Article 3 be acted on before Article 2. Moderator Burnham asked if there was any objection. There was none.

MENDON STREET IMPROVEMENT

Article 3. Voted: on motion of Selectman Harold F. Francis, seconded by Road Commissioner Henry J. Poirier, "that the Town vote to transfer from proceeds received, or to be received, under Chapter 679, Acts of 1965, the sum of Eleven Thousand Eight Hundred Four Dollars and Twenty-Eight Cents (\$11,804.28) to be expended on Mendon Street." Moderator Burnham declared voice vote unanimous.

In reply to an inquiry by George E. Nydam, Commissioner Poirier said the plan is to rebuild a section of Mendon Street beginning at the Mendon-Upton town line. The proposed project is to include widening, resurfacing and new drainage.

REZONE SECTION OF PRESENT ZONING BY-LAW TO "COMMERCIAL AND INDUSTRIAL"

Article 2. Voted: on motion of Chairman of Selectmen James J. Gallagher, seconded by Edward L. Prentiss, ". . . that the present Zoning Map be amended by rezoning the area in the northeasterly part of Upton shown on the proposed revised map dated 1964 as 'Industrial Land', to 'Commercial and Industrial' under the present zoning law." (Amendment approved Sept. 29, 1966 by Attorney General Edward W. Brooke. Posted Oct. 6, 1966.)

Moderator Burnham directed a standing vote with count made by Police Chief Rudolph J. Scholl and Constable David I. Aldrich. Result announced: YES — 55: NO — 1.

When Article 2 was presented for consideration, James R. Wheeler, chairman of the Planning Board, moved, seconded by Selectman Francis, "that the Town vote to amend its present Zoning By-Law and Zoning Map by substituting for said present Zoning By-Law and Zoning Map the proposed Zoning By-Law and Zoning Map contained in report of the Upton Planning Board to Town Meeting and proposed amended Zoning By-Law with amended map, dated June 29, 1966, copies of which being on file with the office of the town clerk, said amended Zoning By-Law and amended Map to become effective upon approval by the Attorney General and publication provided by law."

Moderator Burnham stated the contents of the 12-section proposed amended Zoning By-Law with map would be taken up by section if there was no opposition. No objection was voiced.

If any voter desired to speak on a section, Moderator Burnham asked the voter to request "Hold."

"Hold" was requested on Section 3 captioned "Districts", by Mrs. Eleanor R. Broderick, East St.; Section 6, "Use Regulations", Alanson J. Varney, Elm St., and Section 7, "Development of Sites and Location of Buildings and Structures", Mrs. Mildred E. Flaherty, Taft St., for sub-sections to be discussed.

Among voters participating in the discussion under Section 3 were Mrs. Broderick, George N. O. Poirier, Edward L. Prentiss, James R. Wheeler, Henry J. Poirier, Paul V. Swanson of the Planning Board, Davis T. Cloward, Mrs. Mildred E. Flaherty, Edward F. Gorman, Miss Mary L. Carroll, Edward E. Johnson, James E. Paige and Gerald Fowler.

Moderator Burnham then directed a vote be taken on the nine sections not requested "Held": Section 1, "Purposes"; Section 2, "Definitions"; Section 4, "Continuance of Existing Use"; Section 5, "New Construction and New Uses"; Section 8, "Administration"; Section 9, "Board of Appeals"; Section 10, "Amendment"; Section 11, "Validity", and Section 12, "Effective Date."

After a voice vote, to determine the result, Moderator Burnham called for standing vote and named Police Chief Scholl and Constable David I. Aldrich to take the count. Result announced by Moderator: YES — 24; NO

— 32. A two-thirds vote was required to adopt the above amendments, the Moderator stated. Thus the motion was lost.

Chairman Wheeler of the Planning Board then informed the voters that as a result of the vote, no industrial area under Section 3 in the northeasterly section of the town had been rezoned as recommended by Thomas Associates, our community planners — where Fenwal Co. desires to locate a research laboratory. (The tract is approximately 72 acres off Southboro Road and near Upton State Forest area.)

After a discussion under Section 3 about lot sizes generally, and about the proposed creation of a 72-acre Industrial Zone in northeasterly part of Upton, Moderator Burnham declared a five-minute recess and subsequently an addition five-minute recess. After reconvening, Henry J. Poirier motioned, seconded by Leo J. Lamanuzzi, that "all lot sizes in all districts remain as stipulated in the present Zoning By-Laws." Moderator declared favorable action on voice vote.

Chairman of Selectmen Gallagher stated that one of the desired objectives in amending the present Zoning By-Laws was to encourage the construction of a research laboratory in the northeasterly part of Upton in the 72-acre proposed zone change. He further indicated that such a plant location would bring new assessable property (approximately \$300,000) to help the town's tax rate.

Selectman Gallagher then moved ". . . that the present Zoning Map be amended by rezoning the area in the northeasterly part of Upton shown on the proposed revised map dates 1964 as 'Industrial Land', to 'Commercial and Industrial' under the present Zoning law." Motion seconded by Edward L. Prentiss. Town Counsel Oppewal explained to the voters the substance of the motion. Standing vote result: YES — 55: NO — 1.

Voted: on motion of Alanson J. Varney, seconded by Alexander Kennedy, to adjourn. Vote declared unanimous by Moderator at 9:05 P.M.

Cities and towns are not empowered to act with respect to general elections, taxation, pledges of credit, dispositions of park land, general civil relationships, the punishment of felonies, or the imposition of imprisonment except as the General Court may lawfully confer such powers upon them.

SUMMARY

The Act imposes a temporary tax upon all retail sales of tangible personal property at the rate of three per cent of the selling price. Sales of certain items are exempted from the tax, including but not limited to sales of food products for human use, articles of clothing, prescription medicines, agricultural machinery and certain publications. The statute contains specific provisions relating to the registration of vendors, the filing of returns and the payment of the amounts collected by such vendors. Vendors may apply to the State Tax Commission for abatements of the amounts owed where they believe such amounts to be excessive, and decisions of the Commission on such applications may be reviewed by the Appellate Tax Board. The Commissioner of Corporations and Taxation shall have the usual powers and remedies provided for tax collection for the collection of the taxes imposed by this section. The State Tax Commission shall issue regulations necessary for proper administration and enforcement of the section.

The Act further imposes a temporary excise upon the storage, use or other consumption in Massachusetts of tangible personal property at the rate of three per cent of the sales price of such property. Sales upon which the retail sales tax described above has been imposed, or which are exempt from the retail sales tax, shall be exempt from the use tax. Sales upon which a tax has been paid in another jurisdiction shall also be exempt. Assessment, abatement and collection of the use tax shall be governed by the provisions which relate to the tax upon retail sales. The tax upon retail sales and the excise upon storage, use or other consumption shall be effective during the period from April 1, 1966 to December 31, 1967.

Each qualified taxpayer shall be entitled to a credit of four dollars for himself, four dollars for his spouse and eight dollars for each qualified dependent, but such credit shall not be allowed if the taxable income of such

individual and his spouse exceeds five thousand dollars for the year. In addition to the taxes described above, the Act provides for new excises upon certain banks; new taxes upon the income of certain corporations; new taxes upon cigarettes; a room occupancy excise upon rent paid for the use of hotel rooms and other lodging places; and and excises upon sales of certain alcoholic beverages.

PROCEEDINGS OF STATE ELECTION

November 8, 1966

Robert K. Sweet, warden called the meeting to order at 7 A.M.

Samuel Nahra, Jr., election clerk, read the warrant. On motion of Chester W. Walker, duly seconded, it was voted to waive reading of section containing the questions (1-8, inclusive.)

Mrs. Rita C. Cutler (D) and Chester W. Walker (R) were ballot clerks at in-coming table; Mrs. Rose E. Davis (R) and Mrs. Claire B. Praskiewicz (D) at ballot box. George W. Grebenstein (R), deputy warden, was in charge of ballot box.

Three sealed boxes purporting to contain 1948 (so marked) ballots received by the Town Clerk from the Secretary of the Commonwealth were turned over to Warden Sweet before the polls opened. The Town Clerk had received a box marked containing 113 absent voter's ballots from the state. Of this total 22 were used.

Ballot box indicator was set at 0000. Interior of box was inspected by election officials and several voters prior to polls being open.

Alfred H. Nichols was the first voter. Mrs. Ruth A. Sweet was first woman voter. Mrs. Blanche M. Banister, Pleasant St., 93 years old, came to hall to vote. Weather conditions, good.

Hourly reading of ballot box indicator: 8 A.M., 66; 9 A.M., 124; 10 A.M., 205; 11 A.M., 310; Noon, 355; 1 P.M., 410; 2 P.M., 477; 3 P.M., 562; 4 P.M., 653; 5 P.M., 842; 6 P.M., 1025; 7 P.M., 1261 and 8 P.M., 1401 — 688 Men and 713 Women voting. The total included 21 absentee ballots of which two were cast by servicemen and one (unregistered voter, spouse of military man in foreign service). One absentee ballot was rejected as defective, not being in accordance with affidavit regulations. Absentee ballot envelopes (20 at time) had been processed (new law) on preceding day in Selectmen's room by Town Clerk with Mrs. Vivian V. Mainini, chairman of Republican Town Committee, and Mrs. Mary V. Powers, appointed by W. Vincent Powers, chairman of Democratic Town Committee, as observers.

To avoid possible mechanical trouble with ballot box owing to size of ballot (six pages) and number of ballots cast at the time, the box was opened in late afternoon by election officials to remove some ballots. These ballots were placed in a container, sealed, and the box left in front of ballot box. Constable Samuel E. Aldrich was present. Mrs. Mainini, chairman of Republican Town Committee, and W. Vincent Powers, chairman of Democratic Town Committee, observed the removal of the ballots at request of Town Clerk. After close of polls at 8 P.M., all ballots were packaged in blocks of 50 for the tellers.

Tellers reported at 8 P.M. to canvass vote. They signed allegiance cards and sworn to perform said duty. They were: Enrolled Democrats, Mrs. Helen T. Jonis, Mrs. Ethel M. Dias, Mrs. Mary V. Powers, Mrs. Margaret M. Rodwill, Mrs. Theresa Y. Martin, Mrs. Joanne H. McClure, Mrs. Elizabeth Victor, Mrs. Rita F. Draupeau, Edward L. Prentiss, Edward C. St. Andre, Douglas J. Gilchrist; Republicans, Mrs. Helen I. Donham, Mrs. Ada W. White, Mrs. Norma L. Taft, Mrs. Marjorie I. McLaughlin, Mrs. Grace R. Aldrich, Mrs. Muriel J. Mitchell, Charles F. Caton, Alexander Kennedy, Edgar H. Ethier, William H. Smith, and Robert M. Stuart. Mrs. Davis, Mrs. Praskiewicz, Mrs. Cutler and Mr. Grebenstein also counted.

Used and unused ballots were placed in separate containers, sealed and moved into a compartment in town vault by Police Officer William S. Evans, Jr. The compartment was locked.

Result of voting was announced at 1.15 A.M. (November 9, 1966) by Town Clerk.

On June 8th a Rabies Clinic was held and 152 dogs immunized. This was a good turnout, but considering the seriousness of this disease, the Board would like to see a greater number of the dogs in Upton immunized.

D. P. T. Clinics were held in September, October and November for pre-school children.

The Board, with the aid of the Department of Public Health, has made inspections of the local food handling establishments. The Mass. Dept. of Public Health has stressed the importance of these inspections, and they will be a regular part of the Board's program in the future.

This Board would take this opportunity to express its sincere appreciation to Mrs. Ruth Nichols, R. N., for the many years of dedicated service she has given to the Board of Health, the children and townspeople. Her unselfish care and devotion in home and school will long be remembered.

We would like to express appreciation to the Massachusetts Department of Public Health, the Board of Selectmen, Town Counsel, appointed officers, all Town Departments, volunteer clinic workers, homeowners and contractors who have cooperated with us during the year.

REPORT OF THE
 DIRECTOR OF CIVIL DEFENSE

To the Board of Selectmen:

The Emergency Operating Center of the Massachusetts C. D. Agency is located at 400 Worcester Road, Framingham, Mass., below the ground and is fully equipped for any type of emergency. On Wednesday,

Nov. 30, Joseph Deering and Paul Taylor took part in the National C. D. X66 test working at radios & controls underground. They were entirely self sufficient, with generators, air purifiers etc. This was an all day test and they were three floors below the surface in the bomb proof shelter, except for a direct hit.

The Area 3 Headquarters is underground at the Lyman School, Westboro, and Harold F. Rossi is Area Director. The Sector 3B offices are at Milford High School (Tel. 473-6141). Theodore W. Aptt is Sector Director and Upton is in this Sector 3B.

The Federal Government is undertaking a National program to assist all communities in the U. S. to develope *Community Shelter Plans*. The Worcester target area, which includes Upton, has been designated as a priority location in which this program will commence shortly, fully funded by Federal Money. Your C. D. Director attended this meeting on Thursday, Dec. 1, 1966 at the Worcester Civil Defense Office where State and Federal C. D. Agencies and the Corps of Army Engineers explained the program which may take a few years to complete. It's good to know that the Upton Board of Selectmen plans to go along with this very important program, for Upton needs shelters in case of emergency. We have none for our town officials and our citizens in case of Nuclear attack.

New accomplishments during 1966 were: 1. Civil Defense personnel installed three new antennas at the Town Hall, one for the State Police emergency frequency with an extension monitor in the police station and a second one for the Town frequency; also one for the Civil Defense licensed citizen's band frequency. 2. Installed an intercom between the Police Station and Civil Defense Headquarters. 3. We had a new shelf welded in the emergency truck at no cost to the town through the cooperation of the Nipmuc Regional High Schools' Metal Shop. 4. Installed two new 1000 Watt lamps on the emergency truck. 5. Civil Defense Headquarters is now located in a 14 x 14 ft. room in the basement of the Town Hall at the rear of the new Police Station. In the coming year we hope to continue to increase and improve our equipment and capabilities so as to be more useful to the Town.

In 1966 we assisted with lighting at the request of the Chief of Police in the hunt for a missing child in West Upton, also conducted the Annual Halloween "Spook Watch" in cooperation with the Police Department. The Emergency fire truck is in good condition with a portable generator and can be used in an emergency such as lighting up the Town Hall or assisting in fighting fires when requested.

Surplus Property. We have been assigned several times to Myles Standish Warehouse, Taunton, Mass. for surplus property with good results.

Meetings. Your director has attended many area & district meetings which are quite helpful.

The Defense Council members are Charles R. Stuart, Edward Prentiss, Henry J. Poirier, Edward Kucziuski and Dr. Bernard F. McKernan.

Mrs. Janet Cooper became the 7th member of the Upton Conservation Commission.

David Kennedy of West Upton was sponsored as a camper for two weeks' session at Massachusetts Junior Conservation Camp at Spencer.

Conservation education material obtained from the State Education Department was given to the Upton Schools as a beginning in providing information to be used in elementary grades.

Further improvements were made at Lake Wildwood area through clearing of brush, trees and poison ivy by the Tree Warden. Multiflora rose bushes were set out along the borders. Picnic tables and barrels have been provided for public use.

Estimates have been obtained for weed control in Pratt and Mill Ponds. It is hoped this work will be done this spring.



To the Upton School Committee and the Mendon-Upton Regional School District Committee:

This is my seventh annual report as Superintendent of Schools. I would like to have you view it as a report of progress as we still have unfinished plans and are working on new ideas. Your consideration will be needed if these are to improve our schools.

The detailed reports of the Supervisor of Elementary Schools, the Principal of Nipmuc Regional High School and other Supervisors, should receive your close attention.

In the interest of brevity, I will simply outline areas which received attention during the calendar year.

1. Successful completion of a Title I project in Remedial Reading for grades 1 through 6 using \$10,792.00 in Federal Funds and at no cost to the town.
2. Continued use of Ristein Funds to increase the number of volumes of library books at the Memorial and Ball Schools, to purchase physical education equipment and to provide part-time instruction in instrumental music.
3. Continued program of maintenance at the two Elementary Schools.
4. Revision of teachers salary schedule making the minimum \$5200.00 in both Elementary and Regional Schools.
5. Continued study in an attempt to solve space problems at the Regional School.
6. Continued study of the possibilities of regionalizing grades K-12.

Again I wish to express my gratitude to all those who cooperated to assist us in performing our duties. You, as Committee members, have certainly been generous with your time and effort to make our jobs more enjoyable.

REPORT OF THE SUPERVISOR OF ELEMENTARY SCHOOLS

It is a pleasure to submit my third annual report as Supervisor of Elementary Schools for School Union No. 59 Mendon and Upton.

Taking advantage of funds provided under Title I Elementary and Secondary Act passed by Congress, our reading program received a much needed boost aiding

our staff in diagnosing reading problems. During the summer a remedial reading program was carried on for the above-mentioned purpose. Sixty Upton pupils participated in the project for a period of six weeks. A great variety of audio-visual aids were purchased. The aids are currently being used by all teachers.

The program will be continued next summer. Remedial arithmetic will be added along with the services of a school psychologist. Upton has been funded in the amount of \$11,520.00.

Updating of our basic reading series began with the purchase of the 1966 editions for Grade One. Grade Two will be updated next September. A new social studies series was adopted for Grades Four, Five, and Six and are now in use.

Intra-mural sports proved successful under the direction of Joseph Renda, teacher of science and physical education and Frederick Milligan, social studies teacher. The boys played tag-football and the girls played soccer. The program is expected to continue.

Mrs. Barbara Burke, School Librarian, has completed the cataloging of new books purchased with Risteen funds and Title II Federal grants. Our library is increasing in volume rapidly. Volunteer mothers assisting Mrs. Burke are as follows: Mrs. Rita Drapeau, Mrs. Laura Cederlund, Mrs. Dorothy Bishop, Mrs. Winona Bouthiette, Mrs. June Marshall, Mrs. Norma Taft, Mrs. Norma Earl, Mrs. Marilyn Engblom, Mrs. Margaret Kane, Mrs. Viola Soter.

The Memorial Day program was dedicated in memory of Lt. Richard Rand who was killed in Viet Nam. James Gallagher, Chairman of the Board of Selectmen spoke on Lt. Rand's beliefs.

Mendon-Upton teachers who were instructors in the summer reading program demonstrated the project to the P.T.A. Actual classroom facsimiles were established.

A group health and life insurance plan was made active. The towns pay half the premium and the em-

ployee pays half. The adoption of the plans puts us in a more competitive position to attract good teachers.

In an attempt to attract the best candidates for the Mendon-Upton elementary schools a flyer was written to be sent to colleges, universities, and teacher-placement agencies, describing our elementary school systems. Mrs. Marjorie Weed, Art Instructor at the Nipmuc Regional High School was the artist for the cover.

The elementary school band needs your support. Please show your support by becoming an active member in the Band Booster Club. The band is under the direction of Mr. Donald Thatcher.

Mrs. Janet Stockwell, School Nurse, tested eyes, ears and measured weight and height. Pupils in Grades One and Four have physical examinations each year. Parents are to be congratulated for following a new policy which makes the home responsible for making provisions to take their children home in the event of illness, accidents, etc.

One of the responsibilities of professional educators is to study and research current trends in the field of education. The professional staff is presently researching patterns of classroom organization and the proper and flexible use of audio-visual equipment and materials. The study will be on-going and as it is developed information will be released through newspapers and notices to parents.

I would like to thank all school authorities, teachers, P.T.A., Band Boosters Club, and townspeople for their continued support of our schools.

To the Citizens of Mendon and Upton:

During the Fall of 1966, two months of continuous weekly meetings pertaining to the budget were held. The result was that the net increase will be slightly less than 1% of the 1965 budget.

One of the more significant acts passed by our state legislature this past year was the issue of collective bargaining by teachers. This has led to the recognition of the Nipmuc Teachers' Association as the bargaining agent for the Professional personnel of the school. Several meetings have already been held pursuant to a bargaining agreement.

In relation to the aforementioned facts, the major concern of the Committee however, has been the over-crowded situation at Nipmuc Regional and a solution to this problem, namely, a new Junior High School at a new site. There has been considerable delay in finding a site and presenting plans for a school to you citizens because of extremely poor soil conditions in the area covered by the Regional Agreement and because of the insistence of some that we add on at Nipmuc, thus necessitating our exploring every possibility of this latter idea. The ultimate conclusion is that no addition can be built at Nipmuc.

It is hoped that by the March Town Meeting, the Committee can present a site and plans for a Junior High School for your approval.

REPORT OF THE HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

The problem of over-crowding, which has been with us for the past two years, has now reached the point at which it will no longer be possible to carry on our school program effectively without some organizational changes to provide additional space.

Beginning in September of 1967, I feel that it will be mandatory to put into effect double sessions for the seventh and eighth grades and I have submitted this recommendation to the school committee. This will be necessary not only to relieve a very unsatisfactory situation in the eighth grade, where we have an abnormally high teacher-pupil ratio but will allow the use of at least two rooms in the junior high school wing for a needed expansion of the high school program.

Although the projected junior high school enrollment for next year will be approximately the same as this year, we should have five academic sections in both the seventh and eighth grades, rather than crowding the eighth grade pupils into four sections. Large classes present a very poor teaching-learning situation in which problems of control are greatly intensified and teachers cannot teach as effectively as they should, nor can the pupils receive as much individual attention as they need. The present four section grouping in the eighth grade was put into effect on an "emergency" basis for one year. This year's experience dictates that this situation should be eliminated.

As serious as the above problem is, an even more acute situation will arise next year at the high school level, where our enrollment will jump from approximately 360 to well over 400. If we are to just maintain our status-quo curriculum-wise, these additional pupils will necessitate the addition of more academic sections in several subject-matter areas. With all of the high school classrooms and laboratories now in use each period to accommodate the enrollment this year, it will

not be possible to carry on our program next year with over 60 more pupils without additional rooms being available. If only five of the seven classrooms in the junior high school wing were being used at one time for seventh or eighth grade pupils, the other two rooms could be used to take care of the additional sections of high school classes.

For those who would say that it would be possible to accommodate all pupils in the high school next year by enlarging class sizes, I would refer them to the eighth grade problem this year, as described above. I cannot stress too strongly the harmful effects of over-crowded classrooms upon the quality of education available. Any lowering of educational standards for any reason whatever (temporary or otherwise) would be a serious mistake and a gross injustice to the pupils.

Financial Assistance

The Blackstone Valley Vocational Regional School District is indebted to many organizations, governmental and private, for financial and material assistance during the past year.

In the month of January the Superintendent-Director went to many of the government depots from Burlington, N. J. to Stockton, Calif. to inspect and select machine tools for the new vocational-technical school. As a result of these inspections the Regional School Dis-

trict was able to acquire approximately \$140,000 worth of equipment free of charge, other than the cost of transportation and insurance.

We also received from the Federal Government a grant of \$207,800 under the provisions of Public Law 88-210 for the construction of the new regional school. This coupled with a grant of \$55,625 received last year makes a total of \$263,425 that we have received to date for construction purposes.

A special grant of \$51,275 was given by the Federal Government under the provisions of the George-Barden Act to be used to pay for the salaries of the professional staff.

The Commonwealth of Massachusetts, through the School Building Assistance Commission, made a grant of \$50,002 for the construction of the new school. Last year we received a grant of \$93,925 for preliminary planning costs which makes a total of \$143,927 that we have received from the State to date.

The State Surplus Property Division has also been of assistance by providing many pieces of equipment, numerous small tools, and large quantities of metal at a very nominal cost.

Private corporations such as the Draper Corp. of Hopedale, the Ford Motor Co. and the Tektronix Corp. have also made substantial gifts in the form of equipment and training materials.

Mrs. Joseph W. Zeller of Douglas, the wife of the late Prof. Zeller, presented many of the technical books from her husband's library to the library of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School.

We wish to take this opportunity to express our appreciation for the contributions made by Mrs. Zeller and the above organizations who have made it possible to provide better facilities for the youth of the region.

Construction

Progress in the construction of the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical School was right on schedule during the first few months of 1966 and it seemed as if we would be able to open the new school in September as planned.

In the month of June our plans for opening in September were given a severe jolt due to a strike involving the plumbers and the steam fitters. For nine frustrating weeks progress at the school dragged on at a snail's pace, which of course made it impossible to open on September 7 as we had expected. As soon as the strike was settled an all-out effort was made to get part of the building finished so that we could commence classes as soon as possible.

Finally on September 26, 1966 the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School became a reality when the doors were opened for the first time to the 132 boys from the thirteen towns of the Regional School District. At the end of the year the school was about 95% complete and we hope to have the entire school in operation for the beginning of the second term at the end of January.

Pupil Selection and Curriculum

During the months of January and February all the schools in the member towns were visited by the Superintendent-Director in order to give information to the boys in the eighth grade about the courses that would be offered at the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School. At that time applications were given out and the boys were requested to indicate their first, second, and third choices among the following courses: Auto Body Repair, Auto Mechanics, Mill and House Carpentry, Drafting, Electronics, Machine Shop, Metal Fabrication, and Plant Maintenance. At the same time each school was asked to fill out an information sheet for each pupil who had filed an application.

At a later date each applicant was given a series of aptitude tests involving verbal reasoning, numerical ability, mechanical reasoning, abstract reasoning, and spatial relations. The scores on the above tests and the information sheet provided by the sending school were evaluated in order to produce a profile of each applicant's characteristics. Each applicant's profile was recorded on a compilation sheet which served to identify the most qualified students in each town. Every effort was made to admit the best qualified boys in each town, to give them their course preferences, to distribute the courses as equally as possible among the towns, and to select each boy for the course in which he appeared to have the best chance of success.

Originally, we had planned to admit 108 boys in the first year but we finally enrolled 132 boys on the opening day of school because we had far more qualified applicants than we expected. Even though we accepted about 25% more students than we had planned for, we still had scores of boys who were qualified but who could not be admitted due to a lack of space.

The operation of the school to date has proceeded very satisfactorily in spite of the incomplete facilities. The enthusiasm and cooperation of the student body and the staff has been most gratifying.

We are proud of the fact that the Blackstone Valley Regional Vocational Technical High School is the fourth school of this type in the State of Massachusetts. It is a fine testimonial to the many individuals who have worked tirelessly over a long period of time to create a school which will become an ever more valuable asset to all the citizens of all the towns it serves.

APPORTIONMENT OF COSTS INCURRED
BY THE DISTRICT

(A) CLASSIFICATION OF COSTS

For the purpose of apportioning assessments levied by the District against the member towns, costs shall be divided into two categories: capital costs and operating costs.

(B) CAPITAL COSTS

Capital costs shall include all expenses in the nature of capital outlay such as the cost of acquiring land, the cost of constructing, reconstructing and adding to buildings, and the cost of remodeling or making extraordinary repairs to a school building or buildings, including without limitation the cost of the original equipment and furnishings for such buildings or additions, plans, architects' and consultants' fees, grading and other costs incidental to placing school buildings and additions and related premises in operating condition. Capital costs shall also include payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations issued by the District to finance capital costs.

(C) APPORTIONMENT OF CAPITAL COSTS

Capital costs shall be apportioned annually in December for the ensuing year as follows:

- (1) Each member town's share of the capital costs incurred in connection with the construction, equipping and placing in operation of the initial district school building, including the payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations of the District to finance such capital costs, shall be determined by computing the ratio which the sum of its public school male pupil enrollments in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, on October 1 of the three years next preceding the year in which the Committee votes to authorize the incurring of such capital costs bears to the sum of the public school male pupil enrollments in

grades nine through twelve, inclusive, of all the member towns on October 1 of the same three years; and in the case of capital costs consisting of the payment of principal of and interest on bonds, notes or other obligations issued by the District, the ratio shall not be changed during the period in which such bonds, notes or other obligations are outstanding, except as provided in subsection VII(A). For the purpose of this clause (1) of Section (A) above, public school male pupil enrollments shall be defined as the number of male pupils in grades nine through twelve, inclusive, residing in each member town and receiving education at such town's expense.

(E) APPORTIONMENT OF OPERATING COSTS

Operating costs for the first calendar year next following the establishment of the regional school district and for every calendar year thereafter shall be apportioned to the member towns on the basis of their respective pupil enrollments in the regional school. Each member town's share for each calendar year shall be determined by computing the ratio which that town's pupil enrollment in the regional district school on October 1 of the next year preceding the year for which the apportionment is determined bears to the total pupil enrollment from all the member towns in the regional district school on the same date.
